HOXNE'S HISTORY

Artefacts and Displays in St Peter and St Paul Church

o commemorate the 1150th anniversary of St Edmunds martyrdom plans are being drawn up for the establishment of the St Edmund Chapel in the North Aisle of the Church. In order to facilitate construction of the Chapel and the restoration of the screen which was removed some years ago it will be necessary to temporarily take down and store the exhibits currently located in the North Aisle.

This provides us with a unique opportunity to present our local history as depicted by these exhibits in a better and more modern way. The Hoxne History Group together with the Parochial Church Council are working to establish ownership of the artefacts and displays and refresh and update these hopefully with the assistance and permission of the owners.

Some work has already been undertaken to identify and catalogue everything currently on display, but we do require help particularly to add new material where appropriate, and more importantly, to maintain what we already have in good condition for future generations.

As we are uncertain about the ownership and origin of some of the exhibits we are most anxious to hear from anyone who may have information that will help us in this regard.

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We have three fully accessible vehicles which cover Mid Suffolk. We also operate a community car service. Most of the cars used are owner drivers. Community cars are available to travel further afield. outside the boundaries of Mid Suffolk. We are totally reliant on volunteer drivers to keep our services running.

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Fares for the fully accessible vehicles are 1-5 miles £2.40, 6-9 miles £3.30, 10-14 miles £4.20.

The Community Car Service is charged differently at 54p per mile (inc VAT) and £1.20 booking fee for a single journey (also inc VAT).

To book journeys just give us a ring and we will take you through a quick registration process and then take details of your travel requirements.

We urgently need VOLUNTEER DRIVERS to keep our much valued services operating.

With more volunteer drivers we can take more passengers to hospital appointments, clinical appointments, day centres, social clubs, shopping, and visiting relatives and friends. We have a number of care home and shop staff who rely on us to get them to and from work. We also have passengers who use us regularly to get to pick up points for public transport.

We know from passengers' comments that they are very grateful for the services we provide and for us and our volunteers this is very rewarding and satisfying.

Francesca, based in our Stowmarket office will be so grateful to hear from any prospective volunteers and will be able to give you all the information you need to apply to join us.



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

Reflections

The Commitments

ot that *The Commitments* is a film that I've ever seen. Firstly thank you to everyone who commented on my last piece, and my continuing thoughts about suicide.

Special thanks to the person who pointed out my poor drafting (and yes it was my poor drafting); where I wrote:

Times change though, and for over a hundred years the Church of England has held that someone of sound mind who kills themselves can have a church funeral. This suggests that the exception is a criminal seeking to avoid justice, but otherwise I'm sure you can see the huge loophole in the law (there's two actually).

That should have said, someone of unsound mind (i.e. mental health issues) you can have a church funeral.

Another comment which gave me plenty to think about was the observation that it's wrong to talk about committing suicide because suicide isn't a crime and you commit a crime, and it is certainly that suicide is not a criminal offence.

But it made me think about what it means 'to commit'. Yes, a crime is one thing that can be committed; but nations can commit to war, committing to war is not automatically illegal.

Then I noticed something in the wedding service, one of the prayers says:

Pour out your blessings upon N and N, that they may be joined in mutual love and companionship, in holiness and commitment to each other

Weddings contain two things, legal bits and prayers so has the church been inciting illegal acts in the middle of a legal ceremony?!!! No!

So, what does commitment mean? It occurs to me that there's a huge difference between being committed and anything else. For example, in a breakfast of bacon and eggs, the chicken is involved, the pig is committed. Sometimes in life we have to be more than involved; we have to be committed. Perhaps we all need to take some time to think about the things in life where we need to be committed, because sometimes its absolutely necessary to be committed!

Hoxne Bell Ringers

here is further news of Hoxne bells. On a recent visit to the belfry in Hoxne tower a comparison was made between the state of the bells now and their appearance at our previous visit in the Autumn. Unfortunately there appears to be further deterioration. The wood worm and rot has continued and there is concern about the safety of the bells. The PCC are arranging an inspection

of the bells and the frame by a structural engineer who will assess the condition of the headstocks from which the bells hang. Depending on his opinion the timing and details of any work will be decided.

The band has continued their practises although we are still short of teachers. It is unusual to have a band composed almost entirely of learners. More often one or two learners are attached to a band of regular ringers. An effort to get our own teacher was frustrated by illness and the cancellation of the teachers course. Once again our thanks go to the support we have received from Winston and Carol and Zoe without whom we would have no teachers.

We have been ringing at Oakley again and this has resulted in more maintenance work on their bells which do not have a regular band. Thanks again to Irene and Rev. Adrian Watkins for the use of their bells. An improved information sheet has been produced for the Oakley bells some of which are of great antiquity and all of which are interesting. Unfortunately access to the belfry is rather difficult involving long ladders and trap doors, so not many people get to visit them. Details and photos are now available on a sheet in the church,

Our attention will now be directed at the Hoxne tower while we continue to build up the ringers skills. Firstly we must make sure the bells are safe then plan our restoration.

In May we had a very interesting talk from Sue Horne who lives locally, about her work when she was the UK Development Manager for Crabtree & Evelyn, a company founded in 1972 which became international with outlets all over the world including the UK. They supply luxury goods and toiletries, beautifully designed but only to be found in top well known venues and luxury hotels. In 2002 Sue was asked to go to Saudi Arabia to set up the first shop in 'Kingdom Tower', Riyadh. This was a very personal account of Sue's trials and tribulations in breaking new ground in a very different way of life. The shop was very successful and in 2003 Sue was asked to go to Cairo [just at the end of the 2nd Iragi War] to open a new shop, and then to Dubai in 2005. She was responsible for training women staff in all aspects of retail work as well as promoting the sale of the luxury goods, remembering the rules and regulations of the local areas. This was a fascinating insight into the lives of women living in a very different world to us, and the comparison, very thought provoking.

Joy Evitt was our Speaker in June on Women in World War 1 - just one of the varied talks she has given us over the last few years. With a Power Point presentation, she reminded us of the situation for women with poverty rife and fashion was for the very few. With Coco Chanelle starting to design clothes, women were more inclined to try different things. Occupations for women were numbered and many jobs revolved round the textile industry in the North West - mainly as Factory Workers or Dressmakers but also in Nursing and as Housemaids. By 1916 women were needed on the land and in the Forces, also as Nurses and in Ammunition Factories. By then they were taken on for heavy work (jobs which before the War they had been excluded from). Land

jobs as Labourers were plentiful and by 1916 British Summertime started so there were longer hours of daylight for people to work. Factory jobs were amongst the hardest, but it gave women the chance to prove they were more than capable. They would be involved in production of clothing, shoes and boots, waterproof clothing for soldiers and uniforms. Others were trained for firefighting. railway guards and station porters, Bank Tellers or Post Office Sorting Offices. For those who worked in Ammunition Factories, free childcare was available. By 1928 women gained equal voting rights with men. The legacy left to the nation was that women developed new skills and confidence, proving they could take part in the workplace in Society. Consequently, their health improved with better living standards and nutrition

improved as wages increased.

A very interesting evening which members found enthralling and caused several questions to be asked.

The report for our July Meeting will be in the October edition but meanwhile do not forget to come and join us at our Fundraising Evening in September.

New Reeding Woods Group

n the 15th June the New Reeding Woods Group put on a wood craft display at the Horham Fete. Demonstrations of log splitting, wood turning and willow weaving were on display and bird feeders, pegs, stools and whistles were sold as the group demonstrate their woodworking skills.

The second annual Great Crested Newt hunt took place throughout May with the aim of establishing the population age, numbers, sexes and species present in

the pond at Pound Lane Wood. As before, NRWG Chairman David Mitchell and Ecologist Sue Morgan conducted the survey and here is their report. The methodology was extended slightly on the 2018 event:

"Casual observation from members of the public indicated there might be rather fewer adults of all species than evident in the pond than in previous years. This information accorded with similar comments regarding other ponds in the locale. A series of bottle trapping episodes were carried out throughout the month - findings supported these initial observations.

A total of 22 individual fully-developed newts were recorded throughout, of which 9 were Great Crested Newts (GCN); the rest being Smooth Newts.

Male GCN: one male fully grown and two immature. Female GCN: six immature females.

None of the recorded GCNs matched the largest/oldest ones seen in2018. A mass observation event scheduled for 24th May included bottle-traps, netting and DNA analysis, as well as an egg-search among emergent vegetation. 12 volunteers from Environment Agency, water companies and private contractors assisted in the operation. Apart from the fully developed newts listed above, significant numbers of eggs from both

GCN and Smoothies were found together with large numbers of newly emerged newt tadpoles and efts...partially developed newts. These were significantly greater in number than was the case in 2018.

All in all then, a disappointment that mature newt numbers appear to have reduced somewhat this year, counterbalanced by great excitement over the number of eggs and juveniles, promising a bumper newt year in 2020!"

Our Daily Bread

read in its various forms is consumed all over the world. An important source of carbohydrates, it is portable and compact, which helps to explain why it has been an integral part of our diet for thousands of years. Prehistoric man had been making gruel from water and grains, so it was a small jump to start cooking this mixture into a solid form by cooking it on hot stones. A study by the National Academy of Sciences discovered traces of starch (probably from the roots of cattails and ferns) in prehistoric mortar and pestle-like rocks. The roots would have been peeled and dried before being ground into flour, mixed with water and cooked.

Early Agriculture

In the Fertile Crescent (the region in the Middle East which curves around the Persian Gulf, from modern-day southern Iraq through to northern Egypt) centred around wheat, millet, barley and Emmer. But in the Americas, up to the time of Columbus, bread was baked from maize (the only cereal known on that side of

the Atlantic) which they ate in various forms.

The Court Bakery of Ramses III

Wheat had important status in the Ancient Egyptian economy. It was not only used for bread making; it was also a form of currency. Emmer earned its worth from its high fibre content, low gluten content, and organic quality. On the tomb of Ramses III located in the Valley of the Kings, there is a depiction of a baking scene. The drawings show Egyptians pressing grapes with their feet, taking the grape juice into a bakery, where dough was formed into various shapes. The drawings show that once the dough was formed it was placed into a large pot of boiling liquid using two long sticks. After that the boiled bread was placed into a vertical oven where it was baked. To this day, Bagels are boiled before baking. Being the staple of the Egyptian diet, bread and grain were used to pay workers who built the royal tombs. For the peasant and common man, a mixture of flour and water was enough to get them through the day. For the Pharaoh and high priest, bread reflected their noble stature by the addition of honey, fruit and berries, and even

sesame seeds.

Leavening

To leaven is to lighten and in the case of bread this is done by introducing bubbles of gas which expand during cooking. Undoubtedly the first breads were unleavened like matzos, chapattis or tortillas, but it was discovered that if the dough is left for a few hours in warm weather, the organisms that are naturally present, including yeasts, will cause fermentation and



it became common practice to keep back some of one batch of dough in order to inoculate the next. The dough became sour (from the activity of lactic-acid organisms) and the product became known as sour dough bread. It has been reported that the San Francisco bakery 'Boudin' has been using the same mother dough that was first created in 1849.

Yeast

Yeasts are single-celled microscopic fungi. They commonly multiply by budding off daughters - a few kinds simply split in two like bacteria, but they also reproduce sexually to form hybrids. Yeasts are always present in the atmosphere and they are also introduced into the kitchen with fruit and vegetables. Culinary yeasts are classified as wine yeasts, brewer's yeast, baker's yeast, wild yeasts and others and can be kept alive indefinitely by feeding them. Most home bakers rely on Baker's yeast which can be bought fresh, as a compressed substance, or as dried active veast granules.

Chorleywood Industrial Bread Making Process

In 1961 the Chorleywood Process was developed which reduced the time and labour required to make bread, thereby reducing costs. The age of industrial bread was born. Wheat is milled at high speed and high temperatures. This smashes apart the starches making it easier for the enzymes and improvers to work on the flour but reducing the nutritional value. This process also enables the flour to absorb more water. In fact, nearly half of the industrial loaf is water. The flour is then mixed with water, soya flour, fat, baking aids, ascorbic acid (E300) and yeast. According to The Flour Advisory Bureau 57% of us believe the process should be

celebrated as an iconic invention, alongside the likes of the internet, space travel and the mobile phone!

