

We've been a long time closed ,but that has given us time to keep working, improving and thinking. The Old School was leased to us 2018, four years after the school was closed and so there has been lots of work to do, refurbishing the building, dealing with the weeds, the cobwebs, decorating and all the many other tasks (and expenses!) associated with running a large old building, untouched for four years.

We have been sustained, as have many other small organisations such as ours, by several government grants, for which we have been very thankful. In our case it has enabled us to maintain the original ethos of the school when it was founded by the Rev George France in 1846 of providing a building for the education of local people, not only children:-quite a forward-looking aim in 1846.

We begin on Wednesday 11th August - 7.15 for 7.30 - 9.30pm. £5 non-member/ £4 member. In East Anglia - Buffalo Bill - Wild West Hero. Geoffrey Robinson, local historian and seasoned traveller, will tell his story.

Was he for real or was he a charlatan? Where did he appear in East Anglia in 1903? How is he viewed today in the U.S.A. and what is his legacy? What connection is there between the speaker and the Old Scout?

On Sunday 29th August - 2.15 for 2.30 - 4.30pm. Fiery Disasters in East Anglia by Stuart Bowell. In the past. in this region, many of the buildings were timber framed and had a thatched roof. These materials meant that fire was an ever present threat. We will look at some of the major fires that took place and the methods used to tackle them. The social and economic results will be considered, including financing and rebuilding.

On Saturday 11th September we have an open day from 11am to 4pm, where we formally open our vintage technology exhibition upstairs. We have a lovely collection of radios and all things sound related which will evoke many memories for us "oldies".

Some of our items date right back to the early phonographs, just like the one which used to be pictured on *His Masters Voice* records. That really is a thing to be proud of! In addition our amateur radio group will be on hand demonstrating the world of amateur radio:-definitely a niche hobby!

Downstairs we'll have more displays of our archive material and of course drinks and cakes! The doors and windows will be open and you'll be able to sit in the garden if you wish.

Then on **Sunday 26th September** at 2.15pm, Rosemary Steer will talk to us on "Children in Care, 1834-1929" I think that might be a rather sobering experience as we compare how things were then and now, but we shall see. Rosemary has given us several talks, all of which have been entertaining and informative and shine a light on how communities coped before the advent of the welfare state.

Advance notice - many of you may know Roy Goodwin whose family have farmed on both sides of the Norfolk Suffolk border for five generations. He will be talking to us on **Wednesday 6th October** at 7.15pm and is sure to have lots of stories to tell.

I'm sure you will agree that is a lovely mixed bag of subjects and there is more to come in November and onwards, including our Christmas bash, but more of that later!

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

s I write this, many are looking forward to the lifting of all legal restrictions in relation to Covid 19 on 19th July. For some, "freedom day" is eagerly awaited and seems entirely positive. For those who are clinically extremely vulnerable or otherwise at particular risk, the end of legally enforceable precautions may feel more like a threat.

We may ask: freedom for what? Is it freedom to return to the treadmill of getting and spending, always pursuing more than we need or than the planet can afford? Is it freedom to indulge ourselves, regardless of others? These so -called freedoms can be just a different form of captivity - to materialism, selfishness and greed.

Jesus shows us the way to real freedom: although he was divine, he gave himself up even to death for our sakes, in obedience to the will of God. At Morning Prayer we pray:

O God, the author of peace and lover of concord, to know you is eternal life, to serve you is perfect freedom.

We can find that perfect freedom through obeying Jesus's commands. And his command, as he told his disciples, is to love one another as he has loved us. If we can follow that command and put others before ourselves, then there will be a "freedom day" indeed!

oxne PCC recently held their Annual meeting in the Church, only ten Parishioners attended thus there were no issues with social distancing.

There were no advance nominations for the position of Churchwarden so Guy

McGregor and Wilf White volunteered to continue in that role, both were nominated by David Hyde and seconded by John Swann.

Cathie McGregor confirmed that there were 40 parishioners on the Electoral Roll; the number had not changed from the previous year.

All members of the PCC apart from John Brawn were willing to stand again. John supported by his wife Margaret has served on the PCC for many years and will be sorely missed. He was presented with a 'Bottle Brush' plant and Camelia to thank him for his sterling work.

Guy McGregor presented the accounts which showed a small surplus of £2372. He explained that due to Covid restrictions it had been a difficult year.

