




AMAZING ART



St Peter & St Paul, Hoxne

Top of the list of Improvements of the Facilities that residents identified in our last Parish Survey was the provision of a modern lavatory.

Hoxne PCC took this matter up and in December 2021, Mid Suffolk District Council (the Local Planning Authority) was approached with the ideas and plans that had been worked up with the Church architect.

MSDC and Historic England approved the plans and in October 2022 the Diocese granted a faculty for the project. Hoxne PCC proposed the construction, on the site of the current sheds, of a new highquality wood building. There would be two WCs (one Disabled Access Compliant). There would be a new resin footpath linking the lavatory to the North Door and the car park. Behind the North Door, Disabled Compliant Access would be constructed. Work has been completed behind the North Door, except the laying of carpeting which will be done soon.

Construction of the lavatory will start in the middle of March 2023, after MSDC's cabinet considers the eligibility of funding support for the project from the CIL fund.

On St Edmund's Day, 20th November, at the Cathedral, the position of an Honorary Cannon of the Cathedral was bestowed on our Priest-in-Charge, the Rev. Eleanor Goodison.

If anyone knows when a Diocesan Bishop last presided at a service in Hoxne Church, please let us know.

New Reeding Woods

The autumn leaves are showing good colours this year after a very dry summer with no hard frosts to bring them down. Earlier, the blackberries were abundant

and rose hips are providing a splash of scarlet in the hedgerows.

The meadow is looking bright green again after the long, dry summer browns and golds. We hope the vellow rattle continues to suppress the vigour of the grass there, allowing more wild meadow flowers to spread without competition. We plan no further artificial enrichment of the flora, such as sowing wild flower seed or plug planting, as the meadow is being encouraged to develop naturally. Colonisation by plant species already growing nearby is the goal. Meadow

flowers will bloom in spring and early summer and are left to set seed before the meadow is cut later in the summer and arisings removed as hay.

The traditional autumn tidy up of the woodland and hedges took place in late October. The brambles along the hedges and the sides of the riders were cut back and overhanging branches trimmed. At the meadow edge of one woodland block we planted an oak sapling we had been gifted; hopefully it should do well there.



The undergrowth in the woods is dying back, as the trees grow and canopies begin to restrict the light coming through. The trees are competing with each other and the most vigorous growing taller, as a distinct hierarchy of dominance develops. Our policy is to leave them to develop naturally as far a possible, as we are managing the woodland blocks to maximise habitat value. Interventions such as thinning or singling the trees out would

disrupt this valuable 'thicket' stage, beloved of nesting birds and insects. More thoughts on woodland thinning in the next bulletin!

Another day of work is planned for late November, to remove a fence in poor repair. This will increase the meadow area around the pond. As a sign of strange times for nature, I saw dragonflies whilst we worked... very late in the year. Pleasingly, water has returned to the pond and levels will have benefited further from the current rain.

As autumn leaves fall in earnest, could I suggest a corner of

suggest a corner of your garden be left "untidy"? Leaves, long grass and sticks provide a safe home for insects and small mammals. The result may look unkempt but this benefits the animals living there.

Hoxne Heritage Group

Late summer has been another busy time for the Hoxne Heritage Group.

On September 11th we finally held the much-delayed second phase of our World War Two exhibition, covering events in and around Hoxne during the period 1942 -1945. As with the earlier exhibition the event was very well supported throughout the day. Over two hundred visitors were able to enjoy several examples of wartime food, listen to music of the period and view on-screen footage of local events. Our grateful thanks go out to all the members who worked so hard to make the day such a success.

Continuing on the same theme, on September 27th local historian Clive Stevens gave an illustrated talk to a packed audience in the village hall on the "Friendly Invasion" of East Anglia by the United States Army Air Force. With extensive use of photographs and interviews with USAAF veterans, Clive was able to provide a vivid picture of what life was like on the bases and in the surrounding countryside during 1942-45.

