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Denham residents - help needed

Many people think that the Church of England is wealthy, owning land and treasures that have accumulated over hundreds of years; however every parish church is responsible for covering its own expenses and if it fails to do so will eventually be faced with closure! In 2009 St Johns Church in Denham was faced with this possibility when repairs to the structure of the building amounting to almost £200,000 were needed. The village rallied to the aid of this historic building and a Friends Group was set up. In just over a year £10,000 was raised to support the repairs and with other grants the building was saved! Now however the parish church faces another problem, the small congregation of this church are faced with having to find almost £3,300 this year just to cover the running expenses. This does not include any funding for repairs and maintenance, regular expenses in a building that is hundreds of years old, (the recent repairs were only for the most dilapidated parts of the building).

It costs about £9.00 a day to keep the building open, which equates to almost 38p an hour! These costs include the "Parish Share" a fee that pays for the diocese, Vicar, ministry and education, as well as insurance, electricity and heating expenses, and all are kept at the minimum as our income is so small. The Friends Group proved that Denham wants its church to survive, now we need to ask for help again, if you want the church to be "there" when you want your child baptised or married, if you want to be laid to rest in our peaceful churchyard, please support us now, you may not want to attend our services, but you might be pleasantly surprised if you did.

St Johns will be arranging events to raise funds during 2013, please come along to help us if you can; this ancient edifice needs your support.

Wayne's ■ gardening tips ■ February / March

February: Move dormant Fuchsias, Heliotropes and Hydrangeas onto greenhouse staging if 10°C can be maintained on warm day, spray with water as growth becomes active. Keep lawn maintenance up, first mowing when grass 6-7.5cm tall with mower blades set high. Trim winter jasmine.

March: Good time for dahlia cuttings, remove lower leaves, cleanly cut from tuber, dip in hormone rooting powder and pot on. Early potatoes can be planted in a warm bed from mid-March if the soil is not too wet. Harvest forced rhubarb by pulling the sticks from the plant, cutting will leave the remainder to rot.

Hoxne's past uncovered

The Hoxne Heritage Group has been awarded £9,600 All Our Stories grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the Story of Hoxne archaeological dig project.

All Our Stories, a new small grant programme, launched earlier this year in support of BBC Two's The Great British Story presented by Michael Wood, has been designed as an opportunity for everyone to get involved in their heritage. With HLF funding and support, community groups will carry out activities that help people explore, share and celebrate their local heritage.

Our aim is to clarify the development and continuity of settlement in Hoxne through the years by involving the village community in the research through field-walking and excavation of test pits at locations around the village to raise awareness and appreciation of our heritage. We are delighted to announce that the archaeological excavation of test pits will take place on the weekend of 6-8 July and will be supervised by the Suffolk Archaeology Unit experts. The field-walking event will take place in the autumn.

We are looking for volunteers to dig test pits in their own gardens or to allow us to dig the pit (1metre cube) on their land. We will also be looking for volunteers to provide refreshments and for a number of other tasks. A meeting will be held in St. Edmund's Hall on Tuesday, 18th June where SAU will explain what will happen and to answer any questions. Leaflets requesting expressions of interest will be circulated shortly.



This type of project has been conducted and met with huge enthusiasm in many villages so we are hopeful that the people of Hoxne will embrace this opportunity similarly. You never know, you might have the rest of the Hoxne Hoard in your garden!

They provide a service that has saved many lives, yet receives no government funding. Costs are met by donations from members of the public and corporate sponsorship This service is provided completely free of charge, allowing the NHS to divert funds where they are needed most. Run by dedicated volunteers; they give up their time and fuel costs without recompense.

Volunteers are all trained in the correct handling of blood and blood products, they receive training in respect of the routes covered to & from hospitals and those riders/drivers who have not as yet obtained an Ad-



vanced Rider/Driver standard, are assessed by a qualified advanced rider. Volunteers are given financial support to take advanced rider training and obtain a qualification.

SERV Suffolk & Cambridgeshire support two hospitals in the county; Ipswich and West Suffolk Hospitals as well as three in Cambridgeshire. Norfolk Hospitals are supported by SERV Norfolk.

2012 was a busy year for Borderhoppa. In April we became a flexibly routed service, this meant that anyone, any age could now use our service, not just our members. Also, Norfolk County Council joined Suffolk County Council joined Suffolk County Council in allowing free transport on our buses for concessionary pass holders after 9.30am. All this saw an increase in passenger numbers, and we've welcomed many new faces on to our buses.