The Churchwardens report included an outline of the restoration plans for the church and bells, most of which were detailed in the last edition of Village Voice. It was explained that the pandemic had delayed plans for the restoration of the church, but some work had been done; Mick Procner had done an excellent job in replacing the guttering along the south side of the nave. Andrew Castleden had kindly replaced the collapsing gardener's shed in the churchyard and done some other minor repairs and Kristian Garnham and his team had done a great job pruning the cedar of Lebanon which had been shedding branches during the summer storms. Approval to repair the floor in the St Edmund's chapel (as soon as our mason can obtain the necessary stone) has been received. Overall the plans for the church are ambitious and we need to remind ourselves that they are subject to the necessary permissions being obtained and funds being raised.

The Revd Eleanor Goodison was licensed as our priest in charge for the next two years at a service in Wingfield church on Sunday 4 October and we are

very blessed by her ministry and the support we receive from her husband, the Revd John McCracken and the Revd Richard Court. Together they have ensured that services have been held somewhere in the benefice every Sunday throughout the pandemic, even if it did have to be held via Facebook or Zoom.

The Reverend Eleanor Goodison reiterated that the second lockdown had thwarted most plans for public worship. However Hoxne had managed both a Nativity Parade and Christingle Service despite inclement weather on Christmas Eve before the church was closed for the whole of January and February. Church services were resumed in March. It is hoped that we can keep some online services for those who cannot get out and about. Plans for the future include a Service of Memorial and Thanksgiving on 30th October and a St Edmunds Day Evensong on the 20th November.

There have already been some changes to the Deanery leading to a merger between the Hoxne and Hartismere Deaneries; more are expected later in 2022. And we will report on them when they happen.

Thankfully there have been no safeguarding issues at Hoxne.

#### Jane Carter

ane Carter, who lived in Hoxne for nearly 50 years, passed away peacefully at the beginning of June at the age of 92. Although she was born in Hampshire, she spent a large part of her childhood in Suffolk. Her father was a Squadron Leader in the RAF and the family moved constantly around the country from airbase to airbase, many of which were local to this area. She did farm work during the war before deciding to follow in her mother's footsteps and train as a nurse. Whilst training, she met her future husband, Ray, and, after they married, they moved to Nayland in Suffolk, then Stradbroke, before buying a small house on Green Street in Hoxne in the 1970s with a portion of land which allowed them to extend the house and for Jane to create a garden which was her pride and jov.

She was both an autodidact and someone who took advantage, whenever she could, of further education opportunities. This, combined with impressive practical knowledge and ability, meant that she became skilled at cooking and baking, upholstery, woodworking and furniture restoration,

and, especially, cake-decorating which she also taught to others. She created beautiful and intricate wedding cakes and cakes for many local events.

Jane worked as a State Registered Staff Nurse at Hartismere Hospital, and was the Chair of the Eye Country Market for many years. But, above all, she was a gardener and a consummate plantswoman. Her garden was opened as part of Hoxne Open Gardens and she would share generously both her knowledge and her plants with anyone who expressed an interest.

Jane had many friends and neighbours who stayed in touch and gave much support and her family would like to thank all of them for their kindness.

#### **Wingfield Defibrillator**

e are all aware recently of the 29-year-old Danish footballer Christian Erikson who suffered a cardiac arrest at a Euro 2020 competition match and was resuscitated by the prompt use of CPR and a defibrillator.

A sudden cardiac arrest can happen to anyone at any time. It occurs when there is an electrical problem with the heart which causes it to stop altogether. This results in a lack of oxygenated blood being pumped to the brain meaning victims will likely die unless CPR (CardioPulmonary Resuscitation) and a defibrillator is used straight away. How many people suffer from cardiac arrests?

Based on European data, there are around 60,000 cardiac arrests outside of hospitals every year in the UK. There

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were over 7.4 million people living with heart and circulatory diseases in 2019 alone. Thankfully with the increase in defibrillators in place around the country, more and more lives are being saved.

Some of you may be aware that the Wingfield Parish Council has used some of your Parish Council precept to fund the provision of a Defibrillator for the benefit of all. It is located at the entrance to the Wingfield Barns.

As you approach it can be easily identified as it is contained in a bright yellow cabinet. For security, the cabinet is locked and can only be accessed by a special code.

If a person becomes ill, call 999 as normal and ask for the ambulance. The

ambulance service responder will ask questions about the symptoms e.g., is the patient responsive and breathing. If they are not put the phone on speaker mode and they will guide you through CPR. They are aware of the defibrillator's location at WINGFIELD BARNS and will tell you the access code to open the cabinet. DO NOT leave the patient but continue with CPR and ask someone else to go. If a second person is not available, continue with CPR. The responder will advise.

For households in outlying areas of Wingfield it may be quicker to consider the defibrillators at Syleham Village Hall or Stradbroke telephone box in front of the church - each defibrillator will have their own code.

