As I write this in early July, there are already fields ready for harvest and the early vegetables from the garden are on the table ready to eat. The warm weather, combined with some rain, has encouraged rapid growth. What might encourage our own growth as human beings? We know that love is essential for us, as well as the opportunity to learn, to do something worthwhile for others and sometimes just to stop and stare.

I reported in April on some of the priorities we were looking at for our churches as we planned for renewal and growth. The Plan we drew up on that basis set out that we would:

- * Recruit a part-time Youth and Children's Worker to help us grow and develop our work with children and young people and strengthen our links with St Edmund's School
- Pursue projects to adapt some of our church buildings (in particular Hoxne and Redlingfield churches) for additional community use
- * Encourage new vocations to lay and ordained ministry in our churches

Good progress is being made with the Plan:

- * We have appointed a Youth Worker and aim to start a youth group for 12-18 year olds in September look out for more news of this! And if you are 12-18 and you have any suggestions for what you would like from the youth group, do please get in contact.
- * We have installed a new toilet block at Hoxne church and we have initiated the process of getting permission for work on the bells and tower, which could ultimately provide a warm meeting space at the base of the tower.
- * We also have new people coming

forward to take up voluntary positions in our churches, though we still need more. Could God be calling you to play a more active part? It could be anything from contributing to a harvest supper to exploring a licensed ministry. If you would like to talk about how you can help, I am always ready to chat.

Book Reviews

Animal Farm

by George Orwell



Rob's choice of book for May was Animal Farm by George Orwell. Many of you may have read this at school for GCSC.

It tells the story of a group of farm animals who rebel against their human farmer, hoping to

create a society where animals can be equal, free, and happy. Ultimately the rebellion is betrayed, and under the dictatorship of a pig called Napoleon, the farm ends up in a state as bad as it was before.


The grand theme of *Animal Farm* has to do with the capacity for ordinary individuals to continue to believe in a revolution that has been utterly betrayed.

Orwell attempts to show those in power - Napoleon and his pigs - perverting the democratic promise of a revolution. At the end of the book, the animals realise that the pigs have become as cruel and oppressive as human farmers.

Animal farm is a commentary on Russian communism under Joseph Stalin, delivered in an allegorical form. The book was published in 1945. It was turned down by several publishers and

not allowed into some countries.

Rob's choice brought out lots of comments from his questions. As a group we enjoyed reading and discussing it.

This story is set in Stalin's Russia in 1936, the time of the Great Terror.

Captain Alexei Korolev, working for the Criminal Investigation Division of the Moscow Militia, is investigating the death of a young woman in a deconsecrated church. A veteran of World War I, his moral and political ideals are threatened,

as well as his life, when the feared NKVD organisation becomes involved.

Colonel Gregorin of the NKVD takes an interest, and it becomes evident that something even deeper and more sinister is going on.

Schwartz is an American in Russia, tracking down a religious Kazanskaya icon - a plot theme which threads through the book.

Korolev wonders who he can trust in the world of The Thieves, part of the Russian underworld. There's an atmosphere of fear, uncertainty and hunger prevailing.

Note - this book contains some horrific graphic detail.


The Holy Thief was shortlisted for a Crime Writers associated New Blood Dagger award, a Barry Award, The Kerry Group Irish Fiction Award, and the Theakstons Old Peculiar Crime Novel of the Year.

A huge thank you to all those who supported my Marathon Des Sables efforts to raise money for a defibrillator at the pavilion. Due to your generosity it's installed and ready for use. Your contributions helped to raise nearly £3,000 for the cause! I am relieved to be able to say that I successfully completed the Marathon Des Sables, and finished in one piece with lots of great memories of an incredible week.

The best word to describe it was brutal. Running 255 km over 7 days, fully self-sufficient (carrying all your food and kit) in the Sahara desert was always going to be a huge challenge but the conditions this year made it even harder. We were graced with a 'heat wave' in what's already very hot conditions with some days getting up to around 50 degrees. This led to the second largest drop out rate ever in 2023 of around 35% so it was an even greater achievement to complete it with my fellow Hoxne village compadre, Mark Ewin.

It got off to a fun start as when we arrived in our camp in Morocco we were greeted with a pretty substantial sandstorm. It was a reminder that this wasn't going to be easy. Over the next 7 days we travelled on foot over some incredible terrain pushing ourselves to the edge of what I thought was possible. This included one really tough double marathon day where we had to cover 90 km. After lots of sand, sweat, blisters and a few tears we

and a few tears we arrived at the finish line a week later, one of only 3 UK tents to have all the crew complete - no dropouts in tent 85!

Gardener's Diary

August

Sow: Onions, spinach, spring cabbages, radishes, rocket, hardy annuals.

Plant: Salad seedlings, spring onions, strawberry runners, winter brassicas such as kale, heathers.

Prune: Early summer-flowering shrubs, lavender (after flowering), pyracantha, rambling roses, wisteria, topiary.

Essential jobs: Remove bolted veg plants; replenish pond water; trim hedges to give new growth time to harden.

Harvest: Beetroot, chillies, courgettes, French & runner beans, raspberries, summer squashes, sweetcorn, tomatoes.

September

Sow: Biennial flowers, calabrese, carrots, chicory, Chinese and spring cabbage, Florence fennel.

Plant: Bedding plants, courgettes, herbs, leeks, winter brassicas.

Prune: Apple and pear trees, cherry trees (after fruiting), gooseberries, rambling roses (after flowering), redcurrants and whitecurrants, early summer shrubs—deutzia, philadelphus (after flowering).

Essential jobs: Plant out winter bedding; take shading off greenhouse glazing; divide perennials that are too big.

Harvest: Autumn cabbages, autumn raspberries, onions, maincrop potatoes, tomatoes, tree fruit (early apples & pears), courgettes, kale.

She shared many hints and tips about the best way to care for our hostas and keeping the dreaded slugs and snails at bay. We learnt a few things should we do it again next year, mainly not to sell before the agreed opening time, as by 10.15 the majority of the plants had been sold. Apologies to anyone who arrived just after 10 and found little left.

She kept log books recording her work, receiving orders from Mrs Padge. the Vicar's wife.

Harriet was nursing at Oakley Park from 1869 until 1882. She died in July 1892.

This is a small part of a fascinating story told by Richard, which you can see in full on the Hoxne Heritage Group website. A story beautifully told.

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Grand Drivers

At the Phoenix meeting in May one of our members told us of a free-of-charge driving assessment that she had completed.

At nearly 80 years of age she thought that she would seek reassurance that her driving skills were still up to scratch. I am pleased to say she came through unscathed; her standard of driving was congratulated and her self-confidence has had an immense boost.

Many of the Phoenix ladies thought that details of the scheme should be shared. The scheme is called 'Grand Driver' and is organised by Suffolk Roadsafe - yes, they are the same people that organise the speed awareness courses.

You only need three qualifications to take part: you must be over 60 years old, hold a UK driving licence and live in Suffolk.

For the mature driver, Suffolk Roadsafe offers not only driving assessments but workshops to refresh driving knowledge - when is the last time you read the Highway Code?

The next workshop locally is in Eye on Tuesday 19th September.

The assessments are no way as frightening as you may think, they last for about an hour and you drive roads that you are familiar with. Your trainer will focus on safe driving and coping strategies; their job is to support and guide you, so you can continue to drive



safely. You can ask questions and at the end of the assessment you are given a written report detailing all the things discussed during the session.

There is also a scheme for drivers aged 17-24 called 'Get into Gear'. There is a small charge for this one.

Baltic Timber Marks in Hoxne

As part of my research into the heritage of Hoxne and the surrounding area I have been conducting surveys of "Witch marks" or marks made deliberately to ward off evil. Our area is full of them, and surveys can be seen at https://www.hoxnehistory.org.uk/Witch%20Marks.php

Through this study I was asked to look at some marks on a mid-19th century house in Reading Green. The ceiling of the main downstairs room contained a string of interesting, scribed marks of which I was not familiar. Research and asking for ideas from online groups came up with the idea that they were Baltic timber marks and revealed interesting historical trade connections with the Baltic.

