Community space in Syleham

This piece of land is hidden behind the houses opposite Syleham and Wingfield village hall, IP21 4LT. Take the footpath and you will see it just a little way down on the left. It is a small area of grass which has been fenced, and now has tiny hedging plants growing near the fencing.

Occasional working parties will ensure the weeds do not get the better of these delicate plants. We have been lucky enough to have been donated some wood chip to further care for this hedging.

The bug hotel is well established and old railway sleepers are waiting to begin construction of herb and sensory raised beds when the weather dries the area. Many thanks to all who, meanwhile, are acting as plant nurseries!

Three beautiful, donated Silver Birch have been planted and are becoming established. We have a few donated items of seating for you to use.

Take a walk to J's Meadow or, if need be, use the village hall car park. The meadow is available at all times for everyone to enjoy, just use the pedestrian gate.

BRAKEY WOOD, 20 YEARS ON

B rakey Wood was quite an achievement for Hoxne, 20 years ago. It was a Millennium project, organised by the then Parish Council, and at the time, they raised close on £85,000 for the wood and its planting. This in a matter of a few months. No small effort for any village anywhere!

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
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the value of the wood as a community asset. The event was a family day out.


Young Billy Fisher fantasises about leaving his Yorkshire home, his straightlaced parents and his dementia-suffering

Hoxne Playing Field and Pavilion

There are probably many people reading this who are not aware of the background to the Hoxne Playing Field and Pavilion, and so the committee have put together this information about the facilities.

The Background

In 1965 Mr Derek Mager sold an area of land, which is now the village playing field, to the parish of Hoxne for the sole purpose of recreation for the villagers. Part was allocated to the village itself and part to Suffolk County Council for use by St Edmunds Primary School.

A wooden building was purchased and erected soon after this and it was used as the sports pavilion for many years to follow.

The Playing field was registered as a charity in February 1965 under the reference 304769 and named Hoxne Recreation Ground.

Eventually in 1996 a more permanent brick built pavilion was built to replace the old and decaying wooden building.

Then a team of local volunteers, led by Trevor Jackson and David Muttit, spent many evenings and weekends building an extension to the pavilion to create a new bar area. This helped to develop a thriving social club at the pavilion which in the early 2000s had more than 100 members, who would regularly socialise there.

Managing The Playing Field

The Parish Council is the Custodian Trustee for the pavilion and playing field, but the Trust Deed states that the general management of the facilities and arrangements for its use and upkeep "shall be vested in a Committee of Management". This is now knows as the Hoxne Playing Field Management Committee. The Management Committee is a team of eight volunteers who work tirelessly to try and maintain the building and playing field for the community to enjoy. The costs of maintenance and improvements are met through fund



raising by the committee and yearly donations from the Parish Council. It costs approximately £6,000 a year to run the pavilion and playing field. Fund raising activities include, for example, the sale of Christmas Trees, annual plant sales, annual clay shoot, open gardens,

takings from the harvest breakfast, proceeds from the summer play café, social activities and pavilion lets.

In 2014 the committee managed to raise some £50,000 through grants, fund raising and individual donations to replace the ageing play equipment with the excellent children's play area now in place. Safety inspections of the


play equipment take place monthly.



Mary Rose Tudor and St Edmund

ou may ask what connection Mary Rose Tudor has with St Edmund. The answer is that they were both buried in the cathedral church of the Abbey of St Edmund at Bury.

The parentage of St Edmund has not been proven, but he may have been a prince of the house of Wessex or as commonly reported the son of Alkmund and Siware of Saxony. On the death of Edmund reputedly at Hoxne in 869/870, he was buried in a rough wooden chapel for around 30 years before his body was removed to Beodericsworth, which later became St Edmund's Bury.

Mary Rose Tudor [1496-1533] was the daughter of Henry Tudor [1457-1509] and his wife Elizabeth of York [d.1503] and the favourite sister of Henry VIII [1491-1547]. Mary Rose Tudor was initially married to King Louis XII of France [1462-1515] and afterwards to Charles Brandon [1484-1545] Duke of Suffolk a favourite of Henry VIII. The Duke and Duchess of Suffolk chiefly resided at Westhorpe Hall in Suffolk a large moated manor house in West Suffolk.