After opening the cabinet with the code, the defibrillator can be found in a pouch hanging on a hook. An ambulance will of course have been immediately dispatched but you can maintain life until its arrival.

Remove the pouch and take it to the patient. In a zipped section at the back of the defibrillator pouch can be found items to help you prepare the patient for defibrillating (razor, scissors, gloves, CPR resuscitation face mask, etc).

You need have no fear of using the unit. It is remarkably simple to someone with no experience of using a as once it is turned on it completely verbally guides vou

use, even by defibrillator, through the procedure. It is important

though to maintain telephone contact with the responder until the ambulance arrives or the patient responds, and the ambulance responder is happy to end the call. DO NOT HANG UP THE PHONE UNTIL TOLD TO.

It is recommended that you familiarise yourself as to the defibrillator location to avoid delays. At night or during periods of poor light e.g. sunset, it is recommended that you take a torch to the Barns as lighting may not be sufficient to see the keypad clearly. But let us just hope that it will never have to be used!

It is recommended that you keep this notice handy for future reference.

We were dropped off at Felixstowe and off we went stopping at various places for bed and breakfast, Shingle Street, Dunwich, Walberswick, Lowestoft. Monty retired at Dunwich with split paws. We returned to Hoxne six days later, with blistered feet but relieved to be back with friends and

## New Reeding Woods Group

pound Lane Wood meadow is growing well, even with some rather odd weather experienced this year. A dry April was succeeded by a cool, damp May; a hot spell in early June gave haymakers a good chance but cooler, damper conditions have returned. Trees stressed by the long dry and hot summer last year are however finding conditions more to their liking and are recovering well, canopies dark with chlorophyll. Late Lammas shooting

(second growth spurt) on some oaks is visible as a haze of red, green and vellow. Ash is in places recovering from previous dieback events.

The meadow has not yet been cut, so we are now hoping for dry weather at the end of July or August. This late cutting will allow wild flowers to bloom and then set seed. Yellow-rattle has done especially well this year, which will certainly help the meadow to develop. Yellow-rattle is an annual plant which is parasitic and feeds off the roots of the meadow grasses. This reduces the vigour of the coarser plants and grasses, allowing the more demanding meadow flowers to become established and to spread.

The weather pattern seems to have encouraged Bee Orchids to prosper in several new places and they have done well on the meadow. Bee Orchids offer a





colourful, intricate and beautifully shaped flower, closely resembling a female bee. Although designed to encourage males to pollinate them, sadly the bee species needed to do this is not actually present in the UK! These plants are entirely self-pollinated here, although this has not prevented a relative abundance this year. The lovely crimson Pyramidal Orchids have also bloomed on the meadow this year.

Reports and observations locally indicate both these orchids are appearing in gardens and verges - in greater profusion than of late - and in new sites, which is all very encouraging.

Orchid seeds are very small and consequently contain very little in the way of food for the developing plant. The orchid seedlings cannot grow on their own as a result; instead they rely on fungi present in the soil to provide the food they need to develop. This symbiotic relationship means orchids will only flourish in areas containing the fungi they require.

Whilst the ongoing COVID restrictions means we have not undertaken any group activity work so far this year, we hope to meet up again later in the season after the July 19th 'release date'! couting is slowly returning to normality though, as at the time of writing, residentials, camping and travelling as a group in a minibus are still so restricted as to be very difficult; the rules for schools seem to be much more relaxed. When Nursery children start attending school it means that they have a chance to settle into the routine of school life before attending Reception. In effect they almost get two years of Reception!

Each day is often different in Acorns with lots of opportunities to work and play outside. We follow the Development Matters curriculum and work towards our Early Learning Goals. We also follow whole school topics like Great Britain or Extreme Earth.

und-raising efforts continue in order to raise enough cash to bring the Village Hall back to life. Applications to local organisations have started to bear fruit with a very welcome donation of £2,500 and individual sales of surplus "stuff" have raised a very impressive £600 so far. The village WhatsApp group has been busy and very effective.

The community as a whole really is coming together over this and it's just about possible to see light at the end of the tunnel. The first target continues to be enough money to get the roof done, because that will basically secure the building for the future. A village gettogether on the site on July 17 will also have added to the fund.

We are in detailed talks with the grant -giving team at Mid Suffolk District Council, who are being extremely helpful, as is our individual District Councillor, Matthew Hicks. Our newly elected County Councillor Peter Gould is also working with us.

At the May meeting of the Parish Council Duncan McGregor was co-opted

to fill a vacancy on the council; he is very welcome and existing councillors are looking forward to working with him.

