Peter, our Postie: a final act of kindness

It was late morning on a rainy Saturday when my doorbell was rung by Peter, our postman.

He told me he didn't actually have a parcel delivery for me as such, but he did have something for me. Before handing it to me he read aloud from a card he was holding, and it said:

"Although I am sad to be retiring as the Hoxne postie, many years ago, as a young postman, I made a pledge to myself - that whatever round I was on, the very last call on my last day would receive a small gift. Well the day of retirement has come and you are the recipient. With my very best wishes, please enjoy. Peter, Hoxne postie (retired)"

And it was me who had the great good fortune to be the last call on the last round that Peter the postman visited on his retirement day. By the time that he'd finished reading his card, emotions were running pretty high. All that I could think of is that this really thoughtful act of generosity exemplified the very kind person we've had in our midst for the last 20 years.



Peter was the type of postman any village would treasure because he was much more than our postie. His was the smiling face that provided reassurance that there was somebody keeping a watchful eye on our community. A kindly word, a helping hand, a thoughtful source of village information - he will be missed.

So I wish our village friend Peter a very long and happy retirement and I add many thanks for my unexpected very generous retirement gift. I know it's normally the other way around - but that is Peter for you.

A Letter from the Hoxne Postman - retired

Following my recent retirement on 19th February, may I say a massive 'Thank You' to the residents of Hoxne, for all the cards received, gifts, well wishes, kindness and your generosity. It has been truly overwhelming, humbling and amazing. Memories made that I will cherish.

When Hoxne residents give you a sendoff, they certainly 'Do it in style'! Too many of you to name individually.

Broadwater, fishing, camping, canoeing -I was always visiting.

I followed my father, Cresswell, into a Post Office career. He started in the 1950s after his Royal Navy National Service. Well-known in Diss and district as a Town Councillor, Mayor, Magistrate at Diss & Thetford, Rotarian and Probus club member. They were Big shoes to fill!

My PO career began on a cold Valentine's Day 1983. Different days then, heavy 'donkey' jackets, no postwomen, and a strict uniform code.

In those days a Post bus service still ran to outlying villages, much missed even now.



Travelling Post Offices, TPOs, still ran on the railways and it was sometimes my job to collect mail off the train. A sight to behold on a freezing winter's night, Diss Railway Station, (not the warmest place to be) as the TPO rolled in, either bound for Norwich or London. Doors were flung open, mailbags (hessian, then) thrown out faster than we could catch, onto waiting barrows. Inside

You know who you are - Thank You. The villagers who came to the green on Saturday 19th gave me a rousing send off. There were promises of cups of tea, or for me to call for a chat and visit in future.

Kind people offered me free rein to paint landscapes on their properties. Not paint their property!

People also asked, "When will I return to give painting lessons or a demonstration"?

Thank You All - I Will Return.

was born in Ipswich, three months prior to the 'Big Freeze of 63', lived in Diss with my parents, then in Roydon for the past 36 years. Hoxne featured in my life from my early teens, swimming in the

the carriage, a hive of activity, as postmen in beige or grey over-jackets, sorted mail in frames, bundled with string for everything Diss and district. Specials and paperwork handed over, a guard's whistle, doors slammed and it was gone as quickly as it had arrived. (Probably about 3 minutes). Thinking back, I could probably fill a chapter just about railway stories!

Only intending to stay 6 months until I found a better job, I stayed almost 40 years! My dad once said to me, "Boy, keep your nose clean and you've got a

job for life"!

Over many years, I delivered to Diss and surrounding villages, favourites being Pulham Market and Gislingham. Early in 2001 an opportunity arose to sign for

Hoxne. It felt like coming home. I already knew the area. The round was compact. whereas some rounds covered more than one village. A pub, shop, garage, school, clubs and societies, a great community spirit and not long since the Hoxne Hoard had been discovered!

Over the past 21 years, I have got to know Hoxne and its residents, made friends and have seen many children develop from babies into adults. People have moved in and out, some sadly passing on. Royal Mail changed over the years but for me it was always being a 'Postie', doing the rounds, that mattered.

