



# Commemorating the Crew of the Lancaster LM 464

Sat 16<sup>th</sup> March 2024, 1.00-4.00pm Syleham & Wingfield Village Hall

We are running a fund-raising drive to purchase a permanent memorial to these brave young man who lost their lives almost 80 years ago. We are also running a commemorative event on 16<sup>th</sup> March 2024, between 1.00 and 4.00pm at Syleham and Wingfield Village Hall. We hope to dedicate the memorial plaque and share some WWII stories and entertainment with local associated charities. This is the crew's story:

Pilot Officer **Roy Dixon**, Age 20 - Pilot Sergeant Percy Reginald Lawn, Age 22 -

On the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1944 at 1920hrs, Lancaster LM464 E (Edward) of 101 Squadron lifted off from RAF Ludford Magna in the Lincolnshire Wolds. The target was Frankfurt, Germany. At the controls that evening was Pilot Officer Roy Dixon DFM and next to him was Sergeant Bertram Crosby, the Flight Engineer. He would be assisting the pilot with fuel calculations, monitoring the engines and hydraulic pressures. Down in the nose of the aircraft, Canadian Air Force Flying Officer Sydney Huntly, the Bomb Aimer, would be busying himself

checking his switch selections and bombsight, ready to direct the pilot onto the target as they approached Frankfurt.

Meanwhile the Navigator Sergeant William Thompson would be updating their track towards the target with the latest winds, which he received from the Wireless Operator Sergeant Roger **Vernon**. All the time the Air Gunners Sgt Norris Marshall in the mid upper turret and **Percy Lawn** in the rear would be scanning the horizon for German Nightfighters trying to infiltrate the Bomber Stream. The Lancaster was fitted with a top-secret radio jamming system which required an additional eighth crew member. The Special Wireless Operator Sgt Robert 'Harry' Bryan huddled over the glow coming from a cathode ray tube, his job to listen for German transmissions and jam the frequency with noise, thereby disabling German ground communications with their fighters.



They reached the target at approximately 22.10 and at 20,000 ft successfully dropped their bomb load. LM 464 headed back home. At 01:40 they reached the English coast at Orford Ness. Two other Lancasters returning from the raid reported hearing LM 464 calling on the radio fairly clearly. This was the last contact they made. Five miles NNE of Horham at 01.55, LM 464 crashed in a field behind Fir Tree Farm in Syleham. All the crew were killed.



#### From death to life

This is the time of year when nature seems to move from death to life. Bare trees break into leaf and green shoots come up from the cold earth. Seeds that have been dormant in the ground begin to germinate - some actually requiring a period of frost in order to do so. It may feel like winter still but the days are getting longer, plants are starting to grow again and animals are coming out of

hibernation. Traditionally, the birds choose their mates on 14<sup>th</sup> February - Valentine's Day. The church's year follows the

same pattern, with Ash Wednesday which marks the start of Lent also falling on 14<sup>th</sup> February this year. Lent is a season of penitence which can feel wintry, but which is intended to spur new growth in us as we prepare for an explosion of life when Jesus Christ defeats death and rises from the tomb on Easter Day (31<sup>st</sup> March). Jesus himself used the imagery of seeds germinating when he spoke of his death on the cross. He said: 'Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.'

During Lent we will be holding a special Study Group on the subject of Worship, with sessions on Tuesdays 20<sup>th</sup> February and 5<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> March. If you have ever wondered why we do the things we do in church, this might help provide the answers. Contact me for further details.



On 16<sup>th</sup> January we present a talk at Hoxne village hall by Graham Moore, titled "The Early History of Wireless in East Anglia". This copy had to be in before the talk takes place but from interest shown I am sure it will be well attended.

It has been a good year for the group with some interesting talks at the village hall and meetings at The Swan where members chat, plan events, discuss all things related to the history of Hoxne and surrounding villages and enjoy a series of additional mini talks - check us out at www.hoxnehistory.org.uk, you may like to join us.

On Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> March we are back at Hoxne village hall for an interesting talk by Tony Sillis, titled "Little Devils - How microbes have shaped human history".

Microscopic organisms have affected human life, culture and society since pre-history - they continue to do so today. Tony will present examples of how they have changed our world and where in East Anglia we may find evidence of their effects.

Tony started working as a laboratory junior in medical microbiology with the Public Health Laboratory Service (a public sector arms-length body funded by the Department of Health) in 1969. The role of the PHLS was "to protect the population from infection". He ended his career as the chief executive of the PHLS in 2005, when the organisation was dissolved by the government.



Tony has a post-graduate qualification in medical microbiology and whilst working was a Fellow of the Institute of Biomedical Science. His work in the laboratory brought him face to face with many different micro-organisms - bacteria, viruses and fungi - some trivial, some serious and a few deadly. Please allow him to introduce you to some of them.

As usual this talk will start at 7.30pm and will cost £5 at the door (£4 for Hoxne Heritage Group members). The bar will be open from 7pm and all members of the public are welcome; we look forward to seeing you there.

He will be greatly missed by all of us who have worked with him and socialised with him over these past decades.

On reflection we have decided not to continue with this format of meeting as a group because the one-to-one tuition is more appropriately delivered in a home environment, or as a clinic-style format in view of specific needs and a variety of devices. # Hoxne Post Office and Shop

Mike Barton and his team have been working hard - there are now 30 volunteers working on this exciting project.

Here's the latest news:

- \* A price of £400,000 has been agreed for the purchase of the shop/Post Office building (which matches the independent valuation we commissioned).
- \* We decided NOT to take on the running of the shop last year and instead focus our efforts on raising funds to purchase the building in this year.
- \* Members of the committee have started to help with general tasks to enable the shop to stay open (eg, doing the cash 'n' carry run!) but the current business is still Joan's.
- Alison Buckland has been recruited as Manager and is currently completing training for the role.
- \* We have been awarded a grant of £8,600 to assist with the business plan and share issue.
- \* A complete Schedule of Works for the shop refurbishment has been completed and we are in the process of obtaining quotations from contractors.
- \* A Pre-Planning Application has been completed.
- Discussions with local groups have commenced to ascertain how we can all work together to the benefit of the community.

## Update from Mike:

As I sit here on 8th Jan we have just 3 weeks until we submit our bid to the government's Community Ownership Fund



(deadline 31st Jan). There are many of us working on the details, from solar panel quotes to letters of support to financial forecasts - all in all we're in really good shape.

We should hear back from the government around the end of March and in the meantime will have the job of securing the funding to match what we'll receive from central government. The most important part of that is raising money from the local community by issuing shares in the Community Benefit Society which will own the post office and shop. It's the shares that enable this incredibly valuable asset to be community owned, with shareholders deciding what happens to it in future. Please look out for a village hall meeting at some point in February to let you know more.



# Local Author's Latest Book GD Silkstone's

His first job was with the National Provincial Bank in London. After that he was employed in the Sheffield steel industry as an analytical chemist before taking up law in 1968. He practised law in the Civil Service in London from 1970 - 1988 and then in the legal profession in Colchester, Spalding and Holbeach in Lincolnshire, and Penzance in Cornwall before his retirement in 2009 at the age of 67.

He came to Hoxne in 2017 following the death of his partner Wilma, with whom he had shared a relationship for 25 years.

Apart from writing he enjoys

photography, freshwater fishing, walking, gardening and the movies.

He also works as an Ambassador for Cancer Research UK.

Over the years he has been passionate about helping people who have suffered injustices, particularly from the authorities.

He has two sons, six grandchildren and two great granddaughters.

He wrote his first three books while spending time with Wilma on the Balearic island of Menorca.

A Fairy Tale Of Our Times is his fourth novel.

He says:

"I have always wanted to write books but my involvement in the legal profession until 2009 prevented me from really getting down to it. In events I was over 70 when I produced my first novel and in retrospect it was hardly a worldbeater!

"It's a case really of using one's imagination where fiction is concerned. My English teacher in the 1950s used to say, 'Let your imagination run wild and free, like a butterfly fluttering from flower to flower in the summer breeze.' I've tried to emulate that.

"I didn't have any past connections with Hoxne when I first came here but I've made many new friends and love the place in my wintering years. We used to take our sons to Bressingham Steam Museum in the early 1970s when we lived in Tiptree in Essex. They loved it, and we did too. My parents moved to Norfolk in the late 60s and had a chalet and a boat on the Yare at Brundall. We loved that situation too."

# New Reeding Wood

"As the days lengthen so the cold strengthens". It has been wet and relatively mild so far this winter but folklore has it that now we have passed the solstice we will get colder times, and

hopefully drier.

It is very wet and muddy up at the woóds but still an uplifting place to walk. The recent winds have removed a lot of the leaves that

were late to fall. The hedges and trees may look bare but they are a promise of

good things to come in spring. Buds are swelling and catkins are out. Seed heads replace earlier flowers, and lichens provide splashes of colour.

In the wood the trees are going to provide food and shelter in the coming months. Buckthorn

provides a thorny protection for nesting birds and brimstone caterpillars feed on the leaves in spring. Brimstones have

become more common in Suffolk following initiatives aimed at encouraging the use of buckthorn in hedges by wildlife groups. Hawthorn flowers are a delight to both people and

insects and the haws feed autumn birds. Bees love the flowers of the field maple and the yellow autumn colours are evecatching. The crab apples are now largely gone but the blossom will be out in spring.





No work will be done at the wood until the weather is warmer and the ground dry. The pond is higher than it has been for a long time. The owl box will be cleaned out and hopefully it will be occupied this year. The bird boxes we put up will also be watched for put up will also be watched for

> occupants. Although not much is possible outside now there is a lot to look forward to when the cold and wet weather passes.

# Voices from the Past

## December 1990 - January 1991

In the vicar's seasonal message was a powerfully-worded reminder that God chose as the birthplace of His only son, Jesus, a country with particular problems - poverty, oppression, civil violence and unrest, and near civil war as well as daily struggle with hunger, violence and cruelty. The Rev Tony Lowe saw a comforting Christmas message here but, in light of recent events in the Holy Land after 2000 years, I fear his optimism was sadly misplaced.

Efforts were afoot to build a badly needed new pavilion at the playing field. I was strongly reminded of our current campaign to save the Post Office/shop and take it into community ownership. John Chapman wrote that he knew not everyone was in agreement, some saying we didn't need a new one and others saying it would never happen. But he said that when the Chapmans moved to Hoxne in the 1970s the attitude of Hoxne people seemed to be 'if we want something we will have it', such as the playing field itself, the tennis courts, the bowling green, children's play equipment - all then still in use and in fair condition! The pavilion had been second-hand when purchased more than 30 years before.



Hot Press News quoted from 'The Free Paper', 16<sup>th</sup> November 1990:

"Jubilant villagers were celebrating on Monday after winning the first round of their battle for a £23,000 grant for a new playing field pavilion.



Mid Suffolk District Council has provisionally approved the grant which will fund half the cost of the planned building at Hoxne.

The planned new facility would include a club room, changing rooms and a shower and would replace the 30-year-old wooden building."

So far there was £7,566 in the pavilion account towards the cost of the new building, estimated at approximately £46,000. John pointed out that was clearly a significant sum to raise - even if costs for the project could be reduced, the council would still be giving 'only' 50% - and urged playing field users and clubs to get together and arrange some fundraising events. Well, the brick-built pavilion at the playing field is lasting evidence of their success! I imagine that as I dig further into the 'Voice' archive, more of the story will be unearthed.

Among events and services reported for St Peter and St Paul's Church that autumn was the marriage of Marcus Charles Read and Helen Mary Saunders.

K.G. Read and Son are long-time advertisers and supporters of Village Voice and, like me, many will remember Marcus worked with his father at that time on our plumbing, heating and general building works. My own oil boiler was installed in 1977 by his father when Marcus was a young man and it was only, finally, replaced in the summer of 2022. Marcus now approaches retirement age, having trained his own son Daniel, so we can look forward to continuity. I mentioned to the Reads that I had come across their wedding announcement and they told me that

they remembered the 6<sup>th</sup> October 1990 was a very windy day and the Rev Lowe was hoping that the roof wouldn't blow off!

A stall in Diss market and an auction. both by the PTA, had respectively raised £70 and £700 for St Edmund's school - to be spent on a third Nimbus computer for the children. Community funds were also generated by a bonfire party and the Harvest Breakfast; the editor thanked the organisers, helpers and supporters for the £400 raised. Proceeds from the Harvest Breakfast were split between St Edmund's Hall and playing field pavilion funds (£150 each) and the Village Voice magazine (£100). Hoxne Playgroup thanked supporters of their Christmas fair on 20th October, which raised just over £300 for new equipment and running

Congratulations were extended to Joan Dale (now Joan Garnham) who had been selected to swim backstroke and butterfly for Norfolk in the Eastern Counties Championships. She came fourth in the backstroke, and Norfolk as a team came second with Essex being first. Regular readers of *Voices* 

From the Past and 'old timers' might recall that Joan was also running the swimming club and teaching the village's children to swim.

Pattermore's Pen-Pushers had been active; their first publication - a booklet called Past Times - had been well received and members had been invited by both Suffolk and Norfolk Radio to talk about it. Through the Village Voice, Gladys Pattermore thanked Mr and Mrs Moor at Low Street Post Office, the Nelson Family at Cross Street Stores, Mr and Mrs Marioram at Heckfield Green Post Office, Mr and Mrs Britten at Denham Post Office and Mr and Mrs Cattermole at the paper shop in Eye for giving space and selling copies (does anyone still have one?). That is THREE post offices and TWO stores in Hoxne, Denham and Heckfield Green! Proceeds from the sale were to be donated to the St Edmund's House minibus appeal early in the new vear.

Finally, there were Christmas greetings from 'Laura and Roy of the Grapes'.

### Denham

Denham Village Hall refurbishment update

**W**e still do not have a date for completion, but work is progressing well.

We have now got a date for reconnection of the electricity on 11<sup>th</sup> January and then first fix electrics will start shortly afterwards. The double-glazed metal windows will shortly be delivered and will be fitted in mid-January. Rebuilding of the brick buttresses is almost complete, and the end wall will be braced before the external walls are re-rendered. The internal walls are currently being insulated before plastering.

The project is currently on budget, but we do have some additional work to do with regards to wastewater manage-

ment that will lead to some unbudgeted additional costs, that are within our contingency planning. We have also secured further grant funding from Mid-Suffolk to purchase kitchen appliances.

Planning is now underway for a community event to officially open the hall and we look forward to publicising this nearer to the time!