Baltic timber marks

Baltic softwood was imported to the UK - particularly in the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries - each marked with symbols including quality marks relating to the exporting port, as well as sometimes the name of the ship, and various other letters and numbers. Sequences of marks are found cut with a rase-knife, painted or chalked on the wood and are given the term "Baltic timber marks".

These marks represent:

- Cubic assessment and volume
- Timber quality
- Merchants' or handlers' marks or initials
- Purchaser's names or initials
- The names of ships used to transport the timber
- The names of ports of origin or destination
- Batch or supply numbers
- Date

Baltic marks are found throughout the 18th century, particularly gouged markings, but before 1784 they appear to make little sense. Around 1800 they become much better defined and abundant, before ceasing in 1870. They tell of a complex trade emerging between Britain, the industrial superpower of the age and the rest of the Continent, as well as the tumultuous events following the American and French revolutions. Britain had a reliance on Norwegian timber, and later colonial sources in North America. The American wars, coupled with Napolean's attempt to strangle Britain by embargo, cut off these traditional sources



and forced Britain to switch instead to the eastern Baltic, to Prussia, Sweden and Russia.

The process of procuring timber

The Crown or Aristocracy owned all the land with forests of tall, knot-free pines. They sold the timber to specialist wood cutters, who were usually Jewish. Entire settlements or "shtetls" could be found dedicated to this process, as Jews were forbidden access to other professions, particularly in the Russian Empire.

The trees were felled and dragged to the rivers and floated downstream in floating rafts 300m in length to the seaports. Merchants would then process them, grade them, and export them to British ports. During each stage of this complex process the timber accumulated a series of timber marks. Because the price of timber depended on its quality and dimensions, exporters had to distinguish these characteristics within their own stock and hence developed a system of marking. After being sawn, goods were sorted and marked before being stacked by dimension and quality. These marks usually consisted of a series of letters corresponding to the names of the sawmilling firms or their ports of shipment. Then quality of timber was

typically indicated by a variety of letters which were also inspired by the exportees' names or shipping ports. Moreover, a stamped crown was frequently used to identify the best quality. This classification was carried out by a specialised class of workers called *brackers* who were trained to sort and mark timber from visual inspection.

The *brackers* classified the goods in three recognised categories:

- First or best middling
- Second or good middling
- Third or common middling

There was an additional quality or "crown" whose timber was chosen for the straightness of grain and freedom from knots.

The port marks

Danzig, Riga Memel and Stettin had marks made with a rase knife. The mark indicating the port was inscribed in the middle of the string of marks; if it was from Danzig and Riga and Memel and Stettin timber was marked at the end. Best middling, good middling and common middling had its own specific mark.


The shipping marks stamped on the ends of sawn timber tell the recipient who the timber producer is as well as the type and grade of the sawn timber. Sawn timber is classified into various grades based on its technical and visual properties.

Shipping marks are a guarantee of consistent high quality of wood products. This is an overview of qualities and grades.

Shipping marks can be defined as a symbol, word or number that is attached on to each package unit for easy identification and handling of the cargo.

Based upon this information, the Baltic Timber marks suggest the timber came from Riga and the quality was of second or good middling quality. The other marks are likely to relate to the exporting company. It is amazing just how well connected Hoxne was with the Baltic in the 19th Century!

I would like to hear from anyone in our area who may have either Baltic Timber Marks or possibly "Witch Marks." I am happy to do a survey of your marks as long as I can use the information for my own research and publicise it on the Hoxne Heritage website or even in the Village Voice.

New Reeding Woods

A quiet walk at Pound Lane Wood



White orchid

The meadow at the wood has been constantly changing over the last few weeks. The yellow rattle is becoming well established and is suppressing the grasses. The flowers are mostly over, and it is setting seed to help it spread. The bee

orchids have gone over but two pyramid orchids are still in flower. The meadow has both the purple-pink and white flowering varieties. Orchid seeds are so small they cannot germinate on their own but rely on fungi in the soil to

provide food for them to grow.

Whilst I wandered the paths trying to take a photo of one of the many meadow

brown butterflies, a buzzard circled overhead. Alerted by the mewing call I looked up and got a picture.



Honeysuckle

The common knapweed added a splash of colour, and the butterflies were feeding together with hover flies. Red headed cardinal beetles were happy on the cow parsley.

Purple vetch was growing through the brambles and in the hedges dog roses and honeysuckle were in full bloom. The rides are looking lush and green,

benefiting from the recent rain. In the woodland areas, nests show that birds are using the cover provided.

It was good to see the

pond full of water and life again. An Emperor dragonfly flew by the pond and a darter hawked up and down the rides.

I had a peaceful walk, enjoying the woods and wildlife. I had my camera on the wrong settings when I arrived and so missed a photo of a Fritillary butterfly on my arrival, which is an exciting find. This is likely to have been the Silverwashed Fritillary, which has been recorded in nearby woodland over the past three years. A large, fast-flying, brightly marmalade-coloured butterfly,

this is one of the most beautiful sights to be found in woodland during high summer. It has silver streaks on the wing undersides, which can often be seen as it stops to feed on flowers such as bramble.

Although the butterfly is seen mostly in sunny glades and rides, it actually breeds in the shadier parts of adjacent woodland. The Silverwashed

Fritillary declined during the twentieth century, especially in England and Wales, but has spread noticeably during recent decades.

After a good walk, and despite the camera setting issues, I still came away calm and refreshed.

A lot of schools accept cheaper non-logo items rather than official logo school uniform, so do check with your school if this is the case.

Red Feather Club

Ninety-nine-year-old American World War II veteran Ray Hobbs was back flying from Horham Airfield this year after nearly 80 years.

The former B-17 Flying Fortress pilot from Ogden in Utah took to the skies over East Anglia bringing tears to those watching on.

Ray was in the UK with around 50 other US visitors - the families of men who served in the 95th Bomb Group during WW2 - as part of an 80th anniversary reunion tour organised by the 95th Bomb Group Heritage Association in Horham.

Modest Ray plays down any talk of danger during the seven missions he flew during the closing stages of the war in May 1945 - six of them dropping essential supplies to the Dutch population, who were starving.

However, one of the aircraft he had flown on a Chowhound mission to Holland became the last B-17 shot down over Europe when, despite a ceasefire agreement, it came under anti-aircraft fire and went down in the North Sea on 7th May 1945, with the loss of ten lives.

Ray Hobbs on his war: "I flew mercy missions; one to the Hague, one to Amsterdam, and four to Utrecht, dropping food to the Dutch people. I flew

a Cook's tour over part of Germany and France. At the end of the war, I flew with my group from Horham, England, to Bradley Field, Connecticut, where we left our plane. The B-17 planes of the 95th bomb group were then flown to Kingman, Arizona, where they were destroyed. I was privileged to be at the controls of Sentimental Journey in September 2011, when I was 87 years old."

The 95th flew more than 300 missions and, as well as strategic bombing sorties targeting harbours, industries, rail yards and cities, it dropped food and supplies to starving civilians and the resistance in occupied Europe (Operation Chowhound), it supported the D-Day invasion and ended the war transporting liberated prisoners of war back to the UK.

Hoxne residents have put themselves up for nomination and hopefully they will start in August. In the meantime we are looking for other candidates to join the Council, especially women and younger people so that it can more effectively reflect the diversity of people living in the Parish.

Many of you may have negative feelings about the Parish Council; that it has very little power and it just becomes a venue for talking about local issues without anything material being done about them. Certainly the Council has very limited power when it comes to such problems as traffic through the village. Yet through our powers of persuasion, reasoned argument and sometimes a little coercion we can influence the decisions made by more powerful authorities such as the County or District Councils. The Parish Council also owns and maintains a range of village assets, provides financial support to many village organisations, commissions research and considers planning and development control in the village. The Parish Council can also report on local issues such as overgrown footpaths, potholes, fly tipping, bringing these to the attention of the relevant authority.

Despite our currently depleted number of councillors this is proving to be a very busy year for Hoxne Parish Council. We are for example in the final stages of our Neighbourhood Development Plan being finalised and you the residents of Hoxne having a vote on whether you approve of it. We also are developing plans for spending extra money we have as a result of the Community Infrastructure Levy. (All households in the Parish of Hoxne received a guestionnaire to fill in indicating how they would like the money spent). The Council is also in discussions with residents on Green Street and your local County Councillor Peter Gould about traffic management problems in that part of the Parish.

All Parish Council meetings are open to the public, and we normally meet on the first Thursday of the month either at the village hall or, in the summer months, at the pavilion on the sports field. Meetings start at 7.30 pm. More details can be seen on the Hoxne Parish Council website with agendas for the next meeting and minutes of previous meetings. Enquiries can also be made to the Parish Clerk.

Voices from the Past June to November 1990

The summer issue of the Village Voice 1990 reported activities from both ends of the age spectrum. The 24th April had seen 29 members of the over 60s club enjoy their 37th Annual Birthday tea at St Edmund's House. As far as I know, the club is no longer active - I wonder how many more years it continued. Anyone know?

The primary school, which had just been totally redecorated outside and now had 86 pupils, had successfully raised £700 for their funds at their May Fayre. When I first knew Hoxne this 'fayre' and its maypole dancing on the green, along with the still much-loved Harvest breakfast, seemed to epitomise the village's unique community spirit at both ends of the summer season.

The school's term project was entitled 'Changes' - with some children investigating changes in and around the village, learning from older residents and during visits to various areas about Hoxne. Older children were planning a visit to see the Thames barrier. Visits also took in the Horniman Museum in London, the Museum of East Anglian Life in Stowmarket and Christchurch Park and Crown Pools in Ipswich.

The Theatre Club fancied a change

and went to Snape Maltings to hear the music of Arnold, Elgar, Britten and Lloyd-Webber, among others, played by The Regimental Band of the Coldstream Guards - one of the oldest military bands in the world with over two hundred years of continuous service.

Another snippet I found in that issue refers to the showing to a packed-to-capacity audience at St Edmund's Hall of a video by Philip Gunton entitled "Hoxne '89" showing 13 events held in the village. A profit of £135 was made for the Friends of St Peter & St Paul. I wonder if that film still exists. Wouldn't it be lovely to watch it now!?

The report of the Garden and Social Club refers to their Local History and Archaeology Section who were involved in some exciting research with assistance from the County Archaeology Department and The British Museum and hoped to make news early the following year. I look forward to digging into 1991's issues!

The vicar's wife, Christine Lowe, put pen to paper with the following submission:

A Summer Visitor

"It was a beautiful hot summer day at the end of August when I heard a knock at the front door. On answering it, I saw a tiny lady with a mass of white hair, lovely smile and twinkling blue eyes. She was visiting the Eye show [remember those?] with



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her son and she asked if she could look at the Vicarage and garden.

As we walked round the house and garden this remarkably agile lady explained she was 95 years old and as a little girl of 11 had come to Hoxne to stay.

She had lived in London and went to Sunday School, where she paid 3d a week into the Country Holiday Fund. She remembered travelling to Suffolk by train and staying on a nearby farm. A great adventure for a London lass, she told me.

The highlight of her stay was going to church and hearing the choir sing and later having a tea party on the Vicarage lawn underneath the mulberry tree. It was the mulberry tree she remembered and she was so thrilled to see that after all these years it was still there. This was in 1906 when the tree was standing upright.

She explained in all these years her life had had its ups and downs, but her Christian beliefs had not changed and neither had her memory of a happy childhood visit, which had stayed with her for 84 years.

She said that some things do not change and her delight in seeing the mulberry tree again and telling me about her childhood memories was as infectious as the sunny day and her beautiful smile."

It was exciting to hear from the present owner of the Vicarage that the old mulberry tree, now fallen over, gnarled and spread like a dragon, is still there, along with a younger companion, after all these years!