I like continuity, relationships built up and being out in all seasons, all weathers, even the wet and windy. I remember delivering to Blo Norton in the Great Storm of 1987, seeing many trees blown down. Driving round fallen trees, up banks, on fields, in an effort to get the mail through. The 'Beast from the East' proved a challenge and we delivered what we could.

I remember another winter when my Morris van ploughed into a snowdrift at Pulham Market, and completely filled the engine compartment with snow. Luckily, I was pulled out by a passing JCB driver then immediately rolled backwards into a

ditch! Happy days. Why Hoxne? For me, Hoxne has a magical, mystical, deeply historical feel. Ghosts and legends. I truly believe there is more history to be unearthed in the village. I love old buildings, differing architecture and curiosities. Plenty of them in Hoxne! In our teens we used to try and buy drinks at the Swan, though

probably under-age. The landlord at the time was a Peter Knight

(no relation). For my 50th Birthday, along with my brother, we canoed the Waveney from source to sea. A story in itself, entitled 'Campfires and Kingfishers', we paddled and camped the 60 or so miles over 5 days, with me trying to sketch and paint scenes at various points. The culmination was an art exhibition at Diss Corn Hall. I still recall vividly, camping, with permission, near Hoxne Watermill.

You may still catch me there, from time to time, gazing across the valley. An artist's Heaven!

In 1977 aged 15, I taught myself to paint

in oils. Despite a lack of information or art products I persevered, read books, (no videos or DVDs then) and gradually

improved.

Artists' acrylic paints were still relatively new at that time too. Lightning's Photographic Studios in Diss, (now Myhills), stocked a few artists' materials and I was a frequent visitor. I still have my very first effort, painted on the hardboard end of an orange-box crate! I still cherish it.

Skipping forward many years, I joined Shelfanger Art Group and eventually ran it for a short while. I have alwavs enjoyed teaching others to paint; I don't know why, it's just in me. I like to help people possibly avoid the many mistakes that I made. A series of oil tuition workshops at Shelfanger Village Hall followed, which proved both popular and successful.

With a family to feed and a mortgage, a rural postman seemed the safer option.

Having said that, the eye of an artist never leaves you. A camera or mobile phone camera, in the right place at the right time, can capture fleeting moments in nature. From floods in the Waveney Valley to watermills and historic buildings, light and shade, all seasons, all weathers. I have been lucky over the years to photograph and access places that possibly only few get to see.

I entered into a job-share contract at Royal Mail to allow me more time to paint and run workshops. Painting was my life. I almost gave Hoxne and the PO up to pursue art full time. I am glad I

didn't.

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



John Harris (the custodian of the website) said 'There is so much walking information on the web but it is difficult



Church News



Some of the most important seasons of the Christian year occur during the next two months. The church uses different colours to mark the different seasons.

Lent, which began on Ash Wednesday (2nd March this year) and continues until Easter, is purple to signal that it is a time of penitence. It is a time to get our selfishness under control, to be generous to others and to focus on God. When we reach Palm Sunday (10th April), the day when Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey, we switch to red, the colour of blood, which signifies both death and life - Christ's death leading to life for us. Red takes us through Holy Week and Good Friday, the day of the crucifixion itself.

All residents in each parish as well as those on the electoral roll of each church are welcome to attend our Annual Meetings to hear about the church's activities over the last year and plans for the future. Now that life is getting back to normal after the pandemic the Hoxne pavilion and playing field is gearing up for a busy summer

Already new groups and organisations are booking the facilities which include ample parking, a bar and social club, a kitchen, changing rooms, toilets and an extensive children's play area with many different types of equipment including a zip wire, swings, slides and climbing frames.

At present there are weekly Tai Chi classes on a Wednesday morning from 10am until 11.130am. If you wish to join, please just turn up to see what Tai Chi is all about. Organiser Cindy Engel explained: "It's 24 step Tai Chi with a friendly group of mixed ability. It's low impact mindful exercise. We welcome newcomers and the first class is free".

