

Rising above the parapet

In a few short months the country will be celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of the Queen's Accession to the Throne. An extended bank holiday weekend covering the period **2nd to 5th June** has been set aside for celebrations.

Given a need for some co-ordination of events and given the number of groups within Hoxne and the diverse nature of the activities generated, a few of our number (names below) have set out a framework for events over the four day period, This, it is hoped, will be a basis on which all groups, working individually or together, can help to bring the village together to celebrate our Queen's remarkable period of service to the public.

In Hoxne, starting Thursday the 2nd June we would hope to bring together displays in the Village Hall showcasing the reign. A number of groups including the Heritage Group and The Garden Club are looking at this.

On Friday we believe the Playing Fields committee will be instrumental in putting on a family day, as they did in 2012 to mark the Diamond Jubilee. On





Saturday the PCC will organise, as is normal for the time of year, the village Summer Fete. In the evening Stuart Jarrold is planning a dance in the Village Hall.

On Sunday (5th) the Church is planning a special Service. The Village Voices, our village based choir, has offered to sing songs covering the 70 year reign. Time and venue is to be decided. In support of the weekend in Hoxne, the Parish Council have set aside a funding allocation to assist in some of the costs associated with the weekend. The village Hall are content to make the hall available as



necessary and are in full support of such a programme of events.

This is a framework, it is designed to create space and opportunity for all of us in Hoxne to put their ideas forward to any of the village groups, all of which are key to the life of this lovely Village. It is not as yet "set in stone".

Offers of help are requested now to make bunting. There will also be need nearer the time for help with moving stuff around the village, eg the village has quite a number of chairs but they cannot all be in one place at the same time!

A number of us in Hoxne have Old Cars, some are Classics, some are just old! The sight of them all going up to the Playing Fields from [or to!] the Pub, dressed in



the Red, White and Blue is appealing. Is there someone to step forward and arrange it?

One of the difficulties of Covid over the last two years is that newcomers have found it difficult to engage with an otherwise friendly population because of the restrictions placed on us all. The object here is to be inclusive, so if I have missed reference to a particular group my apologies.

I have been asked about tree planting. This is something that is being particularly encouraged by the Queen's representative in Suffolk, her Lord Lieutenant. Hoxne Parish Council are to discuss this at their next meeting on 3rd March and I am sure would welcome any thoughts on this. The drive towards going green is much in vogue. Tree planting in our own gardens, if that is what you wish, is not ruled out. A total of seventy (trees) seems about right.



New Reeding Woods Group

The woods are now in their winter guise with bare branches standing out against the winter sky. This shows the different

forms of the tree growth clearly; the oaks with branches that grow in bursts and turns whilst the ash has a slender form with trailing branches.



The fallen leaves are dusted with frost on cold mornings with a thin covering of ice

on the pond. In the winter sun the woodland is peaceful and restorative.

Trees can still be identified in winter although deciduous trees will have shed their leaves. The tree will show its characteristic shape and branch form clearly. Further clues are given by thorns,

catkins, bark and fallen leaves.

A good guide can be found on Treeguide.co.uk.

Up in the canopy it is now easier to see a squirrel drey. These look like a messy clump of twigs, moss, grass and leaves built close to the trunk or in the fork of a branch for support. Bird nests tend to

be closer to the top of the tree or further out along the branches.

As the days lengthen signs of spring will appear. In the current win-



ter days the hazel catkins show that quietly nature is stirring.

Hoxne

At the January meeting, it was unanimously agreed to co-opt Chris Parkin of Low Street to the Parish Council. One vacancy remains on the Council. If you are interested in finding out more please contact the Clerk or one of the current Councillors.

The Council considered the budget for the forthcoming financial year commencing 1 April 2022, and it was agreed to lower the precept request for this year to £14,000. Therefore, households will see a decrease in the contribution of the council tax they pay that goes to the Parish Council. This decision was made after consideration of a detailed budget for the forthcoming year, the council's statutory obligations, the level of reserves currently held and the noting that the Council is due to receive Community Infrastructure Levy from developments currently taking place in the village.

HM Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee - June 2022 and the Queen's Green Canopy Tree Planting — The Parish Council has agreed to make money available to established groups in the village to support plans for events over the extended Jubilee celebration weekend (2nd to 5th June 2022). The Parish Council will welcome applications for payments from the allocated £1200 fund as well as hearing of ideas for village celebrations. It is now imperative that plans are taken forward and progressed to deliver events in the village in this commemorative year.

The Parish Council is also keen to plant trees in the village as part of The Queen's Green Canopy initiative. If you would like to be involved with the planting scheme and future maintenance of these trees, please do contact the Parish Council.

Annual Parish Meeting — This annual assembly of the village will take place on Thursday 10th March 2022 in St Edmund's Hall. Before the meeting starts at 7.00 pm, there will be an opportunity from 6.30 pm to visit tables from a range of village organisations and clubs and find out more about all that our village has to offer. Wildlife Trust, ably assisted by hardworking local volunteers, has cleared some of the brambles and blackthorn blocking the footpath over the stretch of common which runs up from our drive, along Grove Road, laying woodchip to help with water absorption and thereby reducing the run-off which has been eroding the bank adjacent to the road and flooding the road itself. They were delighted to encounter two walkers keen

to try it out, just as they had finished!

At the north end of the common is the woody copse where there were once nightingales. I heard one in about 1996 but not since. Some of the villagers who used to live on Grove Road remember lying in bed with



the windows open, listening to them singing. If only we could hear them again. I think the Wildlife Trust are intending to preserve the area of scrub at the north end of the common where they used to sing, so let's hope!

"Workaway" carers

When my wife Anne died 12 years ago, my daughter discovered a website called Workaway which identified carers and matched them with people in need of care. The programme had 20,000 hosts and 40,000 guests. It was not a dating agency - references were needed. I said I needed a driver/companion and not a wife! The essential requirement was the provision of accommodation by the host for a traveller in need.

My daughter Sarah chose the first two Workaway carers and then left selection to me. The first was an elderly builder from France and he helped with providing shelving to accommodate my books.

His successor was a Classics graduate from Edinburgh who took over the shelving work, and also planted trees. She moved on to a job with TUI, in the Med.

One came over from the Hague by ferry and could not adjust to driving on the left-hand side of the road!

The most superb Workaway came from Brazil, a civil servant lawyer from Minhas Gearais who invited me to stay with her in Belo Horizonte and took leave to show me this remarkable country and meet her family.

When I no longer had Abbey Cottage as a base for Workaway, I went to live with my daughter in Sussex in a granny flat. As yet, there is no plan for community care - a market solution may not be affordable!
