### Frenze Beck Nature Reserve 1P22 4GG

The Frenze Beck nature reserve covers 14.5 acres in Diss and has been recently restored after a period of neglect, during which it became overgrown and inaccessible. A network of paths has been created to take you through a mosaic of different habitats, including dry and damp meadow, ponds, hedgerows, ditches, reed beds and scrub. These provide cover and feed for a variety of wildlife and support many wildflower and plant species throughout the year.



The footpaths around the nature reserve are always open to pedestrians, but the car park is locked in the evenings and overnight. Walkers (and dogs, provided they are on a lead during the nesting season) are always welcome.

Please respect and protect the site and its wildlife by keeping to the paths, picking up after your dog and using the dog bins at both reserve entrances.

### St Andrew, Wingfield

**O**n 26<sup>th</sup> April we said a final farewell to Air Commodore Bernard Wellingham, who died on 30<sup>th</sup> March at the age of 96. Large numbers of mourners attended his funeral, a testimony to all he had done for the village of Wingfield, for the Royal British Legion and many other organisations, and for St Andrew's Church itself. Bernard led the major programme of restoration work on the church which took place in the 1990s and his contribution is commemorated in an engraved lozenge in one of the clerestory windows. He was a good friend and will be very much missed.

More cheerfully, a very successful fundraising coffee morning was held on 2<sup>nd</sup> April at Syleham and Wingfield Village Hall, organized by Jacky Taylor, and a highly enjoyable concert of baroque music took place in the church on 24th April, with soprano Melanie Mehta, Peter Demetriadi on the harpsichord, mezzosoprano Caroline Abbott and the Wingfield Church choir. Together these two events raised more than £1,000 towards the urgent repairs required to the church.

During Holy Week we welcomed a party of pilgrims from the Essex Leg of Pilgrim Cross who were walking from Colchester to Walsingham and stopped in Wingfield for tea and cake, followed by a short service sitting on the grass by the south door (see photo above).

Our Annual Meeting was held on 7<sup>th</sup> May. A number of Parochial Church Council members have stepped down, so we have vacancies for new members. If you feel you could contribute to the life of the church in this way, please get in touch.

### St Peter & Paul, Hoxne

**O**n 23rd April the church of St Peter and St Paul with St Edmund, Hoxne held our Annual Vestry Meeting and Annual Parochial Church Meeting. It would be easy just to publish the minutes of the meeting but with nearly six pages of reports, few will have time to read them so I will try to summarize.

There were no other nominations for church wardens, so Guy McGregor and Wilf White volunteered to continue in their positions. The other existing members of the Parochial Church Council were also re-elected. They are Caroline Abbott, Andrew Castleden, Deborah Harding, David Hyde, Anne Swann and John Swann with our priest, the Revd Eleanor Goodison, in the chair. That leaves us with one vacancy if anyone would like to join us.

On the financial side there was an overall deficit of £4,533 but this will be significantly reduced when we have received Gift Aid.

Wilf White presented the Churchwardens' Report. An extract follows:

As we have emerged from the pandemic, we have been able to make real progress with a number of exciting plans for the church:

- \* We now have the "faculty" the church equivalent of planning permission - for the St Edmund chapel and for moving the organ to the north aisle. The beautiful icon of St Edmund, which has been very generously donated to the church, will be installed soon and the plan is that the chapel will be formally dedicated at a special service later this year.
- \* Largely thanks to Andrew Castleden, excellent progress is also being made with the project to restore our bells. We hope to be able to submit a faculty soon.

\* We also hope that we shall soon be able to seek a faculty and planning permission for a new loo on the site of the current sheds to the north of the church, along with improved access to the north door from the car park. A great deal of thought and work has gone into the development and design of this project.

We have not neglected general maintenance and repairs and Andrew Castleden has done sterling work at the top of the tower and investigating leaks in the roof. But we still have quite a bit of further work to do.

We have also been discussing how we can best expand the churchyard for further burials. We do rather hope that we will not run out of space too quickly of course, but we shall certainly need more space in the next few years.

#### Spending those pennies

In the last Survey of the Village, residents identified that the provision of a lavatory at the Church was a high priority. Hoxne PCC took this on board and instructed the architect to produce plans.

It was concluded that as there were no suitable spaces in the Church a scheme attaching a new building to the North Door was produced. Unfortunately, this scheme became more than the PCC concluded it could justify. With the appointment of a new architect a more realistic scheme was produced.

The new scheme:

The adaption of a high specification "Office Garden" style building was put into plans.

Pre-Application Enquiries with Mid Suffolk District Council (local Development Planning Control Authority), Diocesan Advisory Committee (Faculty Authority) and Historic England (Statutory Consultee) have all been concluded. All these have indicated support for the project.

The Architect has now been instructed to apply for Planning Permission, Listed Building Consent and a Faculty for the Project.

The PCC hopes to complete the project in time for the Visit of the Suffragan Bishop on 4 December 2022.

### Hoxne Bell Ringers

We have had a successful couple of months with members of the team taking part in a couple of quarter peals and regular ringing at both Oakley and Redgrave. A quarter peal takes about 45 minutes and takes changes 1250 changes are good fun when they work! Our two most recent members continue to make impressive progress in the art of bell ringing.

There have also been changes in Hoxne church. The organ has been moved from the base of the tower to the north aisle and has left a large space and lots of light in the west end of the nave. This will improve the musical participation in church services and is necessary to enable the bell restoration to go ahead.

Meetings are being set up with the

church architect to apply for our next faculty. These are permissions from the diocese to make changes to the church. This one will be about the preservation of our existing bells and the hanging of our donated eight bells from the Keltek Trust. There has been an engineering inspection of the old wooden bell frame and tower, which found everything satisfactory for our proposed work.

The local bell ringers are going to try and ring in every ringable bell tower in



the area to celebrate the Queen's Platinum jubilee. This will take place on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> and Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> of June and involve relays of ringers and the ringing of bells that have been silent for many years.

A bell ringers' outing is being planned in July with other local ringers. This will enable us to ring at a number of towers we would otherwise not visit and will also be a great social occasion.

We are always looking for people who would like to learn bell ringing or who want to restart a paused ringing career.

# THE JUBILEE YEAR 1977 HOXNE COOK BOOK

### **Yum Yum Cake**

Anon. Hoxne

Base:

2 oz/50g brown sugar

3 oz/75g margarine

6 oz/150g SR flour

2 egg yolks

1/2 tsp vanilla essence

Тор:

2 egg whites

1 oz/25g cherries (chopped)

1 oz/25g walnuts (chopped)

4 oz/100g caster sugar

*Base:* Cream margarine and brown sugar together, beat in egg yolks and vanilla essence. Stir in flour.

*Top:* Beat egg whites until stiff. Add caster sugar, cherries and walnuts. Spread evenly over base.

Bake at 350° Mark 4/180°C for 20-30 mins. (Better when eaten the next day).

### **Bread Pudding**

From Mrs D Burridge, Hoxne

4 oz/100g stale bread (soaked in water overnight)

2 tblsp sugar

1/4 tsp mixed spices

1 pint/570ml milk

1 egg

1 oz/25g margarine

3 oz/75g currants/sultanas



Heat milk with margarine.

Squeeze bread as dry as possible, and beat with a fork.

Pour milk with marg over bread, add sugar, fruit, spice and beaten egg.

Stir thoroughly.

Pour mixture into greased pie dish. Cook in moderate oven for one hour.

### Demerara Cake

From Mrs Rose, Hoxne

4 oz/100g margarine

2 tbsp golden syrup

2 eggs

Few drops Vanilla essence

2½oz/60g Demerara sugar

Grated orange peel

6 oz/150g SR flour

Use creamed method for baking. Bake at  $350^{\circ}/180^{\circ}C$ .

### Shortbread

From Mrs R Lawes, Hoxne

#### 9 oz/225g plain flour

6 oz/150g butter or margarine



### 3 oz/75g caster sugar

Mix flour and sugar in bowl. Rub in butter. Knead well. Cut into biscuit shapes. Bake at 325°-350° or Mark 3-4 / 180°C for 25-30 minutes.



1 lb of true love

- 1 lb of trust and confidence
- 1 lb of cheerfulness
- 1 large pinch of unselfishness
- 2 tablespoons of give and take

Mix with one pint of the milk of human kindness and bake well all your life.

### Carefree Cake

From Mrs LE Last, Hoxne

4 oz/100g butter

2 eggs

6 oz/150g fruit (2 oz/50g currants, 2 oz/50g sultanas, 2 oz/50g seeded raisins)

4 oz/100g Demerara sugar

Pinch 6 oz/150g SR flour

#### A little milk if necessary

Cream butter and sugar together. Beat the eggs and add one at a time. Add the fruit and allow to stand for an hour. Beat in the sifted flour and add milk, if necessary.