A new Baby and Toddler play group is also starting on **April 5**. Organised by the

"Newcomers to the village may not be aware of this fantastic facility we have, tucked away near the primary school, because it has been shut down for two years as a result of Covid," commented Stuart Jarrold, vice chairman of the playing field committee. "Now we are sprucing up the place and it will be all systems go ready for local people to make use of once again."

Many thousands of pounds have been spent on roof repairs, updating the lighting system, refurbishing the changing rooms and showers and generally improving the facilities. There is an ongoing programme of redecoration that will continue in the months ahead. The play area equipment, installed at a cost of around £50,000 only a few years ago, is regularly inspected and maintained in good order.

With the Jubilee celebrations on the first weekend in June a day of activities at the playing field is planned for **Friday June 4**th. It will begin from 10am with an

old vehicle rally, including veteran, vintage or just old cars, motorcycles, farm tractors and equipment, and hopefully old Army trucks.

"We would encourage anyone who has an old vehicle of any type to turn up on the day to join in with the display," said Andrew Banham, chairman of the playing field

Of course there is much more to this lovely old 15th century Inn that we all take for granted every day, and so on January 15th a number of Heritage Group members were fortunate enough to explore parts of the Swan's interior not normally open to the public.

The visit organised by Richard and Chris was part of the ongoing study that Richard is conducting into ritual protection marks and this will form part of a presentation to be made on the subject by Richard on March 15th.

Many examples of both cut and burn marks were identified at various locations around fireplaces and door frames Interestingly

upstairs in a room in a former stair wing is a fine example of a stuccoed fireplace over which is an early 18th century cartouche showing a resurrection scene. It's thought this room is likely to have been a private chapel for a Roman Catholic family.

All in all this was a most interesting and enlightening experience and we are indebted to Lisa and Mick for allowing us into their home on an otherwise very

busy day for them.

On February 8th we held our first AGM since 2020 and with the view to a more stable outlook plans are now being made for a number of events over the coming months. In June we shall be supporting the Jubilee celebrations with a display in the Village Hall looking at Hoxne through each of the decades of her Majesty's reign from the 1950s to through to the 2020s. If anyone has photographs or memorabilia from these years we shall be pleased to hear from you.

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The Bells

Ringing has continued at Oakley on Tuesday evenings and we have started two new ringers who are progressing very satisfactorily. Special thanks to Chris Davies and Betty Baines for their instruction and for the use of Regrave where many of us ring on Thursdays.



The St Davids bell being removed from Bangor for storage. The bells have got their wooden headstocks still on and the white colour on the bells is bird lime. The tower has not been bird-proof and Bangor is a coastal location

The faculty for moving the organ has been granted by the diocese and this will hopefully take place in April. There will be tidying up to do in the base of the tower after the organ has gone and I hope we will be able to organise a volunteer group to help with this later in April.

The donation of a set of eight bells from St David's church Bangor has been accepted by the Hoxne PCC. St David's is being sold and the set of eight bells have been purchased by the Keltek Trust who have kindly allocated them to Hoxne. They were cast in 1888, (quite modern by church bell standards) and have had 78 peels rung on them (a moderate number for bells). The tenor is 13cwt so they are an ideal size and will fit comfortably in a new steel bell frame in our tower. After

restoration and tuning they should be an excellent peel.

Four of our existing five bells will be replaced, after preservation work, in their original wooden bell frame at the top of Hoxne tower. They will be hung stationary but a chiming system will enable them to be rung whenever and however for services or as clock chimes etc. This is dependant on an inspection of the wooden frame that will have taken place before you read this and, of course, on successful fund raising. Our 5th bell will become part of a display about the bells in the church.

The Bells project is moving forward. We will need another faculty soon and some serious fund raising after that.

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

Our thanks to everyone already involved in the preparations. If you want to join us, please contact the Parish Council.


