Since March 2020, when the pandemic struck, the local radio station for Diss, Harleston and Eye, Park Radio decided to mothball its studios at the DYCC in Diss to

ensure its team of 50 volunteers remained safe and well. Having adopted some truly ground breaking

technology its programmes, during the crucial period of lockdown, continued with the team of presenters working from their homes, either live or by prerecording shows for later transmission.

Now after 18 months Park Radio will be welcoming listeners and its team back to its studios from the 1st October, adopting a sensible set of protocols to keep everyone safe while on site.

Visitors will notice when they pop in, which its hoped they will, the new and more spacious and comfortable reception area - which has been upgraded in the last few months.

for working so hard and for maintaining the service over the last year and a half, which has been extremely demanding, but equally we are now looking forward to welcoming visitors back to our base where we can now properly celebrate

Set in Bayview Retirement Home, run by slimy, out-for-profit Harvey Baines, ex -war correspondent/photographer Diana Trent is furious at where life has now landed her and determined to make her presence felt at every opportunity.

In the neighbouring apartment is exaccountant Tom Ballard, deposited here as his daughter-in-law can't stand him in the house any longer. Far from being upset and resentful, he optimistically regards this as the next adventure.

Wingfield Suffolk's Forgotten Castle Book Launch

oppyland Publishing invite you to the launch of Wingfield Suffolk's Forgotten Castle by Elaine Murphy. Thursday 4th November - 6pm for 6.30pm start, Waveney Heritage Centre, The Old School, Grove Road, Brockdish IP21 4JP.

Wingfield belongs to a clutch of late fourteenth century castles that must be seen in the context of a society in

turmoil. Foreign wars, power struggles at the heart of government, popular revolt and the longer term effect of epidemic disease provide the backdrop for the creation of this mansion built



with the appearance and defences of earlier castles but which was also home to powerful families who played nationally important roles in the story of England. The Wingfields, de la Poles,

Brandons and Jerninghams made history and their stories shaped the nation.

Wingfield was well known throughout the late medieval and Tudor periods but later declined to become a residence at the heart of a farming estate. But these later centuries are just as important to understanding the story of the building and crucial to understanding the surviving remains. This book is as much about the story of Suffolk and its changing society as it is about the castle itself. The author's meticulous research gives equal weight to these later centuries, creating for the first time a comprehensive history to shed light on this forgotten Suffolk castle.

Plans for Hoxne Church

Hoxne Church held a public meeting on 26th July to explain our plans for the interior of the church, the installation of a lavatory in the churchyard and the restoration of the bells. Over 30 people attended and had the opportunity to comment and ask questions. After careful consideration of the points raised at the meeting, as well as expert advice received from the diocese and others, the Parochial Church Council has now applied for permission to:

- make permanent the erection of the St Edmund's timber screen in front of the Chapel of St Edmund at the East End of the North Aisle;
- shorten two pews and restore three pews whilst retaining their medieval pew ends;
- install an altar against the North Wall of the Chapel;
- install an icon in a protective frame and votive candle stand against the North wall of the Chapel; and
- move the organ from its current position under the tower to the second

bay to the West of the screen in in the North aisle with ancillary electrical works.

A separate application for permission to install the lavatory and construct a footpath to the north door of the church, with level access, will be made shortly.

St Peter and St Paul, Hoxne

am writing this short report the day after a glorious Hoxne Fete in the grounds of Abbey Farm. It was very generous of Churchwarden Wilf White to allow us to meet in his garden. For many of us it was the first time we had ventured into a social occasion since February 2020 and it was cheering to see so many villagers enjoying themselves. I am not sure that any of us, unless we are involved, know just how much work is involved in organising such events, so may I say a big thank you to the

organisers, helpers, cake makers, the people who donated plants, produce, bric a brac and the wonderful raffle prizes; also we must not forget the people who did the physical work like #the guys from Waveney trees who transported tables and chairs, those who put together the bell display and what about the ladies doing the refreshments, they had no chance at all to sit down at all. I think there might have been some sore feet at the end of the day. 'Thank You' to all of them and Thank You to all who attended. It was a great day.

I have noticed that our diaries are filling up again now we are no longer in lockdown but please make room in them for the Harvest Festival at 9.30am on Sunday 17th October and the Remembrance Day Service on Sunday 14th November at 10.30am. Both of course at Hoxne Church.

