Hello to all the children of Hoxne


I will be making my special appearance in Hoxne again on Christmas morning to deliver presents, with some local elves to help with deliveries - my sack will be very full!







The Centre now has a 'Waveney Trail' - museums along the Waveney valley are marked on a trail map, obtained from the Centre. The map includes our own Wireless (Radio) museum, with its 1930s themed living room and room of memories.

We continue to expand our collection of vintage wirelesses and other vintage audio equipment - reel-to-reel tape recorders, wind-up gramophones and radiograms. We also have a collection of 78rpm records, played on most open days.

We have had new additions to the Centre this year - an Art Deco piano, 1930s HMV radiogram and electric fire manufactured in Norwich, together with toys and other artefacts to provoke distant childhood memories.

In the coming year we hope to develop the archives, and make them more widely available for those doing local history research.

All our museum areas are open during the winter months on the last Sunday of the month. The inclusive entrance fee to all museum areas is £3.

We are constantly on the lookout for new volunteers who could help our small but dedicated band of helpers. Those with skills needed to repair radios and audio equipment are especially needed.

Doreen Weller obituary

Long-time Hoxne resident, Doreen Weller, died just a few weeks short of her 99th birthday. There were those among her friends who believed that Doreen, being resolute by nature, would make it to 100 but it was not to be. Even so, 98 was a remarkable achievement and

marked a life that covered twists and turns through illness and war before arriving, with her husband David, in Hoxne in the late 1950s.

Born in Alverstoke. Hampshire in 1924, Doreen's early life began well in a house with a maid, a father who owned a garage, and a start to education in a private school. When only seven, all things changed when her parents divorced and she moved to live with her grandfather.

At 12, Doreen and her mother settled in Dulwich and education continued at a day school, prematurely ended by rheumatic

fever and a long period of recovery.

Secretarial training at Pitman's College prepared her for working life as the Second World War came. It was during the first years of the war that she met and married David, who was in the Army serving on home soil due to health reasons. There was a close call with a bomb; rehousing and six weeks of caring for a neighbour's baby boy while his mother was in hospital. It was, she later admitted, among the hardest six weeks of her lifé.

That life continued in Nunhead, south London, after the war with David running a successful business selling office equipment. Then another illness possibly polio - caused loss of use in her left leg and arm; hard work and determination resulted in recovery.

Weekend trips to the countryside led to

the purchase of a small (two up and two down) cottage at Bardwell in Suffolk in the year of the late Queen's coronation, 1953. Limitations with the cottage (no piped water or connected sewer) resulted in a move to Hoxne to a cottage in the lane opposite the Swan Inn.

The call of the countryside grew stronger and Doreen and David moved

across the lane to Bridge Farm where Doreen kept cats, dogs, chickens, sheep, rabbits and pigs while David continued to restore and sell antique furniture - previously having a shop in Market Hill, Diss.

Doreen immersed herself in many aspects of village life, contributing to Meals on Wheels, the Women's Institute becoming the Hoxne Phoenix Group and the Hoxne Theatre Club accompanied by a wide circle of friends with frequent 'social gatherings' and parties in the barn.

David died in 2003 and Doreen's last years were spent in the considerate care of Hartismere Place. Eve. Although deteriorating health

limited her in a way she would not have wished, this was a long life lived, from the beginning, with purpose.

Her funeral was at Hoxne Church on 26 July.







Book Club Review

The Hare with Amber **Eyes** by Edmund de Waal

 T his family memoir follows the history of de Waal's Ephrussi Jewish family, and the 264 Japanese netsuke passed down through the family. Originally carved in ivory or wood, these beautiful and precious little figures were attached to little carriers bever tied to a kimone. little carrying boxes tied to a kimono belt, or obi.

We discussed what we liked and disliked about the book. The story was intricate, enjoyed for its various storylines.



De Waal, a potter since he was quite young, studied under the renowned potter Bernard Leach. De Waal's pottery is very highly collected by rich followers of his work and also collected by museums.

He also worked with Japanese potters and in 1991 was given a scholarship to

study Japanese at an English University. This was followed by a year in Tokyo, then recovering from the crash of the bubble economy of the 1980s.

After World War II the Ephrussi family faced the loss of their banking empire.

Another element was The Anschluss, when Austria was annexed to Nazi Germany; the book detailed some of the atrocities perpetrated on Jews at that time.

We discussed what the hare symbolised, Aesop's fable of the Hare and the Tortoise and the race that the hare lost - by stopping for a nap. The hare has a symbolic meaning of charity and longevity - slow and steady wins the race.

There are many topics covered in this book, each one of interest for discussion. It was appreciated for its history, and the different story lines weaved through the book.



Government Support

On 25th October, the Government announced funding to help communities recover from the impact of Storm Babet.

- Flooded households in affected areas can apply for up to £500 to give cash quickly to help with immediate costs.
- Households and businesses significantly affected by recent flooding will be eligible for 100% council tax and business rates relief for at least three months.
- Small-to-medium sized businesses in affected areas will be eligible for up to £2,500 from the Business Recovery Grant to help them return quickly to business as usual.
- Eligible flood-hit property owners will be able to apply for up to £5,000 to help make their homes and businesses more resilient to

future flooding via the Property Flood Resilience Repair Grant Scheme.

Eligibility

The support will be made available through a scheme known as the Flood Recovery Framework. Details are still awaited from the government. In the meantime, it is essential that if you, or your business, suffered significant flood related damage, you report this online via the Highways Reporting Tool on:

Denham

Following on from our report in the last edition of the Village Voice, I'm please to let you know that work has commenced at the village hall and is progressing well. We hope to welcome people to the hall early next year.

The next Parish Council meeting is on 16thJanuary 2024 at 7:30 pm at St John Baptist Church, Denham, unless the village hall is complete then we will be holding the meeting there. Check the noticeboard for the agenda. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Hoxne

As this report is being written, Hoxne Parish Council is due to have its monthly meeting at which the effects of the severe flooding that affected much of Suffolk, including Hoxne, will be discussed. Flooding was widespread with many homes affected, particularly around the bottom of Abbey Hill, around the Swan pub and Nuttery Vale. The Parish Council has virtually no powers when it comes to flood prevention - that responsibility lies with the Environment Agency and the County Council. Previously the Parish Council has not acted when any flooding in the village has taken place. However, with the frequency of flooding in Hoxne likely to increase then the Parish Council may have to look at measures which may not stop the flooding but at least try and mitigate the worst effects of it. The Parish Council is already endeavouring to work more closely with those agencies that do have the powers and responsibility for flood prevention and alleviation. Watch this space.

It was hoped to have at least one of the new noticeboards up by now on Low Street, however it seems they have to be erected by someone with the correct qualifications. Therefore the noticeboard, along with the proposed 'entrance gates' to the Green Street part of the village, will be put in place by a qualified highways technician.

In order to support some of the work of Suffolk Highways, two of your councillors have volunteered to undertake the Highways Ranger qualification. If any parishioners are also interested in doing this, which will enable minor works such as hedge and vegetation cutting, road sign cleaning and footway skirting to take place, please get in touch with the Parish Council.

A meeting was held one morning on Green Street by your councillors with the Police Crime Commissioner, along with two senior officers responsible for road law enforcement and the community traffic engineer from Suffolk County Council. The meeting was also joined by some of the residents of Green Street to air their complaints about speeding traffic and the volume of heavy lorries. It was fortunate that at first hand, all there were able to witness two large lorries attempting to pass each other on Green Street necessitating one of the lorries having to mount the pavement. An illegal act. The police promised to increase their presence on Green Street, particularly now that more HGVs were using the B1118 as a result of the HGV ban in Eye. The County Council is also undertaking its own survey of traffic volume and speed, not only on Green Street but also on the Eye Road and Low Street. Realistic proposals were identified for more effectively managing traffic throughout Hoxne and implementation of these will depend on the County Council traffic survey and of course money. Again, watch this space. The Parish Council remains keen to hear from any parishioners who would be interested in running a Community Speedwatch Scheme.
