Modesty should forbid me quoting from an article by John Draper, in the June 1998 issue of this magazine, entitled The Hoxne Story: 'For over a thousand years, the Priory and then the Abbey has played a part in the life of our community. It has never been better loved and served than it is by the two whose home it is now.' If there is a grain of truth in those kind and generous words, I hope, in some small way, we have tried to repay and share the privilege of being a part of this noblest of histories.

But now we must go, because to every thing there is a season and a time to every purpose under Heaven – a time to get and a time to lose. A wise old head once told me that whatever you have or do in this life, you are only a caretaker. Not being able to exercise that care with the encircling years would surely tarnish the rich bounty which fortune has so freely bestowed. So it is time to move on before time does it for us.

Knowing when to move on or step down is never easy. A common failing among mortals is to believe that we are immortal or, perhaps worse, irreplaceable. But I fear either of those false ambitions leads sooner or later to impotence and, eventually, ridicule. I expect we have all heard or even said, 'If I don't do it, nobody will.' What arrant nonsense! History is one long record of successive generations picking up the baton. For every soldier cut down, another steps forward.

I guess the problem is that, unlike retirement, there is no set time for moving on or relinquishing responsibilities. Some have had enough by the time they reach their fifties and others still have plenty of spark in their seventies and beyond, and some just don't know how to let go. There is no formula for quitting at the right time. We each have to decide that for ourselves and that is doubly difficult if you are still on top of the game. Then again, there is an old adage that says 'that's the time to quit!' One thing I do know – there will always be another runner to pick up the baton. They may drop it or they may run the next leg. But that's not any of our problems.

So, we will enjoy this the last of our summer wine and, with luck, plant another vine and look forward to a new vintage which, be sure, we will share with all of you who have made the first so very drinkable.



To mark this anniversary Hoxne Parish Council, along with the Woodland Trust, is organising a family event to be enjoyed in the wood.

Hoxne was one of 250 communities which planted trees with the Woodland Trust at the turn of the millennium, creating new woods across the UK as part of the 'Woods on your Doorstep' project.

Sunday August 15 - 2 pm til dusk.

There will be music, dancing, and fun events for children to join in with such as a bug hunt with prizes for the most interesting specimen, and a BBQ and bar. There will also be several local craftspeople providing demonstrations of their skills and selling their wares.

planters, including former pupils of St Edmund's Primary School, Hoxne, to come along to the event.

Chris says: "The biggest change people will see in the wood over the ten years is just how big it has grown and how green it looks. It is already fast becoming an oasis for wildlife, with over 60 species of birds recorded, as well as a number of interesting plants and regular sightings of deer, foxes, bats and even grass snakes. In fact, it really is our own little nature reserve."

New opportunity to see the Hoard

You may have been listening to the series on Radio 4 A History of the World in 100 Objects given by Neil McGregor, director of the British Museum. A few weeks ago he told the story of the Hoxne Hoard (which is still on the R.4 website and can be downloaded).

It is still the finest Roman hoard ever excavated in Britain and in 1992 was an important moment for the village. Many people at that time would have gone to the British Museum and talks were given in the Village Hall. That was almost 20 years ago. I discovered that the British Museum allows groups of 25 adults to be shown, by a curator as a special tour, specific items from the collection.

It has now been arranged for 25 of us to meet a curator, Mr Robert Gwynne, on Wednesday September 8, 12 noon at the Museum, who will show the group the Hoxne display. Simmonds Coaches will take us to London, picking up at 8am from the Village Green (allowing a stop on the way if required) arriving at the British Museum at 11.30am and leaving the Museum at 4pm.

I was showing off recently to my granddaughter as we were riding in the car near here. "Charlotte," I said, "see that field on the left; that's barley, and that field on the right; that's wheat." And a little later, "Charlotte, that field was bright yellow but now the flowers are gone, and see the little pods; they have seeds in that will be crushed and turned into oil; that's called rape."

1094/10 (LBC) Mill Farm Hoxne Road (Replacement of reed thatch with long straw thatch) & 1098/ 10 Mill Farm, Hoxne Road (Fence round pond and bridge over). These applications have been granted by MSDC (The Parish Council decided to recommend approval in each case.)

0724/10 Land alongside A140 Ipswich Road, Eye (Two wind turbines and ancillary works) Granted by MSC. (The Council raised no objection to these proposals) 0096/10 Airfield Industrial Estate, Eve. The (revised) application has been withdrawn by the applicant.

Visit to Roger Skinner Ltd, Stradbroke.

Councillors were welcomed to The Mills by Mr. Skinner and members of his team on the 8th June. The visit included a presentation, a tour of the factory and a valuable and helpful opportunity to discuss and ask questions about their current operation. as well as plans for the Hoxne/Denham site (formerly Broadwater Mouldings) both in the short term when it will be used only for storage and in the longer term as their main manufacturing facility.

Parish Plan Public Meeting

A public meeting will be held in the autumn to gauge support for the development of a Parish Plan for Denham and if successful to get the process started. A parish plan is based on a comprehensive survey of the wishes and aspirations of residents for the village and the subsequent report and action plan could provide a strong case for the sustainability and funding of new initiatives and of course equally can provide a potent tool with which to oppose unwanted change. Please look out for a flier in Village Voice giving further details.

Speedwatch

Following a discussion at the Annual Meeting when the SNT representative explained the purpose and working of the Speedwatch scheme Denham Parish Council has contacted neighbouring parishes to explore the possibility of a joint initiative to deter speeding in the villages. Under the scheme Councils can share the cost of detection equipment (which is operated by teams of volunteers who have received training from Suffolk Police). Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting was held on 1st June and included the Parish Council Chairman's review of the year and reports from the police Safer Neighbourhood Team, Neighbourhood Watch, Denham Church and the Friends of Denham Church and the Village Hall.

The Village Hall has seen an encouraging rise in bookings and substantial improvements to the Hall have been made particularly for disabled access.

The Church is due to be closed for 16 weeks for repairs but services will be held •• during the summer in various homes across the village. The Friends who continue to raise funds for the Church will now be a sub committee of the PCC.

Neighbourhood Watch: every effort is made to attend the monthly SNT Tasking meetings at which priorities for local policing are set. A common theme is speeding in villages (See item on Speedwatch above).)

The SNT reported a marginal increase in recorded crime but the detection rate remained high. A new area based response to 999 calls, coupled with new technology should enable a response on site within a maximum of 15 minutes.

As in 2009, it was hoped that the Red Feather Club and others unable to be present at the APM would instead be able to give their reports at the July Parish Council meeting.

At the Annual Parish Council meeting held immediately following the Annual Parish Meeting, Councillor Ray Keeble was re-elected as Chairman. James Govier, the painter, etcher and engraver who lived in Hoxne, would have celebrated his centenary on the 1st of August. He studied at the famous Swansea School and Royal College of Art. From 1947-1965 he was the art master at Eye Grammar School and resided in Hoxne from 1950 until his death in 1974. 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Time is the price for 'season of plenty'...

When we were a truly rural community there was no time to wed in summer despite so many hours of daylight. The season of plenty required effort. Harvest succeeded haymaking - soft fruit, vegetables and surplus milk needed preserving then and there. In fact farmers still tend to marry in winter when there is nothing else to do.

In leaner times no doubt there were fewer pigeons left at the end of the winter to plunder the produce of the garden. We have two vegetable patches. In one we grow potatoes, cougettes, parsnips, garlic and various herbs none of which seems to appeal to pigeons or rabbits. The other one, defended by low wire netting is under siege from both and also a pair of partridges. The wall along the back serves as a convenient perch while contemplating what tickles their fancy.

Working outside last week the air was redolent with the refreshing yet pungent smell of elderflowers. This week it is honeysuckle and a whiff of lavender that comes to nose. Soon it will be the lime trees flowering along with the murmur of innumerable bees - hopefully. They are diminishing too. We are dependent upon bees to an extent that is largely ignored. They are on the wing from early spring until late autumn when they rely on ivy as a source of nectar and pollen to top up their winter stores. So - support our bees and grow fragrant nectar-rich flowering shrubs and don't destroy your ivy. **HC**

In the summer of 2005 the New Reeding Woods Group were the proud recipients of the East Anglian Daily Times Wildflower Award. This prize anticipated the project of planting a wildflower meadow, as the group had only just purchased the land which is now the community woodland along the Redlingfield Road. This summer the project has come to fruition, as the wild flower display has been breathtaking.

The project involved covering the proposed meadow area with depleted soil, ploughing,

rock picking and rolling the area to achieve a fine tilth, and spreading green hay from local meadows and church yards, ensuring that the seed sown had a local provenance. The prolonged cold winter and recent warm weather have combined to give a fantastic display this year, with plentiful primroses and cowslips in the spring, and an amazing display of vetch, clover and ox-eye daisies through the early summer. This year the group are proud to be able to donate their green hay, when it is harvested, to other potential wildflower meadows in the area.

Say cheese?

Photography is an increasingly popular pursuit - but so often the results fail to meet our expectations. Steve Hickman has some top tips.

In the first of an occasional series of articles on photography, local portrait photographer Steve Hickman gives some hints and tips on getting that perfect solo or group portrait.

Try an experiment: analyse your mouth as you say 'cheese'. You start with a troutpout, then a split second later you are Coco the Clown. Not exactly natural, informal or spontaneous. But how can you get these qualities in your peopleshots? Here are my top five tips- based on my experience photographing dozens of Norfolk and Suffolk babies, toddlers, teens and adults every week! **1.** Communicate with your sitters. Don't ask them to say cheese- ask them what their favourite food is. The example family group here decided that their favourite food was KFC chicken bits- this

set the little girl off into a fit of giggles which was all I needed to get everybody happy at the same moment- CLICK! **2.** When photographing a couple or a parent with a child, you can get more intimacy into the shot by getting them to look adoringly at each other, and not at the camera.

3. Solo portraits can sometimes be more dramatic if the sitter is looking out of the frame. Try getting them to stand and look

over their shoulder, or face them away from the camera and catch them in profile as they turn their upper body towards you.

4. For perfect child photos, get down to their eye level and give them something to play with - a favourite toy, an apple, some bubbles. If all else fails with tod-dlers, and you are desperate for a smile, make a funny noise, put on a ridiculous hat- or get somebody just out of frame to tickle them!

5. Trade secret: for a large group, there always seems to be somebody blinking. So ask everybody to close their eyes tight and open them wide on the count of 3. OK, get ready with your finger on the shutter. 1, 2, 3, 4..... CLICK! Sorted! Next time, I'll look at selecting the ideal location for your people-shots.

It then transpired that he had succeeded Jack Lively as Birmingham's Professor of Politics, and had bought his house there, but what he didn't know was that the house he had visited had belonged to the Livelys who had sold it to the Albus when Lively left Sussex University. I found that bizarre.

Chat about Stonehouse

More recently I was chatting to my neighbour across the field who said that he had inducted John Stonehouse into Norwich Prison. I countered by saying I was there when he left Uganda under a cloud. The Governor had invited John and his wife and children for a farewell family dinner, and chose us as suitable guests, being of the same age and idealistic outlook.

After coffee, he took John to Entebbe Airport through the back way as Special Branch were waiting at the lodge to pick him up. John was working for an African Co-operative which aimed to give growers a fairer price for their cotton and coffee than the Asian middlemen, an activity seen in the 50s as dangerously political and not progressive by the powers that be.

I am sure older readers will recall what happened to Stonehouse. He became an MP and Minister in Wilson's government, launched a bank intended to help the new country of Bangladesh, went to the wall, and disappeared, thought to have committed suicide by drowning.

Unfortunately for him the Australians were looking for Lord

Lucan who had also gone missing, and mistakenly arrested Stonehouse, sending him back to England to face the music.

The co-incidence is that the night he went missing, his daughter Jane, not a friend, was by chance at a dinner party with my son, who was unaware that we too had had dinner with her as a small child, and during the meal her mother rang to tell her that her father had disappeared.

Wanting to find out more about Stonehouse I bought his autobiography, 'Death of an Idealist' for 1p from Amazon.

From this sad story, written in prison, I discovered that his first job was Probation Officer, yet another coincidence perhaps. There are so many, all as yet unexplained, leading to much speculation about the known unknowns. **TG**

New Councillor. The Council is pleased to welcome Mike Allmey as a new member of the Council. Mr. Allmey was co-opted on 27th May thus returning the Council to full strength.

Annual Parish Meeting At the Annual Parish Meeting held on 27th May the Chairman presented his review of the Parish Council's year and reports were presented by or received from our County Councillor, the police Safer Neighbourhood Team and local community groups and organisations including St Andrews Church, the newly reconstituted Wingfield Barns, the Village Hall, the Ramblers and Friends of the Arts in Wingfield. We were particularly pleased to welcome the Local History Group, and the Gardening Club both newly formed and reporting to the Annual Meeting for the first time. All recorded good progress and positive plans for the future as part of an encouraging picture of thriving community life in the village. County Councillor Guy McGregor said that Suffolk had the lowest increase in council tax this year, achieved against a background of services rated as high guality and amongst the most cost efficient in the country. However he drew particular attention to the extremely severe financial constraints which will affect the County this year and beyond with major reductions in central government funding which will necessitate a fundamental reappraisal of ways of working, increased sharing of services and cooperation with Town and Parish councils.

At the Annual Parish Council Meeting (following directly after the Parish Meeting), Councillors Michael Harvey and Lee Smith were re-elected as Chairman and Vice Chairman respectively. The Clerk presented a summary of the accounts and forecast for 2010/2011. The accounts and annual return were approved at the meeting on 28th June.

Travellers Encampment on Wingfield Green

As reported in the previous edition established procedures were followed under which the travellers were given a deadline to leave the Green, failing which legal action to evict would be instigated through Suffolk County Council. Although there was some delay the process worked effectively and we are grateful for the assistance of the County legal department. However it is disappointing to note that once again considerable mess was left behind. Arrangements were being put in hand for the removal of rubbish from the Green but at the time of writing it was understood that MSDC would be unable to assist in cleaning up the adjoining private land. Nevertheless we would like to thank Mrs. Gibson-Harries for her efforts in raising the matter on our behalf

Abbey Wood On the 4th July Mrs. Gibson-Harries formally opened the wonderful new community woodland near to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gee to whom particular thanks are due. Progress reports on this initiative, which has involved the planting of well over one thousand mainly deciduous trees, and shrubs of native species have appeared in earlier editions.

Next Meeting. The next ordinary (scheduled) meeting of the Council will be held on 8th September (venue to be confirmed). This meeting is expected to include an agenda item covering a number of issues associated with the management of the Green.

Names from the past...

Graham Baron Ash [1889-1980] of Wingfield Castle

My first meeting with Graham Baron Ash at Wingfield Castle was as a young boy with my grandmother Olive Tye, who was one of the teachers at Wingfield School. We had cycled to the castle and were given a guided tour of the property, with Mr Ash.

My second meeting with Baron Ash was when he gave me 2/6 to spend at Wingfield Vicarage Fete during the early 1960s. He was a generous benefactor to the school and village and to other charitable causes and restoration projects.

Baron Ash as he was commonly known helped to restore Packwood House in Warwickshire which had been purchased by his father Alfred in 1903. Graham had inherited Packwood House in 1925 which he presented to the National Trust in 1941 after years of restoration work. Baron Ash continued to live at Packwood House until he decided to move away to Suffolk. In 1943 Baron Ash resided briefly at Abbey Farm in Hoxne and lodged at The Scole Inn, before moving into Wingfield Castle on a forty-year lease as the tenant of the Adair family who owned the Castle. Baron Ash helped to restore the castle and filled it with treasures in the form of paintings, furniture, tapestries, ceramics and objects of interest.

I visited the castle again during the early 1970s as an art student and was allowed to take some photographs and make drawings of the house and surrounding buildings during the 1970s and up until Baron's death in 1980. I was shown an album of photographs showing the castle before its restoration and after the restoration work, Baron Ash had carried out. By 1947 the castle was habitable again and Graham Baron Ash moved in to his new home. Looking back, I suppose that Graham Baron Ash was an English eccentric, with a passion for restoring old houses and collecting antiques and enjoyed his solitary existence. He was a very well educated and knowledgeable man on a number of subjects and had travelled throughout the world. In 1938 he had been appointed High Sheriff of Warwickshire, having put his name forward for election. This was a bit of a surprise as he didn't like to be in the public eye.

He never married and lived a reclusive life as a bachelor initially being looked after by his housekeeper Dorothy Eden and then by his butler Stanley and male servant Mr Hall. His nearest relatives were his sister Betty [Mellor] and niece Bunty. In 1967 on the 4th of October the auctioneers Christies sold part of the collection housed at Wingfield Castle and on the 30th of May 1980 another sale disposed of the remaining collection which had been put together by Graham Baron Ash.

Graham Baron Ash died at Wingfield on the 20th of February 1980 aged 91 and his ashes were buried in the family grave at St Giles Church, Packwood. A service of remembrance was held at St Andrew's in Wingfield and another at Norwich Cathedral.

His obituary was written by his friend Thomas W Ferrers-Walker of Baddesley Clinton Hall and is mentioned in passing in the preface of the 1980 Wingfield Castle sale catalogue.

The Ash family can trace their origins back to Richard Ash of Ashby de la Zouch in Leicestershire, who bore arms in the 1530s. The family fortune was secured by ▶ Joseph Ash [1825-1915] and his son Alfred [1859-1925] who produced galvanized iron products in Birmingham. In the Easter of 1984 Gerald Fairhurst who had purchased the castle in 1982 opened up Wingfield Castle to the public after two years of restoration and refurbishment. The castle was sold again in 1987 and 1989.

Wingfield Castle has been featured in the Country Life Magazine in 1932 and in the following books - Suffolk Houses, Suffolk Excursions by Thomas Kitson Cromwell in 1819, North East Suffolk by Alan Jobson, East Suffolk Illustrated by HR Barker in 1908, Great Medieval Houses of England and Wales by Anthony Emery and of course Wingfield its Church Castle and College by SWH Aldwell which was published in 1925.

Details about Graham Baron Ash can be found in the guide book to Packwood House and in The Baron of Packwood by Mike Miles which was published in 2004. A current exhibition at Packwood House features the world tour of Graham Baron Ash and artefacts collected during his travels.

The Ash family motto, Non nobis sed omnibus in Latin can be translated in English to, Not for us alone, but for everyone. This rings true to the generosity shown by Baron Ash in giving Packwood House to the National Trust and in his bequests to projects which appealed to his sense of preserving art and restoring architecture.

Wingfield Castle became his retreat, repository and setting for his collections. In the grounds were a set of stone statues of the four seasons purchased from Brome Hall and a marble bust of a Roman emperor, probably taken from Oakley Park in Hoxne. The library included a number of books on East Anglia, numerous art books and two illustrated scrap books. Included in the sale of drawings and prints was a view of the castle by Samuel and Nathaniel Buck dated 1738 and a view of the castle by Robert Clamp dated 1812. Stained glass panels were inserted into the windows of the castle and came from various sales. The restoration of Wingfield Castle was carried out with great thought and care using appropriate building materials. The building work was carried out by Reades of Aldeburgh under the direction of the site foreman Charles Rouse. Stephen Govier [Hoxne July 2010].
