

oxne resident, Jeremy
Macdonogh, will launch his new
book 'Mind the Gap' at

Rejoicing and lament

By the time you read this we hope that we will be able to meet indoors, gather in groups of up to 30 outdoors, attend events and even possibly go on holiday. If Covid 19 infections remain low, there will be much to rejoice about. And we will indeed be rejoicing and giving thanks to God in our churches and with events over the summer.

At the same time, we remember all we have lost over the last 15 months, most painfully those who have died. We are also aware of the challenges still to come. Many continue to suffer the physical and mental effects of the virus and the lockdown and many are facing financial anxiety and uncertainty. There is much cause for lament as well as rejoicing.

The psalms express every human emotion through the whole spectrum from lament to rejoicing. From the desolation of Psalm 22, which Jesus quoted on the cross: 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' to the consolation and reassurance of Psalm 147: 'The Lord... heals the broken hearted and binds up all their wounds' and the final outpouring of praise in Psalm 150: 'Let everything that has breath praise the Lord. St Peter and St Paul, Hoxne

ur Parochial Church Council met on 11th May to consider what steps we should take next to renovate the church and to restore the village bells, bearing in mind the responses we had received to our recent consultation leaflet, which was so kindly circulated by Village Voice. Those responses offered support for our plans but one respondent rightly pointed out that the plans in that leaflet were still pretty vague and that we should continue to keep the parish involved as they develop. We very much agree. So here are the resolutions which we passed unanimously on 11th May:

 To ensure that all the outstanding work identified as Health and Safety matters, as requiring immediate attention or as requiring attention in the next 12 months and the next 18-24 months in the July 2019 Quinquennial Inspection (that's our five yearly inspection of the building by the church architect which identifies all the repairs and maintenance we need

- to do) are completed as soon as possible;
- To explore with the architect and with Smart Garden Offices the option of installing one of their buildings outside the North Door of the church as a lavatory building. You can find their catalogue here:
 - smartgardenoffices.co.uk/catalogue We should emphasise that this is only an option and we are exploring it because building a permanent extension to the church looks likely to be extremely expensive, we want to improve our loo quickly and we are not attracted to the idea of having a lavatory actually inside the church;
- To provide a lighted pathway that is accessible for people with disabilities from the car park to the north door;
- 4. To complete the St Edmund chapel by installing an altar, icon and votive candle stand and a tapestry illustrating the martyrdom of St Edmund;
- 5. To move the organ from its current position to the north aisle under the second bay from the East and to reopen the West Door. We need to move the organ to restore the bells as well as reopening the west door;
- 6. To restore and rehang the existing five church bells, to accept the kind offer from the Keltek charity of a further two bells and to seek to provide a ring of eight bells in all, to be hung in the current clock chamber on a new steel bell frame while conserving the wooden frame above and installing a ringing simulator which will enable ringers to practise silently;
- 7. To move the existing clock mechanism to the chamber below the existing clock chamber in order to provide space for the new bell frame we would not of course be moving the clock face!
- 8. To build a ringing platform under the bell tower with access provided by

cutting through from the existing tower staircase and to provide a glazed meeting room beneath the platform which will still allow the West Door to be used for special occasions;

- To develop new ways of displaying the history of the village in the church in partnership with the Hoxne Heritage Group;
- 10.To redecorate the church and to conserve the mediaeval wall painting;
- 11.To set out these plans as they develop in more detail for parishioners to ensure that they retain their support and to be ready to amend them if necessary;
- 12.And to seek faculties that's permission from the church authorities who approve these things and any other necessary permissions and to seek funding from the Lottery, from other funding bodies and from the public accordingly.

This is a very ambitious programme and is all of course subject to the necessary faculties being obtained and funds being raised. We shall not at any point make commitments which we cannot afford. So these resolutions are statements of intent not binding contracts and, if you have views about

any of these proposals, please do not hesitate to contact us.

Finally, we are most grateful to all those who are already seeking to support the restoration of the bells including *The Swan* and others for all the fundraising events which they are planning.

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John Parker

A master of the horse

ohn was quite a character. They don't come like this any more these days. He had a heart of gold behind his bluff manner. I recall the 1987 gale blew down Wingfield's church flagpole, so I got an estimate for a fibre glass replacement with a steel liner inside so that we might resume its function to celebrate and send a message round the village. When John got wind of the flagpole he wrote out a cheque for £250 and sent it to me saying it was because he could see the tower from his stables.

John was made for horses, a cavalry man. He cut his teeth in the Royal Army Service Corps and then went on from strength to strength. That army start like for so many, determined his life. He was an excellent manager and did an (oversubscribed) illustrated lecture of his life to fund raise for the church renovation. We saw John the stuntman showing film stars how to fall off horses and survive.

His kind heart was evident in his work for riding for the disabled. His cars trundled through the village regularly and reminded us of the horse power of yesteryear. So did his remarkable reenactments of the Royal Mail Coaches of which only John was capable -





mobilising his Suffolk friends at the stage points to change the horses and enabling John in the driving seat to cover the ground at record speed.

John taught people to drive. One of his pupils wrote a book about this. It was rumoured that he taught the Duke of Edinburgh to drive too. He wintered greys from the Royal mews in the meadows at Swingletree stables for the Master of the Horse.

The lovely picture of him driving the coach captures his Dickensian character, wearing his short top hat and a cold weather cloak.

The tack room at Swingletree should be preserved in a rural museum even if the skills which were deployed there are lost. His love and understanding of horses is deeply embedded in homo sapiens.

John once enquired after my Morris Minor number plate 'JAP' - I don't know whether there is a coach and horses in heaven, but John's initials can be seen travelling across the Yorkshire moors.

New Reeding Woods Group

he days are getting longer, although not warmer but spring is well underway at the wood. The ground is dryer now and the sun and showers have encouraged new growth. There will be work to do later in the season when we are permitted to meet up again.

The pond has refilled after the low levels seen last summer and the snails are busy on the pond weed. The cherry blossom looked glorious against the blue sky. Blackbirds and larks were in full

The Eastern Daily Press have £20,000 to give away to local charities and we need your help to collect tokens to increase our share of the pot. All you need to do is collect the tokens printed in the EDP and participating papers from April 26 to July 3. These will then be collected, counted up, and the money will be shared proportionately to how many have been saved for each of the different charities.

Any money 1st Fressingfield Scout Group receive will be used for the ground works to enable the installation of our New HQ building.

The Camp and Cook Mission which we started during the first lockdown has been completed by 15 people to date, 3 Leaders, 1 Explorer, 4 Scouts, 6 Cubs and a Beaver. The Mission is to camp and cook in a home camp in every month of the year. Gold is awarded if all camps are outdoors and Silver if any are indoor camps in a den - no beds allowed and no cooking using electricity. Members have slept in igloos, bivouacs and tree houses as well as tents and woken up to bright sunshine, gusty winds, rain, fog, blizzards and ice. Beavers camp in an indoor den and only have to prepare their own breakfast rather than cook for a Bronze.

We have recently made significant progress with the new Headquarters project and we hope to have the modular building on site by the end of the summer.

The Scout Archive Project is going well. It seems Scouting was started in Fressingfield in 1908 by Roland James Milleville Raven-Hart -the vicar's son. That will make it one of the earliest Groups in the country, only one year after Lord Baden-Powell's first experimental camp. At the time there were Scouts in Hoxne and many other villages. There is an image of a newspaper cutting which references Hoxne Scouts on our website.

We are interested in knowing about the involvement of Doctor and Mrs Chase who were Scout and Cub Leaders in the sixties. Other than a few old Scouting books in our library with Dr Chase's name inside, and odd comments from former members, we have no records, so we would like to hear from anyone that has any memories, anecdotes or even just dates when they were part of the Group.

ately I've been walking to Wingfield Green with our older dog, Ben. He's 11 years old now so he really should be slowing down, shouldn't he? To what I believe is the west side of the Green, is a footpath that runs diagonally across the grass from the bottom of Lee's drive towards Warren Farm House.

Following the 'tram lines' is the easiest, flattest place to walk.

In front of you, on the other side of the concrete track you'll see two silver birches, a few other shrubs and a little stone bench. There's a

small sign denoting Jubilee Wood 2012. Take a few minutes, or more, to sit on the bench! Have you seen how big the sky is?! The clouds are sometimes large and fluffy, sometimes dark and angry! Just look at them. Have you seen how many rabbits are so undisturbed that they ignore you, and your dog, and pop out to go about their business once you sit down quietly? Ben loves it, and would love it more if he was allowed to chase the rabbits!

There's a huge swathe of cowslips running from the road towards the pond at the back of this part if the green, many more than I've seen in previous years, and in the 'ditch' near the concrete track there are several Lady's Smock, which always remind me of the annual Candytuft that my mother used to grow from seed each year, but actually this is quite rare and I should pay more attention to it!

From this bench you can also look across the green towards the castle and admire the amazing Horse Chestnut trees. Return to the road via the concrete track or retrace your steps.

Denham

here has been a lot of activity in Denham over the last few months with some great community support. The telephone box on Hoxne Road is now fully renovated and has been fitted out with shelves which we are delighted to say are now filled with books for swapping (and hand gel to ensure COVID safety). There are also seed swap boxes and a notice board that we would like to encourage people to use for community rather than Parish Council notices. Please use this parish asset. We are now in the process of edging and paving the area in front of the box to ensure that it is easy to access for all. This has been a real team effort so thanks to all involved.

We have also had a focus on keeping Denham clean and tidy, with residents collecting litter, reporting potholes, signage problems and fly tipping. This is making a big difference in the parish and the aim is to continue this on an ongoing basis. We will also soon be going out to residents to complete the initial parish consultation for the proposed designation of Denham Low Road and Church Road as Quiet Lanes. This designation would highlight that these roads are regularly used by walkers, cyclists, and horse riders as well as motorised vehicles.

Fundraising and grant funding applications for the renovation of the Village Hall have continued but COVID 19 has had such an impact that many heritage and public buildings need support and competition for grants is fierce. Despite slow progress, the enthusiasm for repairing the Hall so that

it can be reopened is still high and with a change of approach we aim to start the renovation process soon.

At the Parish Council meeting in March, Cllr Jane Gilmore stepped down from the committee to focus on family matters. We would like to thank Jane for all her support during her time on the committee. We are grateful that Jane will continue to support with charging and moving the recently installed village speed sign. She also remains an active member of Denham Community Council.

This does however mean that we now only have three Councillors, rather than five and this increases the risk of future committee meetings not being quorate. This is far from ideal and will hamper progress. I would therefore ask that anyone who may be interested in joining the Parish Council, contact the Parish Clerk, Rod Caird on denhamparishclerk@gmail.com or

denhamparishclerk@gmail.com or 07785 331217. Any Cllr would also be happy to explain the role, which does not need to be onerous, and it is important that we retain an effective Council. At the April 13th annual meeting of the Parish Council, Cllr Tania Farrow was elected Chair for 2021/22, with Cllr Nick Farrow as her Deputy.

From May, Parish Council meetings will once again be held face to face, under COVID safe rules, at the church and details of the agendas and minutes can be found both on the parish notice boards and on the website:

It will be possible to observe social distancing and hand sanitiser etc will be available, but masks will need to be worn. It remains to be seen of course how people will feel about attending meetings again after such a long period of being unable to do so. But we hope to see residents at 7.30pm on Wednesdays May 26th, July 28th, September 22nd and November 24th.

he Parish Council is a corporate body of 11 Councillors and two members of staff (a Clerk and a Street Caretaker). The Councillors are ordinarily elected to serve the village of Hoxne for a term of four years and represent residents on a range of matters. The Parish Council meets monthly and has its annual general meeting in May.

The Council's Chairman of the last ten years, and councillor for a few years prior, Edward (Ted) O'Connor, has recently resigned. Ted's contribution to the village and his many years' of public service have been immense. Those of you that have served on the Council under his tenure, have attended a council meeting or have met Ted via another way will know that he was a dedicated and approachable chairman who achieved much for Hoxne. The Parish Council is extremely grateful for Ted's chairmanship, professionalism and the fairness with which he considered every matter that came his way during this long period of service.

There are currently vacancies on the Council and the existing Councillors are keen to welcome new members who are interest in their work. There is much to do including development and maintenance of several assets in the village, finalising and delivering a Neighbourhood Development Plan, consideration of traffic calming and responding to planning applications to give the views of the parish to the local planning authority. Please get in touch with the Clerk or speak with one of the existing councillors for more information.

Planning and the Environment

The Neighbourhood Development Plan Working Group are keen to hear

from residents if there is still an interest in allotments being provided in the village. If you would be interested in an allotment plot in the future, please contact the Clerk to register your interest. Whilst the Neighbourhood Development Plan can allocate land use, there will need to be a certain level of interest before the Parish Council can use its legal powers to provide allotments.

Quiet Lanes Scheme - Working with Denham Parish Council, we will shortly be asking your views on designating Wittons Lane and Clink Hill through to Denham Low Road as Quiet Lanes highlighting that these roads are regularly used by walkers and cyclists. Please look out for, and respond to, our consultations.

Highways

A recent application by the Parish Council to Suffolk Highways for an automatic number plate recognition camera to periodically be sighted on Green Street as an additional speed deterrent has been accepted.

The Parish Council is still keen to see Community Speed Watch initiatives run in the village. This is a practical way to achieve some speed enforcement measures. If you are interested in volunteering to be part of such a scheme please contact the Clerk. More details are available at:

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ideas and concerns as we plan for the future.

Motorists speeding through the village were identified by the Vehicle Activated Speed Sign as a problem. We will be discussing buying our own permanent sign to protect the village. Currently we share the sign with Wingfield and rotate its use.

January saw the first experience of flooding in the village. A group of concerned residents will be presenting their plans for prevention and dealing with the consequences.

With the lifting of Covid lockdown old problems will re-emerge. Petty crime does hit rural villages, particularly with thefts from outbuildings and oil tanks. It's time to relaunch our Neighbourhood Watch scheme. All those willing to join this effort are warmly welcome.

A new planning application has been filed for development of the land adjacent to Quiet Waters on Hoxne Road. This is for building a smaller house than submitted last year.

Four residents have taken advantage of the taxi service to vaccination centres. The offer of free taxis will continue until all villagers are vaccinated twice. We thank the Suffolk Community Fund for making this possible.

Finally, in this issue of Village Voice you will find a piece by Roy Goodwin - The Sylehamites of Summer 2021. We encourage all residents to read and participate in this exciting venture. It has been almost 1,000 years since the Doomsday Book. It needs updating.

Wingfield

ast month the village lost one of its most notable residents, John Parker. John, a former Chairman of Wingfield Parish Council, was President of the British Driving Society

and famous for driving the London-Norwich Royal Mail Coach the 139 miles in record time.

We also say farewell to Guy McGregor as our Suffolk County Councillor. We wish him all the best in his retirement. His successor is Peter Gould.

We all should be aware the village is changing. Planning applications have been received for development of the land opposite Old School House (DC/21/01674) and the caravan site on Vicarage Road (DC/21/01969). These are some of the last remaining infill/brown field development sites in the village.

Change is also being fuelled by local changes. The Cranswick poultry processing plant on Eye airfield is drawing in supplies for feed and birds from local producers. This is generating a noticeable increase in lorry movements on our roads. This strain on our local infrastructure will be taken up with our District and newly elected County Councillor.

Efforts to convert the telephone kiosk as a home for a village defibrillator hit a snag. The costs to reinstall the electricity had increased to unacceptable levels and the work could not be done until next year. Our alternative plan is to locate the equipment at the entrance to Wingfield Barns. We thank Wingfield Barns CIC for their support and keeping the project on schedule.

As this issue goes to print, our Annual Parish Meeting will have been held on May 21st at Wingfield Barns.

Finally, we are hopefully coming to the end of Covid lockdown restrictions. We say thank you to everyone who has helped in making Wingfield one of the safest communities in the country. To celebrate we are talking with the Village Hall about holding a celebration party. Watch this space.

A Word on Wingfield

Bells

fter a meeting of the Wingfield Parochial Church Council back in 1998, Betty Syrett of Wingfield Farm asked me whether we should ring in the Millennium. I said we should. I don't remember any other proposals. Ideas are easy, but delivery can be problematic. We had already managed to get a £5,000 grant from the Lottery for local children to put on a play in the church about Wingfield for the Millennium Concert.

Betty suggested I should identify half a dozen potential ringers and she would arrange a demonstration one night of how to ring. She said our organist had rung bells and could do a demonstration - what I called *showing us the ropes*. Betty was able to ring standing on a box

with support. The organist's demonstration was not encouraging. He became entangled and we didn't see him again.

Betty then discovered that others in the Hoxne Deanery were thinking on similar lines and so we joined a group being trained by Suffolk's finest ringer. He took us to practice in local churches where the bells were still ringable such as Laxfield, Horham, Fressingfield, Stradbroke and Weybread, then further afield in Suffolk where we were always welcome. Bell ringers are a community who don't necessarily stay on for the service after ringing - more likely they adjourn to the local.

Next Betty revealed a major problem: The fifth bell was cracked and unsafe to ring and had to be repaired. But we couldn't ring a peal with just five bells. One of our volunteers, a retired farmer from Mendlesham, skilled in his hobby

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
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making chairs of that ilk, offered practical help. We couldn't afford to pay either of the two national professional restorers, so using local volunteers we did the restoration for £6,000 rather than a substantially larger estimate. Roy first of all dismantled the six wooden rope wheels and then once a week sprayed the rusted bolts of the nine heavy steel frames which were lowered after the bells into the chamber below, all made possible by a small Japanese electric

hoist able to handle a one ton load. We loaded the fifth bell on to a lorry and drove it to Anglesey near Cambridge where the crack was welded.

The crack had appeared after the lead on the tower roof was replaced by bitumen felt just after WW2, which subsequently blew away allowing rain to enter the

tower. At the same time the precious medieval wooden bell frame was replaced by a heavy steel frame, and the bells were rehung cutting off their



to hang them, and in their place metal bolts secured the bells to the new frame enabling water penetration, rusting and then inevitably a large crack. Fund raising was less of a

Andrew Castleden as outlined in the last Village Voice issue with its evocative Hoxne bell pictures. We took a plastic

cast of the Norwich bell makers mark on the second bell and used it to make paper weights which sold like hot cakes from the back of the church.

The church was packed for the Millennium Concert. Jacqui Dankworth had travelled round local schools to teach them to sing in the oratorio written by her husband telling of Wingfield's history. She sang a well known spiritual It Ain't Necessarily So. which caused our vicar to leave the

> church as he believed that the bible was literally true. This had all come about because Churchwarden Bernard Wellingham applied his organising talents to the restoration of Wingfield church. I recall being present when he was fundraising and I was doing the same for the tower, which indicates

how the two are treated as separate operations. We had a visitor from Cambridge looking into our funding application and when leaving to return home he asked me about my work, so I just said "Uganda". He then told me that his next door neighbour had worked there and that he would be wheeling him to the pub when he got back and would enquire whether he knew me.

That evening I received a call from him - back in the 50s he was a very helpful young missionary and Archdeacon, whereas I was the young new District Commissioner Bunyoro. He told me that his next job was Bishop in the Congo and he didn't speak French! I said I must visit, but sadly we never met. Wingfield Church got its big grant though and I like to think that Bishop Ridsdale played a part.