Meanwhile our regular monthly meetings in the Swan continue, so if you are interested please come along. During the October meeting, Steve Doling gave a mini presentation entitled "Reminiscences of the Second World War" about his own experience of growing up in the East End of London in the post war years, including details of his late father's life as a Royal Marine serving in the Far East. On display were many photographs, items of memorabilia and campaign medals.

They are mainly found in the Indian and Pacific Oceans. Pearls are produced in a mollusc (oyster) but not related to edible oysters or mussels.

As Jason had been passing round many different samples of pearls, he did check that the same number were returned as left his hands!

SAVE THE HOXNE POST OFFICE MEETING

Held on Thursday 3rd November

Thank you everyone that attended the meeting, over 100 people were in the hall with many more that couldn't make it expressing interest.

- 2) Why we should act now

Just to introduce myself to start with for context - I'm a local resident, I don't represent any organisation or the parish council. I am just highlighting a problem and floating an idea to see if anyone else is interested. The notes below are what I have learnt, they're not exhaustive and many of you I hope will know more and can add to our collective knowledge and expertise. It's also important to note that everything here has been talked through with the current owner of the post office.

1. The current situation

- The Post Office has been for sale for 18 months, listed with Gazes at £475k as a going concern. The current owner is very keen it remains a post office and shop serving the community.

- The Parish Council is making an application to designate the post office an Asset of Community Value (ACV). If granted, it will make any future applications for change of use more difficult. ACV status normally means that when an asset is put up for sale there is a 6 month moratorium on the owner selling to anyone other than a community interest group. Because the post office is being sold as a going concern, this moratorium doesn't apply.

- The post office has "community branch" status and as such receives a salary from the Post Office.

2. Why we should act now

The problem

- The post office is not under immediate threat, but its future is uncertain.

- The ACV, if granted, makes it harder for future owners to change the use of the building, but it doesn't make it impossible. ACV status only lasts 5 years.

- The current owner would like to retire. If there isn't anyone to hand the role of postmaster on to then the status of "community branch" will go and so will the salary.

- The post office in Eye is currently under threat.

The opportunity

- The government is currently offering community groups match funding to help purchase facilities like pubs, post offices etc. (Community Ownership Fund)

- For every pound raised the government matches with a pound, up to a maximum of £250k (so a community raising £250k could get another £250k from the government)

- Many communities around us have already come together to buy their local facilities so we have examples to follow and learn from.

The proposal

To form a small working group of local people to develop:

- a draft plan to raise the finance to buy the post office / shop

- a plan to engage the village (both ends and maybe surrounding villages too) about what they want

- a plan for how we might run the post office / shop as a community.

Comments from the meeting

The following were raised. Apologies I cannot represent all that was said; a lot was said and we didn't have a minute taker for this informal meeting. However I think it is fair to say the feeling in the hall was positive overall.

- Concern was raised about the price of £475k being too high and that the building needed repairs. The point was made that we as a community should consider the social value of the post office as well as the

financial value. Ultimately it is beyond the scope of communities to dictate what private property is sold for (something I for one am grateful for!). Also ultimately it will be up to the community to decide whether to go ahead or not (not the working group), so if the majority feeling is that the price is too high then we will not proceed.

- Any plan will need to include repairing the building (inc. roof).

- The idea was raised to move the post office to another site, avoiding the cost of purchasing the current site. Thank you for the idea, it will be part of what the working group investigates. - A show of hands made it clear that most people attending the meeting use the post office.

5. Call for volunteers

The skills we need at this stage are accounting, legal, commercial, grant writing, social media - but quite frankly anyone with enthusiasm and positivity. Positivity especially! Volunteers with other skills will be needed in the future. Anyone interested should email hoxnevolunteer@gmail.com

Hoxne

There are currently vacancies for Councillors. Hoxne, like all local councils, need active, interested and committed people to serve and get involved in their work. The Council works as a team and no one person has all the solutions for its community. However, through engagement with the electorate and undertaking free professional training that is available, you will be better placed to deal with the interesting range of issues that arise. Speak to any one of the existing councillors to find out more.