The Quiet Lanes project in the village, progressed in collaboration with Hoxne, has now passed through its public consultation phase without objection and is on track to be formally approved in the near future, following the July Parish Council meeting. Hopefully residents will see the signage appearing along Low Road and Church Road before too long.

But we hope to see residents at the Church for our Parish Council meetings at 7.30pm on Wednesday 22nd September and Wednesday 24th November.

#### Hoxne

Footpaths (Public Rights of Way) it is appreciated that during the last difficult year, the PROW have been used more and more as residents walk to take daily exercise and enjoy some fresh air. The responsible authority for the maintenance of PROW is the County Council and they have provided the following update on this season's cutting programme:

'Unfortunately, with the combination of warm and wet weather causing a considerable up-tick in growth, Suffolk



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County Council contractors have been delayed a little this year. The growth is simply so thick that they are moving through it at a slower pace. It is anticipated that the contractor cutting Hoxne should be finished by the end of this week (9 July). It is then anticipated that the second round of cutting will start early August. As there will have been one cut this year by then, we are hopeful the second round should be completed within six weeks of starting, so anticipate a finish of mid-September - subject to weather and growing conditions. Please note there are only two cuts per year.'

Heritage Walk - the Parish Council is currently undertaking a condition audit of the signs that make up the trail through the village. 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#### **Closing Word**

Erstwhile Wingfield stalwart Tommy Gee deliberates new education and houses...

wo stories about Eton broke last week. The Minister of Education said he was delighted to see that Star Academies which runs 30 Muslim schools in some of the poorest parts of the country started by Hamid Patel (just knighted) would be opening sixth forms under the free schools programme to which Eton would be making a significant and ongoing contribution. These sixth forms would be opened in three schools yet to selected in deprived parts of the north or west Midlands to admit 240 pupils per annum whose teaching virtually by Eton staff and in-person teacher exchanges is not ruled out and a chance to learn Latin. It will be

focussed on young people on free school meals.

The intention is to blend Eton's educational philosophy and rigorous curriculum with the ethos and approach of Star Academies.

Dr Hastings Banda had a similar vision for Malawi. As President he decided to build an Eton in the poor remote north of the country. Banda had lived and worked in Edinburgh as a GP for much of his life and was keen to establish an academy near his birthplace which would educate high fliers who would become loyal servants of him and the state - a corps d'elite

His first appointment was a Housemistress from Eton who would make sure that the boys lived the privileged life of Etonians. The cost was huge for a very poor country and the implications were vast. I sat next to David Kimble, the then University Vice Chancellor at a degree

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ceremony when Banda also announced that Latin and Greek were to be taught there. Kimble was taken aback as Banda had said nothing to him about it. It was part of his pursuit of excellence. I was involved at that time with Tanzanian academics whose topic was the impact of Overseas Education on poor countries.

A recent short paperback memoir by Okwonga Musa related how he, a refugee Ugandan managed to enter Eton, and the challenges he had to face. His mother widowed by the assassin Amin brought him to the UK where she worked as an NHS GP and scrimped and saved to pay his fees there. Eton was set up by Henry VI in 1440 as a charity for 60 poor boys and gave her a 50% rebate - before he left he became a scholar which supported him.

The current aim of Patel (not Priti) and the Provost of Eton is to get poor pupils (boys?) into Russell Universities and Oxbridge.

Back in the 1930s my grammar school appointed a new Head from Oundle with similar ambitions. Today I call it the pursuit of excellence. My school was an early victim of the abolition of the 11+ and a major change in education policy with the closure of many grammar schools, including my own to whom I owed so much. I still subscribe to the pursuit of excellence in education rather than levelling (think Oxford's lead in

making the vaccine). This dichotomy is at the heart of education policy.

Also this week, perhaps a coincidence, it was announced that Eton had a large estate north and close to Lewes in East Sussex which is to be developed under what I call the "new towns" policy yet to go to Parliament, and a kite flyer for the biggest change in planning legislation since the 30s. Its environmental impact will be enormous and protest posters have appeared. The land owner, Eton, already well endowed, may gain even more funds enabling it to make its planned "significant and ongoing financial contribution" to these northern academies.

This arms length project may soften public opinion about Eton privilege and please some Asian voters, and side step critics of centralised land planning by Ministers rather than local government. It is early days. The proposed legislation has not yet been published.

Before moving to Wingfield, I helped produce a strategic plan for West Sussex with complete local agreement, but it was rejected by the Minister who sent me a terse letter saying that it was flawed. Is this the shape of things to come? Houses are needed more then ever and have to built somewhere. Who will decide and by what criteria? Us the people, or our Government?
