

# St Andrew's, Wingfield

At our Annual Meeting in April Peter Demetriadi stepped down as Churchwarden of Wingfield church after two-and-a-half years. During his term of office he has overseen a wide variety of maintenance work in the church and churchyard, most recently the replacement of a faulty drain which was causing serious problems; he has obtained grants to take forward the major project to stabilise and repair the stonework of the tower and south-west corner of the church and for a review of the condition of the historic tombs, with conservation work on one of

conservation work on one of them now complete (see separate report). The Parochial Church Council thanked him for all his work and presented him with a gift of a shooting stick.

We are delighted to welcome Sarah Berry and Neil Mathias as new members of the Council.

In May a simple memorial service was held for Sheila Kent as we interred her ashes in the churchyard. A week later we sadly said goodbye to Val Smith, who died just after Easter, with a very large number of friends attending her funeral service to

pay their respects.

# St Andrew's 15th Century Restoration Work

In the first half of May, St Andrew's Church was busy with specialist conservators at work on a tomb from 600 years ago, and with journalists documenting what they were doing.

Around 1410 Michael de la Pole, 2<sup>nd</sup> Earl of Suffolk and his wife made provision for their funerals, even though it was 1415 before Michael died and 1419 when Katherine died. One factor may have been that Michael was expecting that he would soon have to go and fight in the English army. They chose to have the effigies for their tomb carved in oak, rather than stone. This may have been for reasons of economy, or speed, or portability - we don't know why. The oak figures were decorated, so that they would look, at a glance, to be stone, but over the years they were attacked by deathwatch beetles, and we had to tackle the infestation.



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Because of the importance of the tomb we were fortunate to obtain funding from ChurchCare in partnership with the Pilgrim Trust and the Radcliffe Trust. The conservators from Skillingtons had to detach the effigies from their plinth to assess their condition, and to protect them from further damage. Deathwatch beetles have a long life-cycle, which means that the conservators will need to return annually for a period of 10 years before we can be confident that the infestation has been successfully dealt with.

The news that the tomb of a prominent nobleman, courtier and soldier from the 15<sup>th</sup> century was being conserved in this way captured the attention of local and regional media, both press and television, who gave it extensive coverage. For the conservators, this was a valuable opportunity to showcase their expertise and explain their techniques. For the church, it helps publicise what we are doing to protect important national heritage. And for historians it has allowed them to examine in close detail a rare example of a wooden medieval funerary monument.

Internally, the level access into the church from the North Door has been completed. We just need to carpet the new floor.

Outside the North Door the foundations for the wooden sheds have been completed and these sheds have now been moved adjacent to the car park. Between the sheds and the North Door the foundations for the lavatory block have been completed. We hope that the building work will start this month with completion by the end of June.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting took place on 22 April. For 2022, Hoxne church met its financial obligations to the diocese, to the benefice and to its priests in full. Hoxne church holds at least one service every Sunday, and supports outreach into the Hoxne primary school through Open the Book, and runs Little Lambs at the pavilion for young children and parents.

Over the years The Friends of Hoxne Church have been huge financial supporters of the church, and the latest contribution of £9,000 has enabled us to build the new lavatory block.

To match the EV charging points at the playing field we are exploring the possibility of similar facilities at the church car park.

Please put in your diary the evening of 1st August at the church, when we host the Annual Evensong Service of the Addington Fund. This farming charity was started in Suffolk and has now gone nationwide. After the service we all join together for a hog roast.

Another date is **Saturday 10th June** when we hold the Annual Church Fête at Abbey Farm (see page 5). All are most welcome at this traditional event.

### Friends of St Peter & St Paul

In late 1986, recognising the need for urgently required funding to support repair work to the roof of our church, a group of enthusiastic church goers and parishioners came together to form The Friends of St Peter and St Paul Church. The Friends formally became a registered charity in February 1987 and in the ensuing years has raised well over £200,000 to assist with the cost of maintaining the fabric of the church.

Many of the individuals who helped to make the Friends such a successful and effective organisation are sadly no longer with us and others have now moved away from the village. In recent years as many of you will be aware it has become increasingly difficult to sustain membership, and more importantly, retain the hard core of committee members and trustees who have done so much down the years to organise fundraising events and generally keep the organisation together.

During the past twelve months efforts have been made to recruit additional committee members and to generally increase membership. Sadly we have not succeeded in this and at our recent Annual General Meeting the decision was made to wind up the Friends charity during the coming months. Once this has been completed all remaining funds will be transferred to a dedicated Church Fabric Account to be administered by the Parochial Church Council in compliance with the original aims and objectives of the Friends.

