


# Wingfield: Suffolk's Forgotten Castle

So we round off the autumn season in the church with the Feast of Christ the King on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> November, reminding us that He holds us all in the palm of his hand and will not let us go.

Following on from the last report from the Churchwardens, I am pleased to report that the new lavatory building is

complete and in use. A new resin path has been laid from the car park to the North door, making for much drier and cleaner feet when entering the church. The path has inset lights which will aid visitors on dark evenings. We hope the new facilities will encourage more people to attend fundraising events and evening services.

The facilities were in use for the Lammas service which was very well attended; we are pleased to report that some £1800 was raised for the Addington Fund.

#### Book Club Review

#### The Vanishing Half, by Brit Bennett



**B**rit Bennett is a black American woman author, whose book is a family saga set in the 1940s and 1990s.

Identical twin sisters Desiree and Stella Vignes are light-skinned black sisters, raised in the town of Mallard, Louisiana. At the age of

16 the twins run away to New Orleans.

Stella disappears, and hides the fact that she is black so she can fit into a new life living as a white woman, marrying a wealthy white man. They have a daughter, Kennedy.

When a black family move into the road, the other residents make life difficult for them. Stella befriends the family, defying the locals.

The other twin, Desiree, leaves an abusive marriage and returns to Mallard with her daughter Jude, who is black skinned.

Jude goes to university in Los Angeles,

and falls in love with Reese, who is transitioning from male to female.

The book centres on issues of identity - cultural, racial and sexual. It looks at reasons the characters have for trying to change their identities, and the impact that has both on themselves and those around them - and what can happen when true identity is revealed.

Bennett explores these issues, and also looks at domestic violence and the justifications given for abuse.

Jan chose the book for us. It was well thought out, especially about issues of colour, and was an interesting read. We enjoyed discussing the ins and outs of the families - a real page-turner.

The Vanishing Half became a best seller in 2020. It was selected by The New York Times Review's 10 Best Books of 2020. Barack Obama selected it as his favourite book of that year.

Our next book for discussion on will be Jane Austin's *Persuasion*. Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> October, 6.00 pm at the De La Pole Arms in Wingfield, if you would like to ioin us.


On Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> November we are back at Hoxne Village

#### The WantEd!

The successful alliance between Hoxne pavilion and playing field and Ed's Plaice fish and chip van has attracted national publicity. It has been featured in a magazine for the fast food and fish and chip industry, *Chippie Chat*. The following is an extract from that article by Austen Dack:

"Recently I was invited over to Hoxne in Suffolk to see first-hand how a local village playing field and social club and a mobile chip van owner have teamed up to help each other out. Dior spent his early childhood on the coast of Normandy with his wealthy parents and four siblings, before the family moved to Paris. From an early age he had a sense of style. He worked for Lucien Lelong during WWII, while his sister Catherine worked with the French Resistance. The perfume



Miss Dior is named after Catherine. After the war Dior worked for Marcel Boussac and founded The House of Dior. The models were chosen for their hourglass figures, emphasising Dior's style. He also designed hats and had a hat boutique at the fashion house. Dior's clothes were worn by Princess Margaret, Margot Fonteyn and Grace Kelly. He died at the age of 52.

On the 8th August we were joined by Jackie Carreira and Andy Deane of the **QuirkHouse Theatre Company**. Jackie is the daughter of Portuguese immigrants. She worked in newspaper advertising then toured the world playing bass guitar, before becoming a writer. Andy, the son of English and Drama teachers, became a poet and actor.

Jackie and Andy have helped relaunch the Bury St Edmunds Literature Festival. They have also co-written *Winter Tails*, a collection of animal fables from around the world, due out in September. We look forward to their return to Hoxne next year - perhaps with a show!

# Hoxne Computer & Mobile Support Group

Wednesdays, 10.30 -12.30 in Hoxne Village Hall

This pilot course of 8 weekly 2-hour sessions being held in Hoxne Village Hall aims to address a range of concerns and issues reflecting a diverse set of technology-related challenges commonly encountered by individuals in today's digital age.

The course is aimed at those with a very basic knowledge of information technology and who feel they have been 'left behind', feeling vulnerable and lacking confidence to navigate today's digital landscape.

The 8-week structured course started on Wednesday, September 20th (10.30am -12.30) but the format is designed also to address individuals' issues on a drop-in basis. (£4 per drop in) So it is not too late to join us.

An inaugural drop-in session was held on August 16th attended by 10 participants with an aim to establish the key issues and challenges to structure and tailor the 8-week course effectively to address users' needs.



The diverse range of issues identified underscores the varying levels of digital literacy and evolving nature of technology. It also emphasises the importance of community support and education to empower our villagers to use IT systems and digital devices effectively.

We are fortunate to have the services of Andrew Hannon from Diss who works for a large archival company and has experience in helping people to understand IT systems, hold demonstrations and online meetings. He is interested in knowledge sharing within the community and will lead the sessions. Assistance will be available from Steve Card from the village.

If you feel your expertise, knowledge and confidence in using this technology is lacking then this course is for you. It is a safe, non-threatening and sociable environment in which to learn.



Hoxne Parish Council now has six councillors serving the people of Hoxne. We have moved away from the abyss, when if there had been fewer than four council members then the work of the Council would have been taken over by Mid Suffolk District Council. However there are still five vacancies to fill, so if you feel you may be willing to represent the people of Hoxne then please contact the Parish Clerk. In the last couple of months councillors have been concentrating on traffic management issues around the parish, including making recommendations for

the decreasing of speed limits in most areas of the village, which would involve a legal traffic regulation order being submitted to the Highways Authority (Suffolk County Council).

Councillors Lerwill and Kruszewski have in addition been surveying Green Street, along with a traffic engineer from Suffolk County Council, with a view to identifying what possible measures might be considered to ensure the vehicles using the B1118 do so more safely. They have also washed the 30mph signs around the village and cut back vegetation where necessary to ensure that this speed limit can be more clearly seen by motorists. Thanks must go to them for undertaking this work.

In addition, the second part of a traffic survey measuring the amount and type of traffic using roads in and out of Hoxne has been completed, taking into account the ban on heavy lorries in Eye.

Currently the results of this are being analysed.

The Council has ordered a new notice-board to be erected opposite the village shop for the use of village groups to advertise their up-and-coming events. It will not be for the use of commercial advertising. The Council is making a concerted effort to remove all fly-posting placed on telegraph poles or other structures such as the well at Nuttery Vale, which spoils the appearance of the village.

Mid Suffolk District Council is asking constituted voluntary groups to apply for grants of up to £10,000 which can be used towards improvements or repairs to

'social infrastructure such as village halls, play areas, sports facilities or open spaces'. Applications for this current round had to be by 1st October, however it is likely there will be later pots of money being offered. More information on Community Grants can be obtained on the Mid Suffolk District Council website.
