Harvest



Harvest-time is already upon us. We will celebrate Lammas - from "Loaf Mass", the offering of the first loaf from the first harvest - at Hoxne church at 6.00 pm on Monday 1st August [note change of date from that previously advertised]. The service is organized in conjunction with the Addington Fund which helps farming families in times of need and it will be followed by a hog roast and refreshments.

Our main harvest services may be some way off still - although we have our first at Athelington on 11th September - but harvesting itself will be going forward around us through these two months. We give thanks for this, remembering those parts of the world where harvests are disrupted by climate change and war.

The Bible is full of references to harvest. Ruth and Naomi arrive in Jerusalem at the beginning of the barley harvest, and it is in the context of the harvest that Ruth becomes known to Boaz, her future husband. They are to be the great-grandfather and greatgrandmother of King David. And who can forget the poetry of psalm 65?

You crown the year with your bounty;

your wagon tracks overflow with richness.

The pastures of the wilderness overflow,

the hills gird themselves with joy,

the meadows clothe themselves with flocks,

the valleys deck themselves with grain,

they shout and sing together for joy.

Jesus himself, as he sends out seventy disciples ahead of him, speaks of a harvest of people: "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest". Words which are picked up in the harvest hymn: "Grant, O harvest Lord, that we/ wholesome grain and pure may be".

Whether you are harvesting, holidaying or preparing for a new school or university year, I wish you every blessing.

Sonny was a young man at the start of his adult life, looking forward to going to university, keen to pursue his football, full of hope for the future. We lament his loss with his family and many friends and pray for his soul. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

We are most grateful to Wingfield Parish Council for their annual financial contributions to the maintenance of the churchyard. This year the Council has generously made an additional contribution to help us reduce the size of an over-large tree which overshadows part of the church and prevents it drying out after rain. We are also very gratéful to Wingfield Barns for hosting a Fete on 7th August in support of the church please come along!

But we still need more support. Recent surveys of the church building have uncovered an unsuspected problem with a faulty drain which is causing damage to our historic tombs and must be addressed as a matter of urgency. The cost is hard to estimate, as is often the case with drains, but could be of the order of £5000. The good news is that we have had confirmation that the bell tower remains stable and that it is safe to ring the bells. So there will continue to be the joyous sound of church bells over Wingfield from time to time.

New Reeding Woods

The wood and meadow continue to mature and develop. In the meadow the

yellow rattle is suppressing the growth of the grass and allowing the wildflowers to establish - although we will have less hay to sell this year.

We found two pyramid orchids in the meadow, up from one last year. The buttercups and ox-eye daisies looked good and bees were

certainly enjoying the clover. Dog roses bloomed in the hedges and among the trees.



At the pond the flag irises are providing food for the larvae of the iris Sawfly. Although the irises were covered with

larvae this year they should recover. The adult flies provide food for birds and ground beetles so are a valuable part of the biodiversity of the wood. If you have sawfly larvae in your garden you can take part in the Big Garden Sawfly survey at Sawflies.org.Uk.

After sitting quietly by the pond for some time a Broad-bodied Chaser dragonfly stopped hunting and rested long enough for a photograph. Visits to the wood are always rewarding.

I have recently been struggling financially, and I don't know how I'm going to afford to feed my family this month. My friend told me I could be eligible for Universal Credit – is this right?

You might be able to get Universal Credit if you're not working or on a low income. You can check if you are eligible by using the webchat at **citizensadvice.org.uk/helptoclaim** or calling for free on **0800 144 8 444**. The line is open 8am – 6pm Monday to Friday.

Universal Credit has replaced older benefits such as Housing Benefit, Income Related Job Seekers Allowance and Child Tax Credits for most people. You'll get a single payment each month, rather than weekly or fortnightly. You may be able to get extra payments if you:

- look after children
- * work and pay for childcare
- need help with housing costs
- * are disabled or have a health condition
- * are a carer for a disabled person or you have a disabled child

There may also be other benefits you are entitled to, depending on your circumstances. You can use the benefit calculator to find out at:

gov.uk/benefits-calculators

If you need help, then Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can do a benefit check for you.

If you are struggling to buy food, **Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk** can make a referral to your local food bank. They can also talk through your circumstances to see if there is other help they can provide or anything else you may be eligible for, such as help with your energy bills or school costs.