On her death in 1533, an elaborate funeral was organised, but Charles Brandon her husband did not attend, nor did her brother Henry VIII. Mary Rose died in June 1533 and her body was embalmed and laid in state in the chapel at Westhorpe Hall, before her burial on the 20th July 1533 in the crypt of the Abbey Church. Five years later with the dissolution of the monasteries her body was removed and re-buried at St Mary's Church within the precincts of the Abbey Church.

Edmund's shrine was desecrated and destroyed in 1539 as a result of the English Reformation and by the 4th November 1539 the Abbott and his monks were expelled from the Abbey, having secretly reburied the remains of St Edmund. But was this a sham reburial, as it is also reported that the remains of St Edmund were stolen by the French Count of Melun after the Battle of Lincoln in 1217.

The Count of Melun is said to have subsequently donated the St Edmund remains to the Basilica of Saint-Sernin in Toulouse, where a shrine was ultimately erected to house them. A Basilica inventory from 1425 details St Edmund's body as being interred at Toulouse.

In 1901 relics of the body were returned to England by order of Pope Leo XIII to be placed in the new Catholic Westminster Cathedral that was under construction. These relics were temporarily housed at the Fitzalan Chapel of Arundel Castle, but concerns were raised about their validity and so have been kept locked in the vault.

In 1966, Father Houghton of Bury St Edmunds, who ardently believed in the Arundle relics, attempted to attain them for his parish, but previous concerns on their authenticity halted his plans. Undeterred, he arranged for three teeth from the remaining Toulouse relics to come to England and these are now kept at Douai Abbey, Berkshire.

However, the authorities in Saint-Sernin claim that the box containing St Edmund's body has not been opened for centuries so what of the relics at Arundel and Douai Abbey, surely their provenance cannot be in question?

The Abbey Garden Tennis Courts are being dug up this year to see if the remains of Edmund can be located. Perhaps the dig should instead be at Hoxne or maybe find the burial place of Bishop Humbert as he was killed at the same time as Edmund? While the final resting place of Mary Rose Tudor is accepted, I surmise Edmund's location will stay an enigma.

Hoxne Heritage Group

ast September over 250 members of the local community and some from much further afield visited the Hoxne Heritage Group exhibition commemorating the 80th anniversary of the commencement of World War Two. Some will recall that it was our intention to hold a second exhibition in 2020 to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of end of the War.

Planning for this exhibition is underway and will cover the period from December 1941 to August 1945. For Hoxne these were very eventful years and we hope to provide a snapshot of what life was like in and around the village by using maps, photographs, artefacts, models and personal narratives of events. These will be supported by wartime films and music which, we hope, will re-create a realistic atmosphere.

A significant number of men and women from Hoxne served in the Armed Forces, seven men were killed and are remembered on the War Memorial in the Church. Many more were taken prisoner and endured severe hardships before returning to the village. With the threat of a Nazi landing on the beaches of East Anglia receding, the village geared up for a prolonged war and the exhibition reflects life on the "Home Front" as well as recording more distant campaigns. In June 1943 the village underwent the "friendly invasion" when the Americans arrived to establish the 95th Bomb Group at a newly constructed airbase at Horham. The 95th would go onto to fly 300 missions to Europe and earn three Presidential Citations and make a huge impact on village life.

Visitors to our previous exhibition were most appreciative of the wartime food tasters that were prepared and we intend to continue this success with some new additions to the "menu" so if anyone has any wartime recipes they would like to see prepared please contact us.

So, as we approach the 75th anniversary of both VE and VJ Day, if any of your family has reminiscences, stories or artefacts from the time, we shall be very pleased to hear from you. We already have a number of exhibits, photographs and models kindly donated, but more would be welcome. The exhibition will be held in the Village Hall on **Saturday 5th September** between 10am - 4pm and we look forward to welcoming you all.

Food for Thought

Simply Cheese

"When the kettle was boiling, the old man put a large piece of cheese on a long iron fork, and held it over the fire, turning it to and fro, till it was goldenbrown on all sides. Heidi had watched him eagerly. Suddenly she ran to the cupboard. When her grandfather brought a pot and the toasted cheese to the table, he found it already nicely set with two plates and two knives and the bread in the middle."

Heidi, Johanna Spyri, 1880-1

Daniel M. Mallory, an American author and editor, claimed that 'Heidi' is a book about the healing powers of cheese and that the plucky little girl from the Alps couldn't have gone very far in saving Clara or her dear Grandpapa without the help of dairy. We all know that cheese is a nutritious food made all around the world and not only from cow and sheep milk, but also from water buffalo, goat, camel, vak and even reindeer milk. Cheese is sold pasteurised or raw, plain or flavoured, pickled, processed or even, occasionally, sweet. Your favourite may be cheddar, one of the most popular cheeses made in the U.K, or a smelly cheese such as a German limburger which is fermented using Brevibacterium linen. This bacterium is partly responsible for the smell of the human body, and, as a result, when people say limburger smells like human feet they are scientifically correct.

Cheese has been around for a long time and is thought to have been first discovered around 8000 BC around the time when sheep were first domesticated. Cheese comes in hundreds of varieties and is a food that provides nutrition in the form of vitamins, minerals, and a high-quality source of protein that can be kept for months. Whatever your favourite, most of us will have a chunk or two lurking in the fridge.

Imagine a world without cheese. No Margherita pizza, cauliflower cheese or mac and cheese. No ploughman's lunch or freshly grated parmesan stirred into pasta. No crockery crowned with a crispy and brown dome of cheese. Where would the Welsh be without their rabbit (original spelling) and the folk of Coopers Hill without an 8lb ball of double Gloucester to launch themselves after every spring! Life without cheese dishes wouldn't be half as good. Here are just two of my favourites.

Garlicky Prawns with Feta

Serves 2 as a main course or 4 as a starter with a green salad and crusty bread to soak up the juices 450g raw prawns, peeled if whole and de-veined 20g butter 1 tbsp mild olive oil 2 garlic cloves, peeled and finely chopped



2 tbsp chopped curly leaf parsley Juice of 1 fresh lemon1 pinch of salt125g crumbled Feta cheese

Chop the butter into pieces and scatter on the bottom of a heavy lidded pot. Scatter over half the prawns followed by half the garlic, parsley and salt. Drizzle over ½ tbsp olive oil. Repeat this process with the remaining ingredients. Cover the pot and put over a medium heat. Cook for 8 minutes or until the prawns have lost their raw colour. Pour over the lemon juice and scatter the crumbled feta on top. Replace the lid and shake the pan. Leave for 1 minute and serve

Double Baked Cheese Soufflé

Makes 5 approximate depending on the size of the ramekins - they freeze really well

125ml full fat milk and 125ml double cream combined 60g cornflour 45g butter 2 eggs whole 2 eggs - separated/whites whisked to stiff peaks 250g gruyere Cheese, grated 1 heaped tbsp finely chopped flat leaf parsley Salt & pepper to taste Butter to grease ramekins, plus Grated parmesan for ramekins

For Sauce per soufflé 60ml double cream Heaped dessertspoon grated Parmesan Reggiano cheese

Butter the ramekins and sprinkle insides with grated Parmesan. Gently melt butter in large non- stick pan and stir in flour to make a roux. Gradually add the milk & cream mixture until you have a thick sauce. Add grated gruyere cheese



and stir over gentle heat until the sauce is smooth. Put to one side and cool slightly. Stir in beaten whole eggs and extra egg yolks. Gradually fold in the egg whites. Season to taste, add chopped parsley and stir through gently. Gently fill ramekins to the top with the soufflé mixture. Place the filled ramekins in a baking dish and pour in sufficient hot water to come halfway up the sides of the dishes. Bake for 20 minutes at 180C until brown and well risen. Allow to cool and turn out onto a tray.

To Double Bake:

Turn the soufflé out into individual oven proof dishes with the brown top on the base of the dish.

Pour enough double cream over the soufflé to come to about a $\frac{1}{2}$ inch up the soufflé.