On Mondays throughout the year, we've continued to run regular outings. These are for members only, but membership is free, you just pay for the outings. Members have enjoyed visiting towns & cities for shopping, trips to the seaside, boat trips, pub lunches & visits to local gardens & garden centres. We also had lots of passengers wanting extra trips to do their Christmas shopping.

HOXNE PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

PRECEPT and BUDGET FOR 2013/2014 FINANCIAL YEAR - at the January meeting, Councillors agreed on a Precept of £13,000 for the coming financial year, so that there is no increase from 2012. The Precept is the money that the Parish Council requests from the District Council to run services within the village. The Parish Council has a mandate from the Parish Plan which includes speed deterrents and traffic management in the village, more environmentally friendly street lighting and the provision of allotments. The Precept will allow the Council to continue to work towards achieving some of these goals during the forthcoming year, particularly traffic calming on Green Street which is currently awaiting the completion of a safety audit appraisal by Suffolk County Council. This matter will be further debated at the February meeting.

POLICE REPORT – PC Thomas attended the January meeting and reported that current crime trends in the nearby parishes include burglaries to dwellings as well as outbuildings, and that the majority of these had occurred during daylight hours. Items taken from dwellings include jewellery and small valuable items with a quick sell on value. Burglaries to outbuildings are also occurring with power tools, trailers, bikes and, in some cases, even vehicles being stolen. Parishioners are advised to review their security arrangements, particularly if their homes are vacant during the day.

CLEAN UP WEEKEND – This year's tidy up will take place on Sunday 24th March. Volunteers should meet at St Edmund's Hall at 11.00 am where equipment will be provided. Please bring your own gloves.

MEETING DATES – the Parish Council meets on the first Thursday of the month, with the February and March meetings being held at St Edmund's Hall and those from April to September being held at the Playingfield Pavilion and back to St Edmund's Hall for October, November and December. A full list of meeting dates is on display on the notice boards and is available from the Parish Clerk. Members of the public are always welcome to attend meetings.

Dates for your diary include the Annual Parish Meeting on Thursday 25th April at St Edmund's Hall and the Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council on Thursday 2nd May at Playingfield Pavilion.

Currently, according to the Greeting Card Association, women buy approximately 85 per cent of them.



Obituary

David Lawes - 1937 - 2012

David was born in Heckfield Green, an only child, and attended St Edmunds Primary School on the opposite side of the road on which he lived. He first worked as a road worker until he was called up for National Service. He joined the RAF and was posted to Australia; this was at the time when the atom bomb was being tested on Christmas Island. He was demobbed after three years by which time he had returned to the Isle of Wight.

In his younger days, David was a good sportsman enjoying darts at his local, The Grapes, and playing cricket. But favourite of all sports was football and he loved to take his son, Kevin, to watch Norwich City at Carrow Road where he was a season ticket holder.

For over 50 years David was employed as a coach driver by Simonds of Botesdale. On one memorable trip he was taking a party of bell ringers on tour when he met Christine, one of the bell ringers, who he subsequently married. David and Christine enjoyed 40 happy years together.

Another one of David's great loves was the Royal British Legion. He was a loyal member for over fifty years and he rarely missed a meeting. He and his pal, Reg Baxter, would travel miles to rallies and fetes and he and Christine supported all the fund-raising events of the Hoxne Branch. He was very proud of the Legion's Certificate of Appreciation that he received.

David was a devoted father to Kevin and Debbie and step-father to Karen. During these last four years, in spite of failing health, he remained cheerful and never complained. He would sit in his favourite chair with his cat on his lap looking out of the window to watch the birds. In the summertime, a tame robin would eat out of his hand.

David will be greatly missed by Christine, Kevin, Debbie, and her partner Stuart, and Karen.



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Thanks, Mum

On Sunday 10th March, some of us will be celebrating Mothering Sunday. Others will be sending a card for Mother's Day, an American invention in the early part of the 20th Century and on a different day in the US. Around the world the place that mothers hold within the family has been celebrated for more than two millennia in all sorts of fashions. So how did Mothering Sunday become confused with Mother's Day?

The answer has its roots in East Anglia's local history. Centuries ago it was considered important for people to return to their home or "mother" church at least once a year. So each year, in the middle of Lent, everyone would visit their "mother" church, or the main church or cathedral of the area.

Most historians think that it was this annual Lenten theme that led to the custom of working children being given the day off to visit their family. At that time it was quite normal for children to leave home for work once they reached ten years of age. As they walked back home along the country lanes on Mothering Sunday, children would pick wild flowers or primroses to take to church or give to their mothers. Often they brought a gift with them, a "mothering cake" – a kind of fruitcake with two layers of marzipan, known as simnel cake.

Mothering Sunday was also called Refreshment Sunday, because the fasting rules for Lent were relaxed that day. But, by the ineteenth century, the holiday was dying out, and by the 1930s the keeping of many of the old Mothering Sunday customs had lapsed in many English parishes. Its revival was brought about just a decade later through the influence of the American servicemen stationed in East Anglia during the Second World War.

Mother's Day was the idea of Anna Jarvis, a young woman whose mother died in April 1906. The idea began to spread and gain wide support. In 1913 the second Sunday in May was adopted officially by the US government as the day dedicated to the memory of "the best mother in the world – your mother".

Across the English Channel, the French origin of a mother's day was a concern at the end of the 19th century of a low birth rate and steps were taken to recognise mothers of large families.

St Margaret Church, Syleham has a Mothering day service on Sunday 10th March at 10am that will include the presentation of flower posies.

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

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Times past... with Stephen Govier

The Reverend George Doughty

A report in the Ipswich Journal of January 1st 1831 indicated that the trial of rioters who besieged the pub at Hoxne on the 13th December 1830 was due to the tithe audit being conducted by the Reverend George Doughty, Vicar of Hoxne.

Presumably this took place at the Hoxne Swan, when windows were smashed and the audit was delayed. The Reverend George Doughty would benefit from the tithe award, so the local agricultural workers were upset about the chairmanship of the meeting and its eventual outcome.

The Reverend George Doughty gained revenue from the glebe land, adjoining the vicarage and owned other land in Hoxne and at Martlesham. In the sanctuary of Hoxne church is a memorial to George Doughty and his wife Catherine Revett [1775-1804] the daughter and heiress of Ezekial Revett [d.1799] and Helen Milligan. Catherine probably died in childbirth aged 29.

George and Catherine were the parents of George Thomas [d.1802], Charles Montagu and Frederick Goodwin. The Doughty family



owned Theberton Hall and this property was inherited by Charles Montagu. The Martlesham Estate was inherited by Frederick Goodwin, who in 1833 was married to Beatrice Cunningham the daughter of Rear Admiral Sir Charles Cunningham of Oaklawn, Hoxne.

If we look at the Revett family tree who resided at Brockford, Suffolk we find that the Revett family were also related to the family of Tobias Frere of Harleston, Norfolk and the Press family of Hoxne. James Press [d.1824 aged 82] was married to Rebecca Revett [d.1825 aged 89] who was the daughter of Thomas Revett [d.1777 aged 77] and his wife Susanna Latham, daughter of the Reverend John Latham of Westley, Suffolk. If you are in search of a good historical book to read then the Chronicles of Theberton written by Henry Montagu Doughty in 1910 is one to find. The other book I have consulted is The Betts of Wortham in Suffolk 1480-1905 written by Katherine Doughty. The pedigree of the Betts family is a very interesting one as the Betts family occupied Oakley House also known as the White House. Edmund Betts [1719-1788] of Oakley was married to Martha Deve the daughter of Nathaniel Deve of Eye and his wife Mary Cullum. Their daughter also named Martha [1749-1779] was married to the apothecary John Worth of Diss.

Their son Captain John Worth [b.1775] was a naval officer and was married to Catherine Sinclair. When

the last family members of the Betts family of Wortham Hall, Suffolk were looking for an heir, they looked at the daughter of John Worth and Catherine Sinclair. Catherine Sinclair Worth was married to Admiral Sir Baldwin Wake Walker [1802-1876] on the 9th September 1834.

The Wake Walker's inherited Oakley House, but had The Depperhaugh built at Chickering, a large building constructed of Woolpit white brick. Sir Baldwin served in the Royal Navy from 1812-1876 and was involved in the Morea Expedition in 1828 and the Bombardment of Acre in 1840. He was a surveyor of the Navy from 1848-1861.

In 1838 he was given special permission to take command of the Turkish Navy and was known as Yavir Pasha. Baldwin, gaining honours from the Turkish Navy for his command at Acre.

Evelyn Laura Walker the daughter of Baldwin and Catherine was married in 1864 to Captain Hugh Talbot Burgoyne [1833-1870] VC RN, who was the ill-fated captain of HMS Captain which sank off Cape Finisterre in 1870.

A stained glass window was put up as a memorial to Hugh Burgoyne at Hoxne by his wife and the graves of the Sir Baldwin Wake Walker and his wife can be found near to the west door of Hoxne church.