Bread is King

We have seen the rapid growth in artisan bread making and have been encouraged to join the bread revolution. With the success of "Bake Off". Many of us are now making our own daily bread, but whether your choice is a bloomer, chapatti, focaccia or a tortilla, white sliced or sourdough, bread will remain the staff of life to be wrapped around rashers of bacon, used as soldiers to dip into egg or to mop up every last drop of gravy. The world of bread is vast and varied and some form of bread is found in virtually every Society. I agree with Louis Bromfield when he said, "Bread is the king of the table and all else is merely the court that surrounds the king."

My first attempt at making bread using Organic Stoneground Emmer flour. This is a low gluten flour that behaves differently from my everyday white bread flour. The dough looked and felt like sticky clay and after the first prove, I realised I wouldn't get the usual rise. However, the finished bread is delicious with a nutty flavour and less harsh than regular whole-wheat flour. I will definitely use it again perhaps with an overnight prove.

Denham

ince the Parish Council Annual Meeting in May much concern has been expressed at indications of an imminent planning application to construct two very large chicken sheds in Horham and Southolt. Each would accommodate more than 40,000 chickens on a 35-day turnaround and it seems the new facilities would be part of a very large-scale expansion of intensive chicken farming in this part of the county.

A joint meeting has already been held of Council representatives from Denham, Horham, Athelington, Eye, Stradbroke, Redingfield, Worlingworth, Wilby and others in order to see whether a joint campaign can be put together, especially once an actual planning application has been submitted.

Two new facilities on that scale will obviously create a very large and consistent number of truck movements on roads which everyone knows are well short of being able to cope with large lorries. Employment benefits will be minimal as modern intensive poultry production is highly automated.

Quite apart from the obvious noise, smell, and traffic, there is also a very big underlying question about whether Suffolk wants to go further down the road of intensive agriculture, with all the associated questions about animal welfare.

This is going to be an issue of great concern in coming months and all the Parish Councils affected by it will be working hard to keep residents informed and to put together the best possible arguments once the application is

lodged. This will be time-consuming and far from inexpensive; the company or companies behind the project are well-resourced. Parish Councils will be calling on all expert and planning-savvy residents to join the effort.

Meanwhile of course Denham's parallel efforts to restore the Village Hall continue; a new registered charity will soon be formally in existence which will spearhead fund-raising and eventually look after management of the Hall.

Many thanks are due to all the residents who attended the Annual Parish Meeting and offered interesting and constructive reports on their activities.

Residents are welcome to attend all Parish Council meetings and have their say on any matter. The next meeting is on **Wednesday 18th September**, probably in the Church - to be confirmed!

If you would like to help with the renovation of the Hall, or to contact the Parish Council about anything, our Clerk Rod Caird will be happy to hear from you.

Hoxne

PLANNING - representatives from Hoxne Parish Council along with several neighbouring parishes have met jointly to consider the proposed erection of intensive rearing poultry buildings at Horham and Southolt. Further details can be found on the Mid Suffolk District Council planning portal or by referencing recent articles in the local press. The Parish Council received a report of the joint meeting at its July meeting and have voiced initial concerns on the possible impacts on the parish such as increased lorry movements and how waste from the sites will be dealt with. The Parish Council awaits details of the formal planning consultation.

At the August Parish Council meeting, the Council will consider submitting an

application to designate the whole parish area of Hoxne for a Neighbourhood Development Plan. If accepted by the Planning Authority work could commence on creating a Plan which would define areas for possible development and the type of development as well as protecting areas of open space. If you would be interested in working with the Parish Council to develop the Plan please contact the Parish Clerk.

HIGHWAYS - the Parish Council has supported County Councillor McGregor's request of a full safety audit of the B1118 at Chickering. This is following a spate of accidents on this road. Councillor McGregor has also agreed to fund a survey

VILLAGE SIGN - this project remains on schedule and it is hoped that the Hoxne Village Sign will be erected on Low Street Green in time for St Edmund's Day in November.

ur last meeting took place on May 22nd when the newly elected Parish Council had the opportunity to meet Lavinia Hadingham, our new District Councillor. Invitation to Share Speed Sign Data

At Wingfield Parish Council we have been looking at our first year's data downloaded from our Vehicle Activated Speed (VAS) sign positioned at the entrance to the village between Wingfield Green and Vicarage Road.

Over the course of the year it measured the speed of 32,370 vehicles of which 37% were exceeding the speed limit.

What we would like to do is pool our data with other villages in the area and make representation to the police and highways authorities to raise speed awareness in rural areas such as ours. Speed kills and it just needs one speeding car to cause a fatality.

Village Walks...

Upper Weybread and The Angles Way

his walk encompasses everything good about country walking: Rivers, woods, hedgerows, wildflowers; farms and water meadows; Stiles, gates, bridges and friendly cattle and horses.
4.9 miles (4.3 with short-cut) and 200ft of ascent: not too strenuous but route finding takes some care.

Parking: On-street at Brockdish (Specially for the short-cut) or the rough lay-by north of the Syleham bridge. Refreshments: The Old King's Head, Brockdish. Coffee & cakes, lunches and evening meals.

From the lay-by, head into Brockdish and **Turn Right**. Pass the village hall and


Start & Finish: Brockdish Distance: 4.9/4.3 miles OS map: Explorer 230

Turn Right down Common Lane. Follow the lane into Crescent Farm and through it to a bridge over the River Waveney.

Beyond the bridge, take the gated footpath on the Left, which runs diagonally across the field to its corner. The path now bears left and runs straight. In 350 yards find a stile on the Right. Cross this and a bridge, then climb some steps to a path. Turn Left.

The path soon swings right and climbs a hill. Keep a hedgerow on your left, Ignoring a path to the right, and continue over the crest of the hill to a road.

Turn Left onto the road for about 100 yards where you'll find a footpath sign to



the Right. Pass through some trees and Turn Left. Follow the field edge, keeping the hedgerow on your left.

In about 300 yards, a track runs to the right. Here, the official footpath runs straight on then, later, turns right across the field. However, to protect the crop and make it easier on yourself, take the track to the right and then **left** in the field corner. From here, the path runs in a straight line along the field edge then through some trees to a road.

Turn Right then Left at the footpath sign toward Greengate Farm. Pass through the gate of the farm and across its front to find a stile on the Left. Head directly away from the farm, keeping a hedge on your left. Pass through a hedgerow and continue ahead to the corner of a field. Turn Right and

head downhill to find two stiles either side of a plank bridge.

Head diagonally right across a field to another stile / gate. Pass through and follow a rough track through grazing fields,

keeping the river on your right.

Before the brick bridge over the river, bear left and pass through a gate to a road. Turn Left then take the second gate on the Right.

Head diagonally uphill and look for a gate in the corner of the field. Pass through, over a bridge and through another gate. The official path continues ahead then doglegs left. However, the farmer has marked a path diagonally Left from the gate. Take

this. It passes to the right of a hedgerow corner then on to a footbridge which can be seen in the hedgerow as you approach.

Cross the bridge, pass through a gate and, keeping a hedge on your right, descend to a gate and some steps to a road. Turn Left. At a junction keep ahead and where the road bends left, cross a stile ahead.

You are now on the Angles Way: A long distance footpath from Knettishall Heath to Great Yarmouth. It follows the river Waveney from its source to the sea and was voted the finest river walk in England. This section is uninhabited water meadows and grazing land, unchanged in centuries.

The path runs straight from here, keeping the river winding on the right and the valley wall rising on the left.

In a mile, look for a seat and, soon after, a picnic table. Both close to the river in tranguil settings. Continue on the path and you will soon be retracing your steps. When vou return to Common Lane do not re-cross the bridge. UNLESS:

you have parked, on-street, in Brockdish and wish to take

the short cut.

Turn Left. In a few dozen yards take the gate on the Right. Bear left to rise above a line of trees. Keep these trees on your right until you reach a gate and a bridge leading to a covered path to a road. Turn Right.

Pass Syleham House, Turn Right and cross the river back to the lay-by.