We hope to continue with the regular monthly coffee mornings and book sales on the third Saturday of the month although a decision has yet to be made with regard to the colder winter months when the cost to heat the church may be prohibitive. Any monies raised will be paid directly into the Church Fabric Account.

So many villagers have supported and maintained the Friends over the past thirty-seven years and it would be inappropriate to name individuals, but our sincere thanks go out to everyone concerned.


### **Book Reviews**

cousin Mustafa, who taught Nuri about bee-keeping, has managed to get to Britain. He encourages Nuri to make the effort to get there too.


The couple face some very dark experiences, paying large sums of money to be put into small boats on rough and dangerous seas.

 $\mathbf{W}$ e are continuing to make progress with the project which will enable bells to peal once more from the tower of Hoxne Church. Our architect is consulting the specialist bodies which exist to preserve the nation's heritage to let them know about the detail of our plans. Our aim is to reassure them so that they can more readily support the project when we formally submit our application to proceed. By the time you are reading this, we will have had a visit by the team which advises the Diocese so that they can familiarise themselves with the project, also with the aim of streamlining the process of obtaining approval. This may sound very procedural, but for us it is exciting because it means that we can hope soon to have agreement to the practical aspects of making the project a reality.

We do not underestimate the effort that will be involved, and we envisage the need to approach large grant-giving organisations to meet the balance of the costs. The money that we raise locally will be important in demonstrating to these other organisations the level of support that there is for the project. On **Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> June** we are back at Hoxne Village Hall for a fascinating talk by a Trustee of Bawdsey Radar Group. All members of the public are welcome.

**BAWDSEY RADAR STATION** (In Suffolk) was the world's first operational radar station and played a significant part in the winning of World War II.

In 2004, the radar block was shown in the BBC2 series "Restoration", featuring Britain's endangered historic buildings. Following this, a Heritage Lottery grant was obtained to complete an oral history project featuring individuals who served at Bawdsey. A play has been written based on these oral reminiscences and the block has featured in the BBC "Coast" programme and "The One Show".

In 2016/17, the transmitter block underwent a major restoration programme funded by the NHLF, Historic England and others to transform it from a derelict condition into a building which now has a sustainable future. It held an award-winning exhibition about the development and use of radar, from the 1930s through WWII to the present day.

As usual this talk will start at 7.30pm and will cost £5 at the door (£4 for members). The bar will be open and all members of the public are welcome. We look forward to seeing you then.

The Hoxne Heritage Group have regular bi-monthly meetings at The Swan Inn, Hoxne. Why not pop along if you have an interest in local history? We are a friendly

## Gardener's Diary

June

Sow: Beetroot, French beans, pak choi, peas, radishes, salads, sweetcorn, turnips

Plant: Chicory, leek seedlings, summer bedding; tender exotics — bananas, cannas, Colocasia, tithonias; tender veg — chillies, courgettes, peppers, tomatoes.

Prune: Alpines, evergreen shrubs and hedges, gooseberries and currants, grapevines, lilac (after flowering), spring-flowering shrubs, topiary.

Harvest: Asparagus, baby carrots, broad beans, cherries, gooseberries, peas, radishes, salad leaves.

July

Sow: Biennial flowers, calabrese, carrots, chicory, Chinese and spring cabbage, Florence fennel.

Plant: Bedding plants, courgettes, herbs, leeks, winter brassicas.

Prune: Apple and pear trees, cherry trees (after fruiting), gooseberries, rambling roses (after flowering), redcurrants and whitecurrants, early summer shrubs—deutzia, philadelphus (after flowering).

# New Reeding Woods

The wet spring has filled the pond and the trees and meadow are bursting forth. Last year I was writing about the dry period that we were having. So far this year has been wetter and hopefully the plants that were stressed by the dry conditions last year will have a chance to recover. As we move forward, can I ask for dogs to be kept out of the pond so that the newts can breed in peace.

We have left the woods alone for the last few months but will be working on tidying up the area around the pond by removing the old fence in the next month. This will increase the meadow area and also make the mowing easier.

Sadly one of our members died recently. David Flowerdew founded this group exactly 20 years ago and was the driving force behind creating Pound Lane community woodland. David was among

the very first volunteer Tree Wardens to come forward. His energy and enthusiasm for nature and his understanding of rural life were extraordinary. Together with our current chairman, David Mitchell, he created the first district-wide Veteran Tree Survey long before the Tree Council, Ancient Tree Forum or Woodland Trust became interested in the subject. They trained other volunteers and conducted a thorough ancient tree survey of the Denham parish. The records he made are lodged now with the Suffolk Biological Records Office.

In 2003, David looked for people interested in creating community woodland for the three parishes of Horham, Denham and Athelington. He'd been inspired by a local environmental charity, Greenlight Trust, and doggedly followed through until it came to pass.

He recruited just the right people... they cajoled and lobbied everyone they could think of. David organised forestry demos at village fêtes; evening talks at community centres; even tugs-of-war to raise funds. No electronic communication then of course; instead, he so extensively 'bombed' local residents with flyers that, in the end, people dreaded him appearing on his bike at the end of their drives!

After 2.5 years of continual effort, David succeeded... a local farmer, Peter Havers, offered a one-hectare plot against Pound Lane, an ancient green pathway. A single item from the Group minutes of August 2005 reads: "The land is now ours". That was just the start of the journey! After the celebrations, years of work followed getting the woodland established. It's a long story but enough to say that David and his team raised funds through donations from every conceivable source. This bought fencing, gates and posts; wheelbarrows, hay rakes and forks; hedge and brush cutters; gazebo and waders; a tractor, a trailer and a meadow cutter.

Armed with these and volunteer labour, the land was fenced. A pond was dug and a wild-flower meadow established from green hay David cut from local churchyards - culminating in an award in 2005 from East Anglian Daily Times.

David was always keen to promote local

'ownership'. He organised some plants from Castleden Trees, a nearby nursery supporting the project; others were grown from seeds gathered by local schoolchildren and germinated at Hoxne School. Children and parents, locals and Group members created the wood... nature's done the rest, with a little help!

Slowly, over the years, Pound Lane Wood became established in the community. It's a place to sit and think, or let boisterous dogs off leads without them running away. We have parishioners' ashes beneath the trees and memorial plantings. Girl guides survey flowers and insects, we hold barbeques there for our AGMs - watching chefs coping with David's vegetarian sausages. All the while, the wood and its wildlife keep quietly growing.

David relinquished chairmanship of the woodland group due to failing health and

many original members have moved on over the years, or sadly passed away. We've been lucky in recruiting new members, so the future is bright.

I should like to end with some comments about the wood from the community. David wanted a weatherproof notice board so we could keep folk informed of events and work parties. He suggested we include a notebook and a pencil so any wildlife sightings could be recorded... a resounding success. Every year we gather the scribbles and put them into the village magazine. But of course, human nature being what it is, these are not always just about wildlife. Here are just three, showing how Pound Lane Wood is so valued:

- \* December 25<sup>th</sup> just seen a man in a red coat with loads of reindeer by the pond.
- \* March 4<sup>th</sup> 2023 Ali 13 and Libby 13. Best friends for life!
- \* Undated, anonymous aren't we lucky to have this place?

Indeed we are; and lucky to have had David Flowerdew to bring it to fruition. Thank you David - we are indebted. We will be honouring his memory and are considering the best way to do this, and will let you know when we do.

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


# Tyrrel's Wood IP21 4XW

If you drive up the A140 towards Norwich, turn right at Goodies farm shop then take the next left, you come to the ancient Tyrrel's Wood. Records date parts of it from as early as 1251.

Close to the car park is a narrow strip of woodland with mature oak, hornbeams, ash and large-leaved lime trees, with undergrowth of hazel, hawthorn and holly. There's deep, rich leaf litter, with dog's mercury—a species found in ancient woodland. At different times of year you can see flowering honeysuckle, primroses, sanicle, dog violets and early purple orchids.

A great place to take children and dogs for a walk, it's big—took us about an hour to walk (quite fast) round the perimeter. There's fairly easy public access throughout the main wood, with both narrow and wide pathways.



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# Fressingfield Scouts

There was too much that happened that I am able to write about but the whole expedition from beginning to end was eye-opening and a fantastic experience.

"All four of us wanted to say thank you for the support from everyone, it was an experience that we will never forget." Other sections have resumed with a summer programme of mainly outdoor activities. Wolf Cubs had a session clearing up at Fressingfield Playingfield.

#### Jargon-buster - Wide Games

Wide games are games played outside over a large area. Not sport type things, more like hide and seek and similar stuff.

Some of them are fairly complicated involving "attacking" the other team's base to capture their flag and getting it back to your base. Sometimes gently rough bút usually about as violent as touch rugby and the like and with ample umpires. Often played in the dark. One of the most common is ManHunt which is a hide and seek type game where a small team of 2 or 3 are the hunters (wearing reflective vests) and everyone else hides, when someone is caught by touching they get a reflective vest and join the hunters. The game goes on until all the fugitives are caught. There is no need to stay hidden if you are a good runner and can get away. Wide games give the opportunity to burn off surplus energy, be outside and develop teamwork with a competitive element.

# Voices from the Past April/May 1990

For April/May 1990 the Village Voice gave the usual village reports - fundraising, Royal British Legion, Theatre Club, Parish Council, Bowls Club, open gardens, WI, church services, various sporting activities, Over Sixties Club, a house fire in Denham; in fact, village life more reminiscent of Miss Marple than Midsomer Murders! In the wider world, the Vicar was still writing about the 'miracle' of freedom and justice returning to so many countries in Eastern Europe.

My last offering quoted the lifetime memories, written in about 1970, of Mrs Wright who died aged 86 in 1974. I hope there will be some readers as interested as I was in research undertaken by Pauline Rimmer of Hoxne Heritage Group into the history of Mrs Wright and her family.

It seems that Mrs Wright's maiden name was Mary Anne Watson. She was born August 1889 and died 1974. She married three times, firstly to Arthur John Clough in 1911, in Rochford, Essex, he died in 1934. He was the father of Gladys (born 22/1/1930, died 2000). Her second husband was George Edward Hales. She married him in Ipswich in 1935 and he died around 1944. He must have adopted Gladys as she used the name Hales when she married Bryan Pattemore. Mary Ann then went on to marry Mr Wright - either in 1954 or 1962.

The parents of Mary Ann and her sister Emily were Henry and Mary Ann (nee Brown, born 1841, died 1902) who married in 1859. The family originated from Wingfield.

In the 1891 census, Emily Lawes (nee Watson) when widowed by her first husband, Herbert Ringer, was living as a nurse and laundress with the Rowe family. She married George Lawes later in 1891. In the 1911 census she is recorded as a nurse living in the household of Henry Theobald, White House, Church Hill, Hoxne. In the 1921 census she is maternity nursing, living in Cross Street.

On Saturday 2nd April 1990 there was to be an open day at Wingfield's Swingletree Stables in aid of St Andrew's Church, hosted by 'the well-known horseman' John Parker in the presence of the (then) well-known TV star Paul Heiney, one of John's former pupils.

I had not heard of John Parker and thought it worth looking him up. It seems he was remarkable indeed! He died aged of 81 in May 2021. His obituary in the EDP labelled him "one



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of the world's greatestever carriage drivers, so dazzlingly brilliant at controlling teams of plunging horses he became a stuntman, world record breaker, television star and renowned teacher."

As a child he worked with shire horses on his grandfather's farm, gained his jockey license at 17 and then signed up for the army, joining the Horse Transport Division, working with pack mules, riding horses and a regimental carriage.

After leaving the army he was renowned as a stunt-double carriage driver in films and on television. He was the driver of the Child Catcher's carriage in Chitty Chitty Bang Bang and doubled for drivers in the 1967 Dr Dolittle film among many others.

On buying a carriage of his own he discovered it had been the mail coach between London and Norwich in the early 19th century and it had been driven by John's 19th century hero, James Selby who held the record for the longest distance driven by a single coachman. John broke that record in 1984 and also, in 1996, broke his record for the fastest a team of mail coach horses could be replaced with fresh horses.

He brought the coach back to Norfolk and, with his partner Susan, launched Swingletree stables in Wingfield, which became one of the biggest carriage driving centres in Europe.

It was recorded that 'On the 150th anniversary of Britain's last-ever regular mail coach journey, from London to Norwich, John retraced the route, in the same coach, and broke his own world record for speed and for the longest distance driven by a single coachman. "The Duke of Edinburgh told me I was an idiot, if I remember rightly!" said John later. His six teams of horses worked and rested in relays, changing every eight to ten miles, through the 139-mile, 21.5-hour journey. As the final team clattered to a halt outside Norwich Cathedral, the reins had to be prised from his temporarily paralysed grip.

More than a million people turned out to see one of his record-breaking trips and he raised more than £750,000 for charities including Save The Children and Sports Aid.

He represented Great Britain 11 times in world and European driving championships and for many years he and Susan performed at the Horse of the Year Show in London, including driving a carriage pulled by a team of five horses through a tunnel of fire. John once rose to the challenge of changing a team of horses quicker than a Le Mans pit crew could change a wheel (that one was televised as a world record.)