Many of you will remember that back on 26th July we had a public meeting to discuss the PCC's plans for the Church, my notes are at least three pages of A4 paper typewritten, they really are notes and I have no intention of publishing them, however the PCC thinks a short report should be made so I will start by telling you that more than thirty villagers attended, that did include the members of the PCC but it was a good turnout none the less.

The purpose of the meeting was to give an update from the PCC of the proposals for the 'Re- ordering and Restoration' of the church and to take questions and suggestions from the attendees. Three projects were discussed;

- the provision of lavatories
- the St Edmunds's Chapel (including moving the organ and reopening the West door)
- the bells project

The lavatories are a priority for the PCC, there is no space within the Church so plans are to have a high quality prebuilt building which will be disabled friendly and have baby changing provisions. There will be a lighted path between the Church and the lavatory. Since the meeting Historic England has said that we cannot place the building near the church but they will support the PCC using the location where the sheds stand now. This is an extra expense but we have funds in place.

Next was an explanation of the thinking behind the proposals to provide a chapel dedicated to St Edmund in what was the Lady Chapel in the North Aisle. It was explained that we need permission to make the location of Victorian Screen permanent and to install an Altar, Icon and Votive Stand. There was some controversy about this project. The PCC were questioned as to why the Screen could not go back to its original position inside the West door and the organ back to its former location in the Lady Chapel. Reasons given were that the screen makes the chapel available for private prayer and small services. The organ could not go back into the location because the weight of it is to blame for the damage to the floor above the vaults and it would be obscuring the Maynard Memorial which is of national importance. In addition the Diocesan Organ Adviser had said that the location was 'acoustically inappropriate'. The majority of attendees approved of the plans.

The Icon, Altar and Votive Stand had all been donated and a private individual had offered to pay the approximate cost of £3000 for the floor repair. The PCC has the funds in place to relocate the organ.

The final presentation was about the bell project, there was a slight confusion over the plans to 'move the clock'. It

was explained that we were only planning on moving the mechanism not the clock face; this would allow more room for a new 8 bell frame. There was a question as to whether the PCC had considered the less mobile bell ringers in their plans to ring the bells from a gallery rather than from the floor of the tower. It was explained that the provision of a gallery would reduce the climb from the current 34 steps to 12. There was no other practical way at the moment.

The cost of the project is approximately £150,000; at the time of the meeting we had raised some £12,000. The aim is to raise most of the money outside the village perhaps from the National Lottery, but we cannot apply for funds until we get permission for the project.

Further information on the bells project is available in earlier editions of Village Voice.

It was suggested that the PCC set up a dedicated website for the renovations, this was thought to be a good idea and the Churchwardens were going to investigate.

Red Feather Club

By the time you read this the Red Feather Club Museum in Horham should be back in business. The former WW2 NCOs' club and other buildings, which have been faithfully restored, keep alive the memory of the US forces who called Horham home in the 1940s.

The museum, operated and managed by registered charity the 95th Bomb Group Heritage Association, is due to relaunch its open days in September. It usually has public open days on the last Sunday of the month (10am to 4pm) from May through to October along with dances, film shows and talks as well as hosting visits from the families of the personnel who served at the air base and other groups. The last open day of the year is scheduled for Sunday 31st October, but please check on the 95th's or Redlingfield website before setting out.

The 95th was the only Eighth Air Force Group to be awarded three Distinguished Unit Citations. The third for bombing Berlin on 4 March 1944, the first time the German capital had been bombed by USAAF.

I hope the RFC gets back in full swing as soon as it can as it really comes to life on the dance nights it usually holds throughout the year.

New Reeding Woods Group

he summer this year seems to have been short and fleeting until the improvement at the end of August. The hay on the meadow was cut late due to the inclement weather in July and August. The poor conditions - cool and



dry over the summer - resulted in poor quality hay fit only for goats and sheep. The meadow yielded 55 bales, although small ones this was a surprisingly good amount.



The wood has provided a home for bees in the old tree and we did not find they help with our work. However their presence in the dead log proves the value of deadwood as a wildlife habitat.

The dry weather recently is shown by the lower water level in the pond. We saw several dragonflies whist we cut the hay including a male Emperor and a

Common Darter. The mown meadow is now providing a great venue for picnics.

The spindle in the boundary hedge is already showing glorious autumn colour and elsewhere the hedges are full of haws and slows. Our Autumn work will



include cutting back the overhanging roses and brambles on the rides. The woods will also need thinning and clearing so we would be grateful for any volunteers who would like to come and help. This was followed on August 10th by our annual summer outing to Thelnetham Mill which had been postponed on several occasions during the pandemic. It was however worth the wait and very much enjoyed by all.



Our host, Chris Mills, one of the team of enthusiasts who purchased the 1819 historic tower mill for restoration in 1979 gave us a brief history of the mill followed by a comprehensive guided tour.

Restoration of the mill was completed in 1987. Built in brick, it stands four storeys high and was originally used to grind flour from wheat. A set of patent sails are winded by a fantail to drive two pairs of millstones with a third pair driven by the later installation of an auxiliary single cylinder stationary engine. The mechanics and structure of the sails were fascinating and most of us had no idea of their complex operation.

Climbing the tower posed a challenge to some of our 'mature' membership with the confined headspace and use of ladders between storeys but we weren't deterred. Flour is still milled on occasions and the mill which is open to the general public is well worth a visit.

To the delight of our host, one of our party pointed out a 'daisy wheel' ritual protection mark inscribed on one of the timbers. These were commonly inscribed during the C16th - C18th on the beams of houses, churches and agricultural buildings to offer protection from evil.

Ritual protection marks or witch marks such as those referred to above, are a common feature of many timber framed buildings and none more so than some of the older houses in Hoxne.

Richard Giffin of Low Street is particularly interested in researching the subject in more detail and so if you are aware of any such marks in your property Richard would be very pleased to hear from you with a view to photographing and recording the specific details. Denham

successful and enjoyable fundraising event was held at the Village Hall on July 17. The event itself, combined with ongoing bric -a-brac sales, have together raised around £1,262. The event reinforced the need in the village for a central meeting point and demonstrated the widespread commitment throughout Denham to complete the renovation of the Hall.

Other local fundraising plans are in the works.

The National Lottery has awarded £9,500 to refurbish the kitchen and toilets, which is a wonderful step forwards.

Mid Suffolk grants team has set aside £27,800 for phase 1 of the work; final authorisation is awaited. Grant applications have also been made to a large number of local and regional organisations, and a major application is in hand for the Lottery Community Fund.

Denham Community Council has altogether so far raised around £6,000

from local efforts. Phase 1 will deal with the roof and exterior of the building as well as electrical works; phase 2 will work on the windows and internal fittings; phase 3 will deal with decoration and final internal improvements.

On the Quiet Lanes project, residents present at the last Parish Council meeting took part in the final stage of the public consultation on the project, no other comments having been received since the community received leaflets about it. Questions were answered about how to raise awareness of the scheme and its significance, and also about further future extensions of designated lanes.

After discussion it was formally agreed by the Parish Council to approve the present scheme for Low Road and Church Road (in association with Hoxne Parish Council) and to request that the designation be formalised and signage installed.

Thanks were expressed to the Quiet Lanes team at the County Council, who have done an excellent job of supporting the many Parishes involved in the project.

We hope to see you at the Church for our Parish Council meeting at 7.30pm on Wednesday 24th November.

This is just one of the numerous activities a Parish Councillor can be involved with on behalf of the village. There are currently vacancies on the Parish Council and if you are interested in finding out more please contact the Clerk or one of the current Councillors.

The Parish Council has completed the transfer of the Denham Road phone kiosk from the Community Heartbeat Trust to the village. The Parish Council would like to receive your ideas for future uses for this heritage kiosk, whether a power supply should be maintained and if you are interested in volunteering time to renovate the kiosk.

The Heritage Walk information signs have just been renovated and/or

replaced and a print run of the accompany leaflet has been completed. These provide detailed information of the circular heritage walk around the village. If you live in the village and haven't done the walk, why not take a look.

The Parish Council are still keen to see Community Speed Watch initiatives run in the village. This is a practical way to achieve some speed enforcement measures. If you are interested in volunteering to be part of such a scheme please contact the Clerk. More details are available at:
