

There is little doubt that they will be greatly missed by neighbours but, because of their huge support in the mission of Hoxne Church they will be especially missed by the Church community. We wish them well in their new life.

All the permissions have been secured to enable work to start on the construction of the new lavatory, for which we have also now received a generous grant from the district council which will be a great help in meeting the cost. Builders are due to come on site early next month to lay the foundations and to dig the trenches for the electricity, water and sewage

connections. The current sheds near the North Door will be moved northwards to provide the location.

Gardener's Diary

April

Sow indoors: Courgettes, cucumbers, French beans, pumpkins, runner beans, sweetcorn

Sow outdoors: Brussels sprouts, leeks, lettuces, spinach

Plant: perennials, potatoes, summerflowering bulbs, sweet pea seedlings, strawberries

Prune: fig trees, hardy evergreens, hydrangea, ornamental quince (when flowering is over), penstemons, untidy ferns

Essential jobs: mow and feed lawns, spring clean and feed borders, protect fruit trees from frost, harvest rhubarb.

Mav

Sow indoors: courgettes, marrows, pumpkins

Sow outdoors: annuals (ie Californian poppies), chard and spinach, French and runner beans, peas, salad leaves, sprouting broccoli

Plant: asparagus, roses, strawberries, summer bulbs, trees, shrubs, climbers

Prune: early-spring-flowering shrubs, clematis (winter and early spring-flowering types), hardy fuchsias, trained pyracanthas

Essential Jobs: Chelsea chop, harden off tender plants, pinch out sideshoots on tomatoes.
Plant bedding plants when danger of frost has passed.

New Reeding Woods

At this time of year we do little work at the woodland other than walk through the trees and enjoy the quiet. Trees have played a part in our lives, rituals and mythology for centuries. The trees in the woods can be found in folk tales and customs.

"Cast ne'er a clout 'til May is out" is a saying many of us were told as children. The Hawthorn or May blooms in May and is seen as the harbinger of summer. However I was told by an old Suffolk gentleman that the saying refers to the

Hawthorne, or May

blooms fading not emerging as spring is fickle: he thought I was rushing planting my vegetable garden and yes l now am móre cautious. The tree also provides both the blossoms for the Mav Queen crown and was thought to be

the source of the maypoles. The rhyme "here we go gathering nuts in May" refers to collecting the blooms. However it is thought to be unlucky to bring May blossom into your house as the tree is the home of fairies.

The Oak tree was sacred to both the Celts and the Norse. The Druids used the tree both as a meeting place and in their

rituals. The name Druid meaning a "man of the oaks". The Celtic name for the oak means a doorway referring to the shortening of the days after the summer solstice as the year turns again to winter. Oak wood was burnt as part of the solstice rituals. Oaks are seen as representing strength and endurance in many folk songs.

The Silver Birch is often called the Lady of the Woods of the Goddess Tree. The tree is thought to protect against evil. Bundles of birch twigs were used to sweep away the bad spirits of the past

year and traditional broomsticks are made of birch.

Apples play a central role in the pagan custom of Wassail at Twelfth Night. The ritual is performed to ensure a good harvest in the following season. A diagonal cut



into an apple reveals the five pointed star of Aphrodite the goddess of love and beauty. The celts considered apples to be the food of the gods and Norse mythology has apples of perpetual youth growing in Asgard, the home of the gods.

Many people once feared the Alder tree as when cut the pale wood turns an orange-red colour and can look like blood. The trees were also thought to be the doorway used by the fairies to pass between their world and ours. The leaves were placed in shoes at the

beginning of a journey to keep your feet cool and prevent swelling.

Pound Lane wood has all of these trees so when you walk around remember their place in the stories of the countryside.

Dr Jean Fox, late of Goldbrook, Hoxne

Jean Fox of Goldbrook died on 16th Jan. She had maintained a Hoxne residence since 1995 and was a frequent attendee at St Peter's Church. She very much enjoyed her retired life in Hoxne, enjoying village events and the local history, and of course loving living in a building with over 400 years' history.



Jean was born in Saltburn near Redcar North Yorkshire to Charles and Chrissie Hart. She was sent to St Hilda's boarding school at 7 where she formed several life-long friendships.

At 13 she got polio and was taken out of school. Tutored largely at home from then on, she advanced academically completing her A levels at 16 and entered King's College London to read medicine just before her 17th birthday. As part of her recovery from polio she took up tennis, where she met chemist Bill Fox. After graduation she married Bill in 1954.

The young couple settled in Cottingham East Yorkshire and had three children: Chris (1957), John (1961) and Andrew (1963).

Jean worked part time as an archivist at Hull University where she reawakened her interest in history. Bill steadily advanced in his work in the Contracts department of British Petroleum in 1968,

which required relocation to the London area. There followed 14 very happy years in Caterham, Surrey.

During this period, Jean reconnected with King's College and completed further academic work (Masters degree 1982 and PhD 1991). She also somehow managed to work as a teacher, as well as raise the boys.

Bill retired in 1987, when they bought a small thatched cottage at Goldbrook in Hoxne, Suffolk which Jean loved and used frequently for the rest of her days.

Bill died young (aged 63) in 1997 leaving Jean alone for retirement. She continued to travel, visiting California, China, Vietnam, Russia, Mexico and most of Europe. She enjoyed London, her community in Blackheath (she loved the book club and her neighbours and other local friends), the cottage in Suffolk as well as spending winters in Palm Springs California.

Jean had that special teacher's knack of encouragement with authority. The speed of her mind was remarkable, as was her ability to enable the success of others. Her life was one of service to others and her primary purpose was her family.

Jean's faith never wavered, nor did her fast mind. After living with cancer in various forms for nearly 14 years she decided to cease treatment and purposefully conclude her life on her terms. Her final words were "Faith, Faith, Faith".

Voices from the Past

February/March 1990 (Part 2)

In 1990's first issue of the Village Voice I found a very local ghost story. It seems that "If you visit Syleham church one day and as you enter the churchyard you hear beautiful music you may have come upon Edna our talented and conscientious organist practising. But if when you try the door and it is locked and when you unlock it, the church is empty and dark and the organ closed then you have heard the Phantom Organist."

Apparently he (?) had been heard by several people over the years, sometimes from outside the church, sometimes inside and recently, during evensong: "A candle on the lectern fell over and one of the wardens rushed to catch it, as she did so one of the congregation heard a sudden loud agitated burst of music. The organist heard nothing." On another occasion, "during a 'said' Communion (no

music) this same person heard a most beautiful part of the Bach Chorale".

The piece was unsigned but was contributed by someone who had been 'doing the flowers' the previous summer with a companion. (S)he heard the organ as they went up the path but found the door locked and when they entered all was unlit (perhaps understandable on that hot summer's day) and the organ closed as usual. They then compared notes and both had heard "Oh God our help in ages past". Furthermore, their dogs, a collie and a Jack Russell that accompanied them were unwilling to pass the organ without enthusiastic reassurance - often crying and trembling until outside again. Our sensitive reporters, however, felt no fear or discomfort although could often 'sense a presence'.

An even more fascinating contribution, which I found moving - almost poetic - was submitted by Gladys Pattemore. It seems that her eldest brother had died in January 1989, aged 79 and his widow had found a handwritten account of their Mother, Mrs Wright's, memories in his 'treasure box'.

Mrs Wright had been born at 12 Cross Street, Hoxne on August 22nd 1889, when her own mother was 50 years old. Some of her older brothers had fought and died before she was born (I wonder what war/battle(s) that would have been). One of her sisters, Mrs Emily Lawes, gave birth to 22 children, only four of whom survived. Mrs Wright wrote down her memories in about 1970 before she died in September 1974, aged 86. The memoir is a treasure trove indeed and I hope I can be excused for producing it here in full:

"I remember from the age of four years old seeing one of my brothers who was a soldier in Queen Victoria's time. My eldest brother I never saw at all.

I remember my school days very well, Miss Polly Whitton being then a teacher,



also Mr Hughes the Head Master. I recall Mr Norman also coming as Head Master in the late Mr Hughes' place.

I remember the Rev Cecil Downton, Vicar of Hoxne and Denham who used to visit

the school, also the little things we often greeted him with, such as 'God bless you dear Vicar on this our special day', etc.

I remember the village postman, the late Mr Foreman who left me a penny to take any letters to the Leys which was so very lonely to me as a child.

I remember the village policeman, the late Mr Snell; also three generations of Mr Coleman the Cross Street grocer; also Mr Mutimer of the Post Office and many others.

I remember the late Dr Philips the then doctor of our village. My mother, the village midwife, often walked alongside the doctor's horse when going into villages as far away as Horham.

I remember Mr Denby the pastor of our village chapel.

I remember with delight the first banana I ever saw, let alone had, in Mr Coleman's shop.

I remember the village blacksmith, two brothers named Smith and the late Mr Athams. Also the late Mr Leggett, wheelwright and carpenter of Cross Street. I remember too the late Mr A Rayner, the harness maker in Cross Street and Mr W Rayner the corn merchant and also having a small trade in the sweet line where we could buy a farthing halfpenny and penny things, which were to our child's taste lovely.

Also I remember Miss L Sparrow who lived in Cross Street who used to sell home-made ginger beer at 1/2d a bottle, also lovely brown sticks of home-made rock. My father was the man who made boots and shoes for Mr Theobald and Miss Theobald, long since gone.



I remember my Sunday School days, I remember when they used a tuning fork to start the singing. My father and mother were caretakers and I was carried there 76 years ago and although going out to work at the age of 13 to a farm house in Denham I remember the day when I walked home to my mother's burial, she being 63 years old. Women worked hard in those days.

I left Hoxne for over 40 years but found little change, returning. I find great peace living in the quiet countryside, like an old hen I have come home to roost.

I may not have written this very well because I am blind. *Mrs Wright*."