Voices from the past April to July 1989

In his editorial, in the context of Ascension Day (May 4th) being the 'coronation day of Jesus', the Vicar made passing reference to Queen Elizabeth's coronation as an occasion that any middle aged person will remember very clearly. Of course, we are no longer 'middle aged' and now we 'elderly' have memories of four celebrated Jubilees under our belt too.

On first coming to Hoxne in the early 'eighties I was enchanted by its community spirit and special activities the Harvest Breakfast and Santa's visit on



Christmas morning of course, but also around that time I remember going to a May Day Fair on the green with children's traditional maypole dancing.

I don't know if this was ever a regular event but at least in May 1989 £400 was raised for school funds, some

to be allocated to purchase a new computer. Matthew Ife and Suzy Goddard were crowned King and Queen of the May.

The church restoration was progressing; the Church Architect, Mr S Kholucy, was applying for a facility for installation of heating in the roof and applying for various grants towards repairs to the roof, especially the tower turret and lower battlement, wall paintings, heat and electrics, and the Maynard monument in the north aisle.

The cost was estimated at approximately £85,000 exc VAT and fees. Friends of Hoxne Church funds now exceeded £15,000 including from 12 social activities (£3,400) and outside charities and the Neighbours Scheme (£2,544).

Reg Baxter, Hon. Secretary/Treasurer Hoxne Royal British Legion, reported on the recent death and funeral of their oldest member, Harry List from Wellington Road, Eye. Harry survived the horrors of The Somme 73 years previously with a severe leg wound. He recovered to live a full life until over 90. He was the branch's last surviving member from The Great War.

On a lighter note, the darts team finished runners-up to the Botesdale team in the Suffolk County finals - the first time in 42 years the finals had been staged.

The death of Major General John 'Jock' Anderson on 29th May and his funeral in Hoxne Church on 2nd June was noted. Jock, who lived with his wife Daphne in Mulberry Cottage, was a popular and active supporter of local activities.

Coincidentally, the same issue of The Voice announced the publication of The Toe Rags, Daphne's memoirs of her harsh upbringing in Southern Rhodesia. If you can get a copy I can promise you an interesting read.

At the Annual Parish meeting in April The Speaker, Mr Ian Cooper, talked about the new Poll and Community tax - the infamous 'poll tax' that, in the following year gave rise to riots in various towns and cities.

On 31 April 1990 there were 399 arrests and more than 130 injuries, including five police and 20 police horses, when a peaceful protest was subverted and erupted into violence in Trafalgar square 'the worst riots in the city for a century'.

In an article about hand bells, we learnt that in the days before "TV and Hi-Fi and all other modern miracles" (what did we know then!) ringing was as common a pub amusement as dartboards "are today". Almost a team sport, it provided practice

for tower ringers without driving a whole village mad. Apparently, in the days of hand-threshing with a flail, farmers were said to employ teams of ringers using the threshing as practice for change ringing!

It seems many villages had communallyowned sets and those of Wingfield and Syleham were still in regular use. Hoxne's beautiful set, worth around £3,000 to 6,000 at the time, had 'gone out of sight' - perhaps lying neglected or separated in people's homes. Maybe they had joined the 100 or so teaspoons that had been mislaid at St. Edmund's Hall! I wonder if either ever turned up.

The Mothers' Union was active, showing examples of members' pastimes including paintings, tapestries, embroidery, knitting, needlework and creative writing at a meeting at the home of the

treasurer, Mrs Edna Hales. So far that year, members and friends had produced: 2 blankets (knitted from 6" squares), 4 Jumpers, 5 Dresses, and 2 pairs of trousers, in support of Oxfam.

In order to keep costs as low as possible, the Village Voice had obtained its own photocopying machine and was

offering a printing service. A4 - 7p double sided, A3 - 12p double sided. Discount for regular customers, bulk amounts and village organisations.

A message from erstwhile Wingfield resident, Tommy Gee

Andrew Castleden's report of Hoxne's Platinum Jubilee peal reminded me that at a meeting of the Wingfield PCC, Betty Syrett suggested that we should ring in the 2000 Millennium.

Our bells were silent because No 4 had a crack caused by rain penetration in the tower - a result of the sale of roofing lead replaced by storm-damaged roofing felt.

Roy Clement Smith dismantled the steel ringing frame, lowered it and the six bells, and No 4 was taken to Anglesey to be welded. He then restored the peal.

Betty mobilised and trained a team of ringers in local churches. There we are in Weybread, a tight space:
