Dare to hope

s I write this, the children are going back to school and we are taking the first step towards easing lockdown restrictions. Those of us who are over 55 will probably have had our first vaccination and the roll-out continues. We still take every precaution

On February 23rd we were fortunate to be able to join an online presentation by Rebecca Ellis a PhD student from Hull University working with the Roman Roads Research Association speaking on the subject of Iron Age Art including information on a bovine mount artefact of international importance discovered by one of our members ,now on display at West Stow Museum. A link to Rebecca's talk will be available on our website shortly.

Doubtless to many this may not sound like a worthwhile alternative to *Top Gear* or *Who Wants to Be A Millionaire*. Far from it, Rebecca proved to be an excellent speaker with an infectious enthusiasm which kept us all fully engaged throughout the forty five minute presentation.

New Reeding Woods Group

s the days lengthen and spring starts to be noticeable around us there is a lot to see. At the woods, there is a notebook to allow visitors to record their sightings. These are not always predictable - both Elvis and Father Christmas have been seen there.

Looking through the notes I was grateful to see a woodcock recorded as I saw one two weeks ago and was pleased

to have another record of it.
Spring sightings around the pond have included newts, bright blue damsel flies, broad bodied chaser and emperor dragonflies and water boatmen.

The birds are more active now and sightings in previous years have listed the yellow hammer with its song of "a little bit of bread and no cheese". Bullfinches, Chaffinches and the colourful Goldfinch also are to be seen in the wood. The owl box in the corner hopes to attract a barn owl to make a home there. Green woodpeckers are often to be seen on the meadow. Blackbirds and robins sing



along the rides. Blue tits, Great tits, wrens and sparrows are resident attracting the kestrel seen hovering over the pond.

Primroses have

been seen as early as January, common spotted orchids have been seen in the lane, bee orchids seen by the pond where yellow flag irises bloom. Butterflies including tortoiseshells, brimstone, red admiral, comma and a group of seven peacock butterflies sunbathing on the log

pile. A great variety of bees have been noted including Goodens nomad, Andrena or the mining bee, garden bumble bee, red tailed bumblebee. A pipistrelle bat was spotted by a

keen-eyed observer and another enviable sighting was of a male kingfisher by the pond. Field mice were spotted by visiting Brownies.

We still have grey cold days, but

hopefully this list of sightings will encourage further visits as the weather improves. Please record your sightings as they provide an invaluable record for the group.

Denham

enham has been working closely with Hoxne to designate Quiet Lanes for the benefit of both communities and of visitors. Under the County scheme certain routes can be identified and signposted to make it clear to drivers that these roads are used a lot by walkers and horse-riders. In the words of the Quiet Lanes website:

"A Quiet Lane is a nationally recognised designation of single track road (i.e. no line markings), typically with less than 1,000 vehicle use per day. Quiet Lanes EXPECT the lane to be used by a variety of people, animals and transport, and to RESPECT each others' rights to considerate road use!"

The two routes in Denham are Church Road and Low Road - the latter of course runs through into Hoxne, which is why the two parishes are collaborating on the scheme. Both now appear on the official website and there will shortly be an opportunity for residents of both parishes to have a say before the status is confirmed and signage installed. There will be no cost to the Parish.

The benefits of safer walking, cycling and riding routes are obvious - and the two chosen lanes open up great opportunities for local people and visitors to take advantage of the whole footpath network in our area, visiting Hoxne's facilities as well as the historic Denham Church and our World War II heritage sites as well.

We will publicise the consultation as soon as possible and there will also be an open public meeting (probably on Zoom, because of the coronavirus restrictions).

It's worth stressing that Quiet Lanes don't ban vehicles altogether, but the signage and designation is intended to make clear to drivers that there are other users of the roads which deserve equal consideration, to help them enjoy the countryside. Quiet Lanes are therefore part of an overall strategy to improve the experience of all road users and people who live near our roads.

The May meeting of the Parish Council will be held on **Wednesday 26th May** at 7.30pm. This will also be the Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council. In line with national and local guidance, Parish Council meetings are currently being held online in the interests of the safety of all those attending. But it's very likely that after May, we can return to meeting in person.

Meetings are still open for everyone who would like to have their say on anything, or just to listen to what's going on - joining instructions can be obtained from the Clerk. If you don't have a decent online connection, you can still take part by phone.

interest. Whilst the Neighbourhood Development Plan can allocate land use, there will need to be a certain level of interest before the Parish Council can use its legal powers to provide allotments.

At the March Parish Council meeting, it was agreed to provide financial and practical support for the Hoxne in Bloom initiative and we look forward to progressing planting at areas such as Low Street Green shelter, Cross Street well and the redundant phone kiosk on Denham Road. This coincides with recent maintenance work at the Community Orchard on Wittons Lane, where it is hoped parishioners will visit to not only see the fruit trees in bloom, but to later in the year harvest some of the apples and pears.

big thank you to all our residents who have helped their neighbours get through this difficult time of COVID-19. Also, our thanks to the Suffolk Community Foundation who granted us the funds to offer free transport to the vaccination centres. An offer we can now extend to all adults in the village for the remainder of the vaccination programme.

During this enforced lockdown, the Council has taken a serious review of financing investment in Syleham.

Recent improvements such as the new noticeboard, grit bins, speed sign and website have all been funded by grants from third parties. Sources that will be more difficult to access in the future.

Our own income comes from the Precept, an annual payment of just £1,600. It no longer covers the cost of administration and statutory payments for insurance and professional fees.

This income has hardly changed for ten years and has fallen to just 33% of precept levels charged by neighbouring parishes. We have had to take action to correct this imbalance as you will see in

your Council Tax statement for 2021/22. This increased funding will not only ensure financial viability but also help us support the innovations planned for the new financial year.

The village was not only hit by COVID but also flooding in January. A disaster that Syleham and the District Council was clearly unprepared.

A group of qualified residents led by Leslie Hastie has offered to prepare a Flood Prevention Plan for the village and want to present this at the Annual Parish Meeting. The Council wants to support this initiative.

Recent planning decisions have demonstrated the importance of our network of footpaths in protecting the character of our village. To strengthen this defence, we intend to refurbish the signage and encourage all residents to enjoy walking the paths.

Finally, we have the first data from the speed sign for the period August 2020 to January 2021. It measured 16,500 vehicle movements through the village. 30% of which were travelling at over 35mph, fast enough for an endorsement. Drive carefully and keep safe.

Covid restrictions willing, we plan to have a "virtual" Parish Council meeting on Friday 26th March (details to be posted on the noticeboard and website) and a "normal" Annual Meeting on Wednesday 26th May.

Wingfield

ur last meeting in December was conducted by "Zoom", a first for the Parish Council. It began with a big thank you to the COVID Support team and those individually who have supported our more vulnerable neighbours. We repeat this expression of gratitude in March along with appreciation of the Suffolk

Community Foundation grant that has enabled us to offer free transport to vaccination centres. An offer we can extend to the end of May.

Despite the lockdown the Council has made progress in bringing a defibrillator to the village. In short time, electricity will be reconnected to the phone box enabling us to install the resuscitation unit at a total cost of £4,000. Training in its use will be held at the Village Hall

If COVID-19 was not enough, flooding has affected both Church Road and Low Road. The former requires unblocking of drainage ditches and the latter the building of functional drainage and reengineering the camber of the road. Both Suffolk Highways and adjacent land owners have been informed of the work required.

Work on "topping" the Green has been completed according to our rotation scheme that includes the establishment of an untouched area for the study of flora and fauna.

The planters on Castle Crescent Green have been rejuvenated with new planting by Eleanor Carroll and her team. Our thanks to them all for the uplifting result.

Our quest for land suitable for a children's play area continues. Watch this space for developments.

The costs involved in supporting the Council's work and deliver against our responsibilities to residents continues to increase when funding from elsewhere is becoming more restricted. Our income requirements for 2021/2022 are reflected in the increase to the Precept to be announced in the Council Tax statement you will receive in March.

Our next meetings are to be held "virtually" on Friday 19th March and "normally" on Friday 21st May at Wingfield Barns at 7.30pm, COVID willing!

A Word from Wingfield

Brasil

ome years ago I advertised in the Friend, a quaker weekly, for someone willing to become my live in carer (not a wife), unsalaried, but with free accommodation and food. I saw it as an affordable solution in old age with a pension. The alternative of moving into an institution was beyond my means and too constraining. I imagined that out there among the UKs 70,000 Quakers there would be someone in similar circumstances in need of board, lodging and companionship with a similar outlook. I did not think a dating agency would produce a suitable list of applicants.

The editor asked me whether I would like to receive applications as they arrived, or all together, which he thought would be fairer, as I would not then just accept the first applicant.