Sprinkle the whole dish thickly with grated Parmesan cheese and bake at 180C for about 10-15mins or until the cream thickens and the soufflé is nicely glazed. This dish also pairs well with a green salad and crusty bread.

ourier fraud occurs when a fraudster contacts a victim by telephone and purports to be a police officer, bank or from a government department, among other agencies. A number of techniques will then be adopted in order to convince the victim to hand over their bank details or cash, which may then be passed on to a courier.

Residents are reminded that neither your bank nor the police will ever ask you to withdraw money or purchase items.

Further advice is offered below:

• Your bank or the police will never ask for your PIN, bank card or bank account details over the phone - never give these details to anybody.



• Neither the police nor the banks will send a courier to collect money from you.

• Always request Photo ID and if unsure call the police.

• If you're asked to telephone a bank, then always do it on a different phone to the one you were contacted on. Fraudsters will keep the line open and have been known to play ringtones, hold music and a recorded message down the phone so the victim believes they are making a call to a legitimate number. Use a friend or neighbour's telephone instead.

• Never download any software suggested by caller.

• Do not rush into complying to the scammers demands / requests.

• Friends, family, carers and neighbours are asked to spread the word to ensure everyone is aware of this scam and what they should do.

• If you have already given your bank details over the phone or handed your card details to a courier, call you bank straight away to cancel the card.

Denham

ork on fundraising for renovation of the Village Hall has now begun in earnest after the process of registering the site on behalf of the Parish was officially completed. We have a number of people supporting this, but any additional volunteers would be greatly appreciated.

We currently have three groups working on different strands of the project so that we can try to progress things as quickly as possible. The local fundraising group is busy writing to local businesses and planning events, the first of which is a Cheese and Wine Party to be held from 7:30pm on **Saturday 4th April** at Horham Community Centre. Tickets are £6.50 in advance and are available from Kerina on **07766 454997**. There will also be a raffle on the night and donations of prizes would be gratefully accepted.

The grant funding group is busy completing applications with the support of Mid Suffolk District Council and has currently identified £2,800 of funding which has been ringfenced for the project. We are now in the process of beginning applications for both Community Grant Funding and Heritage Lottery funding to apply for the larger grants needed to complete the project. Our third group is looking at the building specifications for the project in preparation for final costing and invitations to bid for the renovation work. Part of this work will also look at preserving the artwork on the inner wall of the building and possible plans for the outdoor space.

Alongside this, we are creating a dedicated website for the work of Denham Community Council, including the renovation progress, so that we can keep everyone updated. Please visit:

he County Council has commissioned a Working Group to look at the concerns of the impact of HGVs on the quality of life in rural villages. Planning At the time of writing, the detailed application for the erection of four large dwellings at Abbey Hill has been withdrawn, however, the application for five dwellings at the former Goldbrook Plants site has been refused by the Planning Authority. The Parish Council continues to make recommendations to the Planning Authority, as per its statutory duty, and for both the above applications the Parish Council's recommendation was refusal. Reasons for these recommendations and details of all applications considered can be found in the Parish Council minutes published on the website and noticeboards.

Neighbourhood Development Plan the Working Group are determining priorities for the plan and initial thoughts on policy development are to include: Protect the open spaces on the village; look at opportunities for development critically, no big developments and define a firm development boundary; protect the heritage of the village and conserve its history; prevent development at Downbridge and Nuttery Vale; protect the environment and guality of life and support and encourage small businesses providing services. What are your thoughts. The Parish Council will be offering several opportunities to engage with priority setting and we hope that we will hear as many thoughts as possible.

Syleham

U first meeting of 2020 took place on March 4th where we discussed the projects conducted by councillors over the winter.

Firstly, Steve Phillips gave a comprehensive report on his survey of the village's footpaths and their signage. Steve has been working with the footpaths department of Suffolk Highways. We await their plan for restoration of both the paths and the missing signs. The network of pathways is a rich heritage of Syleham village, and we hope to be publishing a map and posting on the noticeboard and website for everyone to use.

Councillor and chairman Malcolm Flounders has been progressing the provision of grit bins for the village. Thanks to funding by MSDC we have been able to purchase three bins to be located in the village at sites agreed with Suffolk Highways.

The night before this Council meeting, councillors from both Wingfield and Syleham met in joint discussion about progressing the Housing Need Survey. This was convened with Community Action Suffolk who outlined the pathway to execution. The result was serious concerns about the applicability to our villages. An alternative approach will be discussed with our colleagues in Wingfield.

It has been raised with the Council that a RAF Lancaster bomber crashed in Syleham on the night of 18th May 1944 killing the eight-man crew. It was agreed that the Council would liaise with the RAF Memorial Trust the best way to commemorate their sacrifice and aim to execute by VE Day on Friday 8th May.

The next PC meeting will take place on **Wednesday 20th May**, at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

ur first meeting this year took place on January 24th with a full agenda and our District Councillor Lavinia Haddingham, in attendance.

The meeting began with Lavinia's report that headlined an increase of 1.66% to Council tax for 2020/21.

The village agenda began with discussion of a Housing Need Survey to protect the village against development that did not address resident's needs. The subsequent meeting with

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Community Action Suffolk, held on March 3rd, raised concerns of suitability for Wingfield. An alternative approach is now being discussed with our counterparts in Syleham.

Planning the upkeep of Wingfield Green awaits the proposed grazing of the Green with sheep. It was agreed that these proposals will be discussed with concerned residents before final approval.

The new noticeboard for Vicarage Road has been ordered and we await delivery and erection. Our thanks to Lavinia for her MSDC locality award that funded the purchase.

New street signs have been ordered for Earsham Street and Castle Crescent and the track running alongside Goulders Farm has been designated as a road and will be called Goulders Farm Lane.

A resident's suggestion that places of village interest such as "Nanny Bradshaw's Corner" should be commemorated was agreed and ways to mark their contribution to Wingfield's colourful history will be investigated.

The Clerk reported that discussions with the owners of Castle Farm about acquiring land for a playground was a possibility, but awaits their experience with the new agricultural legislation expected post Brexit.

VE Day (75th anniversary) celebrations will take place at the Village Hall on **Friday 8th May.** Look out for details to be posted on the hopefully new noticeboard.

At the end of our meeting, with the District Councillor in attendance, we discussed the long running complaint against the Council by one resident. The conclusion to these deliberations is posted on the website.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on **Friday 29th May** at 7.30pm at Wingfield Barns.

here must be something about a Lunch Bunch visit that makes it rain. It was a miserable morning when we set off to visit the Oaksmere. We hadn't booked as we decided they were big enough to be able to squeeze one table in whatever they were doing mid-week in February!

They have a restaurant and you can also eat in the bar - we opted for the bar and the fire! The staff were friendly and chatty, and we quickly checked over the menu and ordered. While sharing platters were tempting as starters, we headed straight for the main courses.

Here, like the Swan from the last issue, the Oaksmere have opted for the "slate" plates for some of their offerings. The chicken and Halloumi burgers we ordered did look lovely on them, but I'm sure a normal plate would make everyone's lives simpler. Along with the burgers we ordered the traditional Fish & Chips which was presented on an oblong plate.

The food was hot and delicious. The chicken "burger" was actually a chicken breast fillet squeezed into the bun along with salad. The halloumi burger a thick slice of the delicious squeaky cheese on a large flat mushroom, again with salad in a bun, both served with a bowl of chips. The fish was served on top of chips, on top of crushed peas and a small sea of the best tartar sauce we have tried in a long time. The chips as perfect as a fried potato can be, crispy on the outside and hot and fluffy on the inside.

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A Word from Wingfield

Books

here are a lot of books here in my library, so many that I have lost count. Using the librarians trick, I measured the total library shelf length which was about 300 feet, then assuming an average 10 books per foot, that's 3000 books!