Community Infrastructure

The Council are devising a Parish Infrastructure Plan which will inform use of the community infrastructure levy funding received in Hoxne from new housing development. Infrastructure falls into three main categories: • Physical e.g. highways, transport links, cycle ways, energy waste management • Social e.g. education, health, social care, art and culture, sports halls, community halls • Green e.g. parks, woodlands, play areas, public open space. If you have ideas for infrastructure improvements in the village, please contact the Parish Council.

Highways

After meetings with Suffolk Highways Engineers and the County Councillor, the Parish Council is waiting to receive a report of measure that may be available to address speeding concerns for the B1118. The recent Lorry Route Review did not change the designation of the road. The first stage of the traffic surveys which the Parish Council commissioned has been completed, the second stage will take place when the HGV restriction through the centre of Eye comes into force. The data from both surveys will then be analysed and reports from the traffic management consultants will be provided to the Parish Council.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

Following the publication of the Pre-Submission draft earlier this year, the Hoxne Neighbourhood Development Plan has been amended to take account of the feedback and submitted to Mid Suffolk District Council. The District Council will publish it again for a six week period probably early in 2023. Comments of support and objections will then be considered by an Examiner before the Plan is finalised later in 2023. Full details of the plan are available at hoxneneighbourhoodplan.co.uk



Voices from the past August to November 1989 Part 2

The Theatre Club thrived during 1989 in the capable hands of Vivienne Bradford and David Weller. The Summer outing to Windsor Park on a blazing hot day included a Tussaud's Victorian Extravaganza involving the Royal Train, an audio-visual show 'Sixty Glorious Years' and seventy Guardsmen of the 2nd Battalion, The Coldstream Guards!



The summer visit to the End of the Pier Show in Cromer was becoming a regular annual event and another favourite regular was the Thursford Carol Concert at Christmas. In September their annual Barn Supper attracted 61 people to enjoy a full cooked meal. Things had

been going so well that they had accumulated a profit, from which they offered a donation of £50 to show their appreciation of the Village Voice.

The Hoxne Garden and Social Club's first attempt at a flower show in September was by all accounts an impressive occasion. Reported by the organiser, Norman Midgley, it was opened by the Gislingham Silver Band as more than 300 people braved a cold wind at the playing field. Three marguees were erected. The first housed 81 entries of fruit and vegetables, 48 of flowers and plants, 15 novelties and 68 entries in kitchen classes: the second served refreshments and the third showed an arts and crafts exhibition. A full list of results was published and carries some familiar names.

Enthusiastic fundraising continued through Summer and Autumn for various

local and national causes. The annual church fete at Abbey Farm was in June and made nearly £1,000. The Historic Churches bike ride and the harvest breakfast were in September. Entertainment was provided at the Harvest Breakfast by the Hoxon Hundred dancers and Mr. Finbow's fairground organ.

Friends of St. Peter and St. 7 Paul Church held a family quiz in October, a bonfire night fireworks party and a cheese and wine evening at the vicarage in November.

Various coffee and bring and buy mornings - Mrs. Margaret Carey-Evans in Cross Street, Mr. and Mrs. Evans, at Park House, Lt. Col. and Mrs Leader at Monks Hall, Syleham - benefitted the Church, the playing field, the new pavilion, Cancer Research and Red Cross week.

In St. Edmund's Hall, Denny Davies had been running popular discos and the latest six had raised in excess of £2,500, benefitting the playing field, over sixties and toddlers clubs, the British Legion and the Hall where a new heating system had been delivered. They also paid for alterations to 'the pump seat' in Cross Street.

Hoxne were runners-up at inter-village sports and the Hoxne swimming club led by Joan Dale reconvened on Sunday afternoons in September after a Summer break.