A month later he rang to say he had not had any response and suggested I readvertise and offered me a discount for the second ad. This didn't work either so I tried to work out why. Did older women have insights into men which they had not had when they were younger? Were there no women Quakers in need of board and lodging? What

were my real motives? Was I a soulmates seeker?

My daughter told me there were other possibilities e.g. Workaway was a very respectable organisation which matched hosts and guests. She offered to enrol me as a host and to trawl the responses and find me a guest. She was successful, and a I had a series of guests from around the world, young and old, who stayed with me for different periods. There was an understanding of doing 5 hours work per day, a wonderful bonus. The first, a retired builder built a library. There was an enthusiastic gardener, another a gastronome, and one a writer.

The final Workaway a lawyer/civil servant became a host and invited me to Brasil. Although I have travelled widely including Guyana and the Caribbean, I had never been to Brasil.

I had read a story before the war, a Book Society choice sent to us in Uganda, called "Brazilian Adventure" an account of how as a young man, Peter Fleming, lan's brother, went on an expedition to the Amazon to find Colonel Fawcett who disappeared ten years previously. He failed, but wrote an excellent account of the search, its dangers and difficulties.

I was astonished by Brasil. It is an amazing country with a unique past. It belied all I knew about Empire and Colonialism

It has come under the radar here recently because of COVID and Bolsonaro. It has vast resources and territory. Its people are fascinating. I decided to make a second visit and post COVID restrictions a third. I scribbled a diary and the following is an extract.

We travelled inland, together with many trucks, some double length and impossible to pass when in convoy, some 200 miles to Araxa to spend New Year local style in a big rural hotel in coffee/cattle country. The hotel building is literally palatial. The dining room is a

double cube, (twice the size of the Whitehall banqueting hall where Charles I lost his head). The solid walnut lifts are 90 years old.

Swimming in the blue tiled deep underground pool, I was reminded of a similar experience in Baden back in 1955 where Nazi-like medical assistants in white, imposed strict time limits in the water in case one turned to stone. Everywhere seems to have local marble floors, often with unnecessary red carpets, and much use of blue ceramic tiles with distant echoes of Delft.

This really massive building stands in extensive grounds surrounding a lake, surely the reason for the original investment. Getting in past security took 5 minutes. Eventually the gatekeeper tolled on a large bell (Lutine like, as if to announce the sinking of another ship) and we drove into the porte-cochere. We were then taken over by porters of different grades their ranking indicated by the number of rings on their uniform. One introduced me to his boss, a four ringed bell captain.

On arrival, one is wrist-tagged just like on a family prison visit. Luggage was commandeered and stickered with the room number and wheeled away. We were escorted to the lifts and briefed on the extensive facilities, and arranged to swim before shutdown. We were admitted to the pool, and a wheel chair was ordered to whisk me back to room 4342. I had managed the long walk to the pool but feared I would not be able to get back, or would get lost in the carpeted marble corridors with no TomTom to guide me. Lost in the Catacombs!

I find the people of Brasil a great fascination, what I shall call their colour spectrum, and, at least with those I met, seemed to be a classless society. They provide more information about their persons than you would encounter in northern Europe, since they are less clothed, and what they wear is revealing in many ways. Wearing a great variety of colourful clothing, as if part of a fashion parade, almost always reveals the half-contained person, both male and female. All these different fashion models mix and match in a delightful racial-well-mannered, seemingly classless, melting pot. Ever present are their phoneless well-behaved children.

Am I blinkered here by social financial layering? Maybe, but so far this is the persistent experience. The most overwhelming impression is of the racial spectrum, across the range from black to white, but also in facial types from Africa all the way to old Europe. It would be an impossible challenge for our racial nations to decide who to send back to their home country, were they ever ambitious to do so. Words are inadequate to get this across, so I shall have to do some furtive photography to make the point.

I have not yet been able to form a view on the other half of the people, who live in favelas, nor about the ticking time bomb which they must surely represent. Will this evident skewed wealth distribution lead to an explosion? My host's son (a surgeon) has offered to guide my reading on Brasil's future socio-economic implications to try and satisfy my curiosity, as my experience so far is constrained by language, and polite conversation.

Since writing this, I have engaged a teacher in Belo Horizonte to teach me Portuguese so that I can find out more on my third post COVID visit. 70 lessons, three per week extend beyond language into history, culture, politics, etc. She is a brilliant teacher (retired) whom I hope to meet in the flesh rather than on Zoom. Manaus on the Amazon is where I really wish to go pace Peter Fleming.