During the winter the Council commissioned a survey of Syleham's footpaths with Dr Paddy Tanton. Her report with recommendations was presented at the March 2nd meeting and highlights will be published on the village website. The survey was much praised by both Council and our District Councillor. We now feel we have a blueprint for the restoration of this most valuable village asset.

The new dog bins are proving popular with dog owners and walkers. Usage is making enjoyment of the countryside a more pleasant experience for both parties. Such is the success we are planning for more bins this year, thanks to additional funding from the District Council.

Our thanks to Councillors Malcolm Flounders and Robert Pilch who restored the ditches at the bottom of Wingfield Road.

Our next Parish Council Meeting will take place on May 25th at the Village Hall.

Wingfield





Our last meeting in December was conducted by "zoom", a first for the Parish Council.

It began with a big thank you to the Covid Support team and those individually who have supported our more vulnerable neighbours. We repeat this expression of gratitude in March along with appreciation of the Suffolk Community Foundation grant that has enabled us to offer free transport to vaccination centres — an offer we can extend to the end of May.

Despite the lockdown the Council has made progress in bringing a defibrillator to the village. In short time electricity will be reconnected to the phone box enabling us to install the resuscitation unit at a total cost of £4,000. Training in its use will be held at the Village Hall.

If Covid-19 was not enough, flooding has affected both Church Road and Low Road. The former requires unblocking of drainage ditches and the latter the building of functional drainage and reengineering the camber of the road. Both Suffolk Highways and adjacent land owners have been informed of the work required.

Work on "topping" the Green has been completed according to our rotation scheme that includes the establishment of an untouched area for the study of flora and fauna.

The planters on Castle Crescent Green have been rejuvenated with new planting by Eleanor Carroll and her team. Our thanks to them all for the uplifting result.

The costs involved in supporting the Council's work and deliver against our responsibilities to residents continues to increase when funding from elsewhere is becoming more restricted. Our income requirements for 2021/2022 are reflected in the increase to the Precept to be announced in the Council Tax statement you will receive in March.

New Reeding Woods Group

Snowdrops are already fading as spring progresses and the primroses and celandines are now blossoming. Birds can already be observed collecting nesting materials or singing to establish their mating territories. We shall be leaving the wood quiet for the next few weeks, so the natural cycle of new life can begin again.

That new life is also stirring in the wood pond. Suffolk (along with Cheshire) is blessed with the highest density of ponds in England. Suffolk also boasts the largest population of the rare and protected Great Crested Newt.

Our pond hosts both Common (or Smooth) and Great Crested newts. The third native species, Palmate newt, is absent as it has a distinct preference for shallow ponds on acid-rich soils. It is most commonly found on heathland in the south and west, and in the north on

moorland and bogs, although it has been discovered recently in ponds near Epping in Essex.

Crested newt is the largest of the three species, with adult males growing to around 15cm and the females being slightly larger. They can live up to 25 years. This species has distinctive dark brown to black, bumpy or pimply skin and both sexes have orange bellies with large spots. In the breeding season, males develop a large, distinctly 'M'-shaped crest along their backs, contrasting with the smaller, straighter crest of the male Common newts.

Much of their life is actually spent on land away from water, in rough grass, log heaps, rubble and even beneath hedges. In spring though, they move into ponds to mate and lay eggs. All newt eggs are individually folded or wrapped in pond plant leaves, each newt species having markedly different coloured eggs. Larvae metamorphose into juvenile 'efts' and, once mature, leave the ponds by August.

Young newts take from two to four



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years to reach breeding age. From October they hibernate in tree roots, log and rubble piles and emerge again from February... and the cycle begins again.

The Great Crested newt, and especially its habitat, are both strictly protected and should be left

undisturbed, especially during the active mating and breeding season. Please keep your dogs out of the pond, especially in spring and early summer, so the newts can display, court, mate and egg-lay successfully and in peace.

Annual surveys of the newts in the woodland pond reveal how the population is developing. These are normally carried out in April by licensed personnel and in accordance with the regulations. We will let you know the results of this year's survey later in the year; the photos included with this article are from a previous year.

Please make use of the notebook in the display board at the wood, to write down your observations of wildlife. In past years newts, cowslips, yellow hammers, chaffinches and goldfinches, have been recorded in March and April. Bats will also be coming out of hibernation in March and April and can be seen hunting insects at dusk: the common pipistrelle bat has been seen at the wood and further surveys for other species are planned.

Recording Claylands Creatures

As part of our Claylands Wilder Connections Project we are running Citizen Science Campaigns. Each season we're asking you to record your sightings of three species that make a home in the South Norfolk Claylands, to help us get a better picture of the areas that support these creatures, and how they are faring, to help guide future conservation work.

The song thrush, the common frog, and the hedgehog are the second set of species to be selected because of their association with spring and new beginnings and their reliance on connected habitats to thrive.

We need to know what you saw, where and when.

All three of these species are declining in rural and urban areas and the overarching causes for their decline are: changes in agriculture, an increase in the urbanization of areas, fragmented habitats, and a lack of connectivity in the environment. The Claylands Wilder Connections project aims to work with landowners, communities, and volunteers to 'stitch together the fabric of the countryside' by creating, restoring, and enhancing habitats to benefit local wildlife within the Claylands Living Landscape area.

My Book Life

My mother bought the ten volumes of Arthur Mee's Children's Encyclopaedias when we were quite small. She also sent me to the newsagent on Saturday morning to buy the Children's Newspaper, which Mee edited. They were very important in our early education. I wonder what happened to them?

I cannot recall my grammar school having a library, but we used the public



library nearby. I always won the school prize for maths. I had to consult and choose, and the school crest was embossed in gold on the front cover and the prize

labelled inside. I won a shorter OED one year which travelled the world with me for more than 60 years but sadly has disappeared in my recent move back to Sussex.

I became Education Officer on HMS Formidable, in charge of the ship's excellent library and it proved a crucial resource in my work, as my 1945 diary reveals. Its reference section was outstanding - without it, I could not have done my job.

In Uganda we had the modest CMS Bookshop in Kampala. Nothing racy. In Bunyoro the young Clerk of the Rukurato, George Magezi, asked if he could borrow books from me. We became friends. He became Deputy Prime Minister of Uganda late in 1962, and it was he who phoned and asked me to stay on for three years to run Education - a turning point in my career. The book he borrowed had helped us both.

But I misjudged the USP Fiji librarian who built the Dar es Salaam University Library. I gave him a free hand to work with our architect to design it. He was

young and although his experience included the Spence Rome Embassy, nothing tropical. As our VC refused air conditioning on campus, Harold asked for

wide open spaces with no internal walls, just shelving for separation. There was hurricane shuttering and mosquito gauze but in the next hurricane, the library

roof took off and ruined the collection! We could not afford the enormous hurricane insurance premium for any of our buildings, so this major UK aid project was not insured. However, the Australian government came to the rescue and built us a new library.

Thirty IKEA Billy bookcases @ £ 29.99 each became the basis for our Suffolk library.

When we moved to Suffolk there was a second-hand bookshop in the centre of Harleston. When it closed, a shop selling new books opened. There were two buildings fringing the Budgens carpark. In one, the owner had built a massive scale model of the Jerusalem temple, drawing on OT and archaeological data. It was a visitor attraction until he moved it home and started instead a wonderful second-hand bookshop in one building, and a general second-hand goods shop in the other.

My good neighbours have found me some well-chosen books - one I reviewed

in our monthly Quaker Book Club: "Queen of the Desert" about Gertrude Bell, whom I rate as one of the greatest UK women ever. It contains a 1919

by the Sphinx with

picture of her by the Sphinx with Churchill and Lawrence either side - all three seated on camels. They settled the fate of Mesopotamia after WW1.

I must get a copy of Lawrence's "Seven Pillars" as my old copy is now in the great maw.

Voices from the past

Dec 1988 - Jan 1989

When Village Voice was asked to contribute to the Showcase of Hoxne Clubs and Activities at the Annual Parish Meeting in March Lesley and I decided to take along some of the back numbers of the magazine that I had been hoarding. It turned out I had all of them back to Summer 1997! 25 years! Then I discovered that Margaret Sillis, Hoxne Village Recorder and Secretary of the Heritage Group, had copies going back to December 1988/January 1989.

I flicked through some of those early issues with growing nostalgia for events and characters from my earlier years in the Village. Some of those characters are still with us of course and may enjoy the nostalgia as much as I am doing. More recent residents may enjoy them too. Anyway, I decided to pick through some of the history and share it with other readers.

It seems community spirit was thriving around the time of that Dec 88/Jan89 issue. In his introductory editorial, Friend and Vicar Tony Lowe listed pleasurable fundraising events for the Church restoration fund including a trip to Leeds

Castle organised by Richard Herbert with a 'delicious lunch provided by the Ladies of the Church', a cheese and wine party at the vicarage, a concert in the church by Bill Richards, the late organist and some of his pupils and a bonfire and fireworks display at the playing field for which he thanked Nigel Bradford and many hardworking people.

He also reported the receipt of £24,000 from the estate of Mrs Frances Self, late of High House (according to the Royal Mail postcode finder that could be

Church Hill Hoxne or Hoxne Road Denham).

Fifty-eight cyclists were recorded at the

church gate during the annual Historic Churches Trust bike ride and 46 at the Baptist chapel, which was evidently still active at that time. Sums of £365



and £30, respectively, were reported by Philip Gunton.

Funds were also being raised for the British Legion (Hon Sec-Treasurer, Reg Baxter), and the new pavilion at the playing field with a coffee evening, raffle and planned dance at the village hall. Mrs C Smith, Chairman of the Harvest Breakfast, was thanked for a donation of £125 to Village Voice. Hoxne discos were being organised by Denny Davies at St Edmunds Hall, with funds raised for multiple local causes.

Hoxne Theatre Club was active with, among several others, a trip to see

Gaslight at the Wolsey Theatre in Ipswich.
Reference was made to 'You Know Who's visit on Christmas morning' with 'You Know What's being accepted by his agents Colin Moore and Dudley Nelson'. Reports were presented for the Mothers' Union (Gladys Pattemore), Denham and

Hoxne W.I, and the Christmas Fair.

A bus timetable was included that indicated there was one bus on Tuesday morning each week to Ipswich and one back again in the afternoon.

The first advertisers were Denham Engineering, Chapman and Feetham Builders, the Post Office Low Street (videos for hire from 75p to £1.95, selection changes weekly, pet foods and accessories, wild bird food, seeds, peanuts) and Hobby House (located in the old butchers shop, Low Street, selling

craft and hobbyist supplies).

One thing was sadly familiar, with two thirds of a column occupied by a Letter to The Editor about dogs fouling the village, particularly along verges to footpaths leading to the school. The writer reported witnessing a "lady" allowing her dog to foul the grass by the school gate and just walking away when challenged!

A second letter, from Vivienne Bradford and David Weller praised and thanked John and Jean Chapman of Hegilsdune for production of the 'first and second issues of Village Voice'. I guess that makes my earliest one, reviewed here, the third issue. It also thanks the two typists, Joan and Ann. I don't know but I imagine these two might be Joan Dale (now Garnham) and Annie Liversidge, late of 4 Cross Street.

Finally we were given two poems and a couple of recipes, one of which is worth reproducing here. It was apparently taken from the back of Volume II, The Jubilee Year Hoxne Cook Book (I wonder if anyone would know which jubilee that might have been).

Recipe for Preserving Children



1 Grass-grown field ½ doz children (or more) Several dogs or puppies (if available) 1 Brook Pebbles

Pour children and dogs into field allowing to mix well.

Pour brook over pebbles until slightly frothy.

When children are nicely brown, cool in warm bath.

When dry, serve with milk and fresh baked gingerbread.

There is plenty more where this came from if anyone is interested!