Bake at  $325^{\circ}$  or Mark 3 /  $170^{\circ}$ C for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours, middle of oven.

### **Rich Madeira Cake**

From Mrs A Sheffield, Hoxne

1% oz/35g SR flour

1/2 tsp almond essence

5 oz/125g caster sugar

3 eggs, separated

3 oz/75g ground almonds

#### 4 oz/100g margarine or butter

Cream fat and sugar well. Add egg yolks singly, then the essence, flour and almonds. Beat well. Beat the whites of egg stiffly and fold into the mixture. Put in a greased and lined loaf tin. Bake at  $325^{\circ}/170^{\circ}$ C for  $1-1\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

### Victorian Apple Sauce Cake

From Mrs D Banham, Hoxne

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tbsps melted butter
- 1 tsp ground ginger



- 1 tsp ground cloves
- 1 cup seedless raisins (cook first in a little water)

Pinch of salt

- 1 heaped cup of apple sauce (not too juicy)
- 1 level tsp bicarb. of soda (in a little hot water to dissolve)

#### 1 ½ cups plain flour

Mix all ingredients together. Bake rather slowly for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours at  $350^{\circ}$  or Mark 4 /  $180^{\circ}$ C.

### **Baked Rhubarb Betty**

From Mrs C Buday, Hoxne

1½ lb/700g rhubarb

3 oz/75g sugar

Juice of 2 oranges

Crumb mixture:

2 oz/50g butter

6 oz/150g course breadcrumbs

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> - 1 tsp powdered cinnamon

4 oz/100g brown or white sugar

Grated rind of 1-2 oranges

Melt butter in pan, then blend rest of ingredients for crumb mixture. Cut rhubarb into neat pieces. Put half the rhubarb into 2-pint pie dish with half the orange juice and half the sugar. Press half the crumb mixture on top of fruit, cover with the rest of the rhubarb, orange juice and sugar. Press rest of crumb mixture over top.

Bake at 375° or Mark 4-5 / 190°C for 30-40 mins until crisp and golden brown.

### **Baked Lemon Pudding**

From Mrs Lowe, Framlingham

- 1 large lemon
- 3 oz/75g caster sugar

#### 2 eggs

8 fl oz milk (1/2 pint less 4 tbsps) warmed (230ml)

2 oz/50g butter (softened to room temperature)

2 level tsps SR flour

#### Pie dish which will hold 1 ½ pts liquid

Butter inside of pie dish. Cream butter and sugar and work the grated lemon rind in. Separate the eggs. Work the yolks into the creamed mixture, then the flour, lemon juice, and the warm milk.

Beat the egg whites until they form soft peaks and fold them gently into the mixture. Turn the mixture into the pie dish. Stand the dish in a roasting tin with hot water to come half-way up the side of the dish.

Bake at 350° or Mark 4 /180°C for 30-35 minutes until firm and browned. Serve at once.



### Aunt Sallie's Tea Loaf

From Mrs P Kirwan, Hoxne

1 lb/450g dried mixed fruit

½ pint/570ml warm tea

2 tbsp marmalade

8 oz/200g sugar

1 egg

#### 1 lb/450g SR flour

Soak fruit with sugar and tea overnight. Stir egg and marmalade into fruit and mix well with flour. Pour into two 1-lb loaf tins. Bake at 325° for 1¾ hours. Cool in tins for 15 minutes. Will freeze very well and keep for four months.

### Banana Nut Bread

From Mrs Crisp, Hoxne

8 oz/200g SR flour

2 oz/50g margarine

2 oz/50g chopped walnuts

2 bananas, mashed

A little milk

**Pinch salt** 

3 oz/75g caster sugar

1 beaten egg

#### 3 oz/75g golden syrup

Sift flour with salt. Rub in margarine. Add sugar and walnuts. Blend beaten egg with golden syrup and stir in bananas. Pour into dry ingredients and mix well. Add a little milk if stiff. Turn into greased 2 lb loaf tin.

Bake at 350<sup>o</sup> Mark 4 /180<sup>o</sup>C for about an hour. Slice and butter when cold.

Cut and Come Again Cake

From Mrs P Elsey, Eye

1 lb/450g SR flour

¼ lb/100g lard

1 lb/450g mixed fruit

Pinch of salt

Milk to mix

¼ lb/100g margarine

6 oz/150g sugar

1/2 tsp mixed spice

2 eggs

Rub margarine and lard into flour, add salt, sugar, fruit and spice. Mix together with eggs and milk.

Bake at 350° or Mark 4/180°C for 1½-2 hours

### Strawberry Sauce

From J Carter, Hoxne

1 lb/450g fresh strawberries

6 oz/150g caster sugar

Juice of 2 lemons

Place all the ingredients in a blender or crush and mash. The puree is then deep frozen in small quantities for use as a sauce for ice cream, steamed pudding, or poured over fresh orange segments.

Can also be used to make strawberry mousse, in trifles with pears, or just to add flavour to frozen strawberries.



This was a thoroughly informative and entertaining summary of the study he has undertaken into several local properties. As well as learning much more about the houses in which many of us have lived for years, we also found out that Aldersyde Cottage was once a pub!

Following a successful visit by some of the group to the Waveney Valley Heritage Centre in Brockdish last autumn, we accepted an invitation to provide a speaker at one of their monthly meetings.

Once again Richard stepped up to the challenge with his excellent talk on the

subject of Harriet Pentney, otherwise known as the Angel of Hoxne. Drawing on information from her diary, Richard provided a detailed insight into the day to day activities of a local Sick Nurse in the last quarter of the nineteenth century. He also painted a vivid picture of a society where there were no antibiotics or vaccinations and where everyday utilities such as running water and drainage had not yet arrived.

Looking to the future, our next event will be the display in the village hall on June 2nd celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. This will feature village events, activities and personalities from each of the decades of her Majesty's seventy year reign. Please do come along and reminisce with us.

**Medical Detection Dogs** - this was our talk in April when we learnt a lot more about Medical Alert Assistance Dogs.

For over 10 years this charity has been training dogs to save lives using their amazing sense of smell. They are trained to recognise not only cancer, but other illnesses and allergies people suffer from, many of which are life-threatening. Using the power of their nose, these assistance dogs can be trained to detect even the faintest changes in the smell of their human partner.

Sixty percent of dogs trained are labradors but other dogs can be accepted for a 2-year training as well. Obviously they must have a good temperament, be friendly and have a good sense of smell. The result for the families involved is that it gives them confidence, independence, freedom and the possibility of reducing hospitalisation.

Seven thousand people now use Assisted Dogs and they are recognised by the official red dog coats worn.

After the meeting we had a voluntary collection towards the society and £45 was raised - the Speaker had already donated her fee to the society so that meant £90 in all.

## Hoxne

At the Parish Council's Annual General Meeting on 5 May Councillor Kath Farthing was unanimously re-elected as Chairman of the Parish Council.

There are currently three vacancies for Councillors. Hoxne, like all local councils, need active, interested and committed people to serve and get involved in their work. The Council works as a team and no one person has all the solutions for its community. However, through engagement with the electorate and undertaking free professional training that is available, you will be better placed to deal with the interesting range of issues that arise.

Speak to any one of the existing councillors to find out more.

#### HM Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee June 2022

The Parish Council has been pleased to offer financial support to various organisations for events over the Jubilee weekend.

Each year the Council has a grants budget available and welcomes applications as per the Grant Awarding policy published on the Parish Council website or available on request from the Clerk.

#### Planning

The Parish Council has been asked to respond to the Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Opinion for pig units to be sited at two locations in the village, namely Bungalow Farm, Nuttery Vale and Land North of Chickering Road, Heckfield Green.

The Parish Council has asked for HGV movements to be considered, including the cumulative impacts (weight, frequency, timings of HGV traffic, noise from vehicles and livestock contained within), the impacts (noise and odour) of increased operation, and planned routes of access and egress in the village from the proposed sites, impact on the historic landscape and the traffic movements from regeneration of the existing site at Shreeves Farm.

#### **Traffic and HGVs**

At the June meeting, the Parish Council will consider, and put questions to the County Councillor, on the plan to implement an experimental Traffic Regulation Order limiting HGV traffic entering Eye Town Centre from the south (Lowgate Street) and from the east (Castle Street).

The Traffic Regulation Order is experimental to allow an assessment of the impact of the restriction on surrounding settlements and businesses. The experimental order may be made permanent or withdrawn depending on the evaluation made.

The Parish Council is aware that many residents are concerned for HGV movements through the village but has limited powers to act in these matters which are the responsibility of the Highways Authority (Suffolk County Council).

# New Reeding Woods Group

#### "Oak before ash, in for a splash Ash before oak, in for a soak"

A very dry spring has held back a lot of trees this year, certainly the oak is leading the ash. However these two trees usually come into leaf around the same time. The oak tree is largely influenced by temperature and this spring has been mild. The ash tree is more strongly influenced by hours of daylight. As our climate changes the oaks have been coming into leaf earlier and so are better able to compete for canopy space in woodlands.

#### Apple blossom



Trees figure large in folklore and tradition together with being widely used in rural industry and medicine. In British folklore the ash was seen as a healing tree while carrying an acorn was thought to prevent illness and promote longevity.

Oak bark was used in the tanning of leather, the acorns provided food for pigs and the wood earned the tree its name as the "builders tree". Elderflowers were used as a remedy for both colds and arthritis as they have anti-septic and anti-inflammatory properties. Nowadays the flowers are more likely to be used for cordial or to flavour stewed gooseberries. In early spring hawthorn leaves were eaten as a source of green food and were known as "bread and cheese". Cowslips



The woodland is full of cowslips, although these are starting to go over now. The pond will have benefitted from the recent rain and the hawthorn is looking glorious. The Great Crested Newt survey has had to be postponed but please can you continue to keep dogs out of the pond so they can continue to breed in peace. I was lucky enough to see a beautiful grass snake but it did not want its photo taken.

A closing thought is a favourite proverb - "If you want to be happy for a year, plant a garden; if you want to be happy for life, plant a tree."

### Voices from the past

### February-March 1989

This time I have been looking at the Feb/March 1989 issue and was amused to read:

'WANTED!! ANY INTERESTING TOPICS OF EVERYDAY VILLAGE LIFE, PAST AND PRESENT. ED'.

The vicar's editorial told us that courage can overcome suffering and acknowledged the heroism and dedication of many who were victims of a harrowing list of disasters during December and January.

Armenia had suffered a serious earthquake with the loss of up to 50,000 lives and destruction of half a million buildings. It was during the dissolution of the USSR and it was reported as the first time the Soviet Union had accepted aid from the US Government since WWII. It was the optimistic era of Gorbachev, Reagan and Bush, as the cold war came to a close... supposedly.

Three or four trains had collided at Clapham Junction because of signal failure, owing to a wiring fault, with the loss of 35 lives.

There were 270 deaths in Lockerbie when Pan Am Flight 103 exploded over Scotland at 31,000ft, including 11 residents on the ground.

British Midlands Flight 092 had crashed onto a motorway embankment at Kegworth, Leicestershire with 47 killed and 74 injured.



Meanwhile, normal life continued in our villages. The Bowls Club reported the success of the previous season, crowned with winning the Lord Huntingfield Cup at Yarmouth.

# AFC Hoxne Football Club 1999-2018

**AFC** Hoxne Saturday Football Club operated for 19 consecutive seasons in the Ipswich Football League. Weekend football in Hoxne functioned continually from the end of WW2 to 2018–Saturday 1946-1976 and 1999-2018, and on Sunday from 1968 to 2000.

The original AFC Hoxne manager was the late David 'Skinny' Muttitt, who lived

to see Hoxne pull off a major trophy triumph (as he predicted they would).

In 2002 Dennington (Ed Sheeran country) were beaten 3-1 by Hoxne in the final of the Suffolk Primary Cup at Haughley.

In the early season, Hoxne moved seamlessly from the bottom of the League (Division 8) through to Division 2, where they stayed for quite a few seasons.

The arrival on the scene of Jamie Scales in 2011 as Manager saw the team progress to Division 1, and then in 2017 made the top senior division.



In 2016 Hoxne had

pulled off another major trophy success, beating Henley 2-0 in the Suffolk Junior Cup Final at Portman Road, Ipswich FC ground.

AFC Hoxne's one season in the top flight before the club folded saw them finish 11<sup>th</sup> out of 16, the highlight being a 6-2 win at Grundisburgh.

Fiona Chapman was the long-serving initial Club Secretary (her husband Paul was the Chairman) and Richard Farthing the final Secretary.

I was Club President for all 19 years.