The biggest part of the collection is 'literature' arranged author alphabetical by a helpful local scholar making that major section very user-friendly. The rest are roughly assembled by topic and territory e.g. religion or Africa, but although I could not find Pitman's 'Snakes of Uganda' I did spot Hawkings' best selling 'Brief History of Time'. It is more than 30 years since I read it, so made another attempt. Sagan's introduction remarks that few of us spend much time wondering why nature is the way it is; where the Cosmos came from, or whether it was always here; if time will one day flow backward and effects precede causes; or whether there are ultimate limits to what humans can know.

Then the 'phone rang. It was my Workaway driver/companion from Brazil saying it was Ash Wednesday, a public holiday and day 3 of carnival. She handed the phone to her father who is my age, who said to my astonishment "Greetings" and then "Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could reverse time and both be young again".

H.G. Wells' 'The Time Machine' posited time travel both backwards and forwards through time. Is our concept of time, and space too, an illusion? Our consciousness places us at the centre of our perceived universe. Just as the Ancients until quite recently believed that the earth was at the centre of the cosmos, many still see themselves at the centre of the world about them. For convenience we devise frames of reference such as postal codes for the GPO and the Greenwich meridian for navigation, but we don't yet have one for the cosmos.

The possibility of runaway global warming could soon become a probability, in which event these may well be our grandchildren's end times, something we don't like to think about, though they are now expressing their concern. Then there will be no-one to ask or to answer these big questions.

But back to books. My library reference section has fallen into disuse. Google has replaced it so my 14th edition of the Encyclopaedia Britannica gathers dust. However the 22 pages on Brazil, written in 1929 by a Professor Martin of Palo Alto just after the Americans bought the Encyclopaedia Britannica and it became in effect the Encyclopaedia Americana, describe a very different country from the one that I explored during five weeks over last Christmas.

Martin states that there is no general history of Brazil in English. Looking back to the sixties I recall that our academic interest in South America was even then indeed modest. Since then Brazil has developed apace and is now very evidently one of the so-called five BRICS countries (Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa). The population of 30 million recorded by Martin is now more than 300 million. We must thank God that the hostile climate for foreigners which politicians are fostering in so many other countries has not yet infected Brazil, where there is a racial spectrum that spreads from Africa and indigenous Indians to Europe. It came into being over 400 years ago and the Brazilian version of Roman Catholicism appears to play an important role in cementing the nation together. Of course there are challenges e.g. the favelas with extreme

poverty, but this very resource rich and enormous country is an example to us all.

In Brasília there is a memorial mausoleum to President Juscelino Kubitschek (1956 - 61) containing many of his personal possessions, including items of his and his wife's wardrobe, and his immense library in which I spotted 10 volumes of an early Shakespeare folio given to him long ago by our Queen which the Curator allowed me to inspect. His better known memorial is of course the extraordinary buildings which dominate, designed by Oscar Niemeyer. Brasília surpasses Canberra.

And now that the House of Commons need a new home, will SW1 be able to do likewise? And if so, where will it be located? Can our North-South imbalance be levelled out?

Perhaps this can be achieved electronically with new thinking about how we live in time and space, recognising that the time has come to bring an end to travel to work and to holidays. We should perhaps be fostering our villages, nurturing the countryside, and focusing on the renewal of brown land and converting empty high street shops and stores into housing in our towns and cities. The time has come to rethink High Speed Rail and the widening motorways using emergency lanes.

In bygone days, one usually married a local, someone from the next village or town. But then travel by rail, bike and the internal combustion engine broadened our horizons. Now even press advertisements and the internet are in use to help us find a soulmate.

So what will happen to books and libraries? Do we need them when we can Google what we are looking for?

The National Trust has just realised that the books in the little used show-off libraries of their wealthy donors may be a treasure trove of rare books with a considerable monetary value. To give a local example, Amazon recently advertised a copy of Rev J.J. Raven's 'Church Bells of Suffolk' for £500. Canon Raven was the Vicar of Fressingfield with-Withersdale. Only 500 copies were printed in the first impression, so they have a hypothetical value of £ 1/4 million. Betty Syrett who encouraged us to ring in the Millennium, sold her copy for £100 to help fund the restoration of the Wingfield bells.

I suspect that the National Trust is sitting on a gold mine of books provided it allows them to continue to gather dust and does not flood the market.


