meant that three relatives of the airmen have been able to come along to the event and join with us to dedicate a plaque in

family member. The great nephew and the great niece of Robert Harry Bryan had travelled from the US and Scotland respectively, while a nephew of one of the other airmen, Roger Vernon, named after the uncle he never met, travelled from Sheffield . The plaque is placed on the outside wall of the village hall, near to the entrance door, so that visitors wishing to find information from it can do so even when the village hall is closed. A smaller plaque is situated down the footpath near Fir Tree Farm in Syleham, nearer to where the crash occurred.



After the stillness of the dedication we were entertained by the fabulous singing of Station 366, and tea and cake. Thank you to all those who helped with our efforts to raise funds for the lasting memorial to the eight crew members lost on their return journey to Lynford Magna in Lincolnshire in March 1944, and supported fundraising for RAFA.

Church News Alleluia is our song

'Alleluia' comes from Hebrew and means Praise the Lord. It is often used in Christian worship, but particularly in the Easter season. Easter Day was celebrated this year on 31st March but the celebrations don't end there: the Easter season continues for six weeks, right up to Ascension in the middle of May. This is the most joyful time of the church's year, as we rejoice in the resurrection of Jesus from the dead and the promise that we too can look forward to eternal life through the sacrifice which he made.

And the rejoicing is not just for the Easter season. St Augustine of Hippo wrote 'We are an Easter people and alleluia is our song'. In a sense, we live in a permanent Easter, always joyful, always aiming to live as people who are redeemed and made citizens of God's kingdom of peace and justice. Every Sunday is an Easter celebration. As we look around the world, we may feel that peace and justice are in short supply just now, but God is faithful. The Holy Spirit who came to Jesus's disciples at Pentecost (19th May this year) is at work and our salvation is near.

Sometimes living as citizens of God's kingdom involves practical stuff and this is the time of year when our churches hold their Annual Meetings. It is that time of year again, not only Spring but the time of the annual meetings of all sorts of organisations, local and national, and that includes the Annual Parochial Church meeting here in Hoxne. There is a notice displayed in the south porch of the church but some of us

only read notices if we have the time, so I am taking this opportunity to inform you of the date and time.

The APCM will be on Saturday 27th April at 6pm in the church, please come along and find out what the PCC have been doing for your church.

In the meantime, rest assured that the PCC has been trying to move forward with projects. The tower project will need proper lighting and in order to do that we were asked for an Electricity Safety Inspection. I am pleased to report that the electrical installation was judged to be adequate.

The PCC commissioned a Tree Safety Inspection at the end of last year. The results show a fair amount of work to be done, although this does include removal of dead trees, coppicing and the building of habitat piles for bugs. 

They also had a "getting to know you" session together where they prepared and cooked mackerel in a smoker and had some trust activities. Most Sections have plenty of Scout skills to brush up on and plans to make for summer activities.

Tigers Cubs have been working on Skills and Home Help Badge by make tea, ironing, and sewing badges on. Wolves Cubs had a similar objective with teá making. Necker ironing and cooking pancakes. Thank you to the various parents that came in to help with these sessions. Tigers Cubs have also made some progress towards the Navigation

During the evening a King's Scout Award was presented to their former Leader Richard Betts. The KSA is the top achievement for Explorer Scouts and Scout Network Members and comprises of a variety of activities closely linked to the Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award.

Our youngest Section, Squirrels, have been learning about maps by working on their Navigator Badge and craft activities. Unfortunately the very wet

weather meant that their campfire evening had to be postponed.

Our young people have also been working around the HQ site. Wolves Cubs have done some cleaning in HQ as practice



for helping at home and a small party of Pioneers Scouts spent a cold Saturday building raised beds for the allotment area and mounting bike-holders on the wall of the bike shed to store our mountain bikes vertical to minimise the

storage space needed. Also, two senior members of Pioneer Troop spent a very productive evening at a Hoxne Church fundraising quiz helping with answer sheet collection and raffle ticket folding.

Leaders are busy planning camps. So far, we have the Senior Sections Summer Camp in Corfe Castle, the County Water Activities Weekend at the end of May and Group Camp at

the beginning of May. There will also be some smaller Section organised camps during the late spring and summer such as the Pioneer Troop Hike Camp.

Book Club Review Life of Pi

by Yann Martel

Piscine Molitor Patel and his parents. Santosh and Gita, are zoo-keepers moving themselves and their zoo

to Canada, by sea.

A storm blows in, releasing the animals and sinking the ship. Pi manages to get onto a small boat, but he is not alone - his companions are a hyena, a zebra with a broken leg, an

orangutan, and a Bengal tiger called Richard Parker.

When eventually the tiger has eaten the animals, Pi realises he is next on the menu! He decides to try and tame the tiger, and catches fish for them both to eat. After 227 days, they manage to land on a strange island, overrun by meerkats and strange trees.

The main message by Yann Martel is that life can and will be difficult: faith in yourself and a higher power can overcome obstacles in your path. The themes of the book can be seen as spirituality and religion, self-perception and family ties. We enjoyed this book and discussed the symbolism and the intricate story, which has many twists

and turns.

Life of Pi was the winner of the Man Booker Prize in 2002.

My council tax bill is coming out in April, and I am dreading opening it as it always goes up. My income has stayed the same but everything else seems more expensive and I have hardly anything left over - how will I cope if my payments for this year go up?

Many of us are feeling overwhelmed as we see our basic bills and essential costs go up. You're not alone in finding things difficult and, crucially, there's support available.

First off, there are discounts available to some people, depending on their circumstances. You can check your bill or contact your council to find out if you might be eligible for an automatic reduction to your council tax.

If you're not getting a discount, you might still be entitled to one. It depends on who lives in the property. So, if you're the only adult in your home, you'll get a 25% discount on your council tax bill.

Additionally, if someone has moved out, tell the council as this might change your eligibility. If you are entitled to a discount as a result, it will be valid from the date when the person moved out, even if you told the council after the event, and the reduction may be backdated.

If you are on a low income, you might be able to get your council tax reduced. If you get benefits or have other people living with you, this might affect how much your council tax is reduced by.

You may also be eligible for additional support if you've reached State Pension age, which you can check on the government website via https://www.gov.uk/state-pension-age.

If you're under State Pension age, the 'working age rules' apply and if you've reached State Pension age, it depends if you or your partner get certain benefits:

- * Universal Credit
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)

* Income Support

If you've reached State Pension age and don't get any of these benefits, the 'pension age rules' apply.

Even if none of the reduction criteria applies to you, your local council can still reduce your council tax bill or cancel it altogether - this is called 'discretionary reduction'. They'll normally only do this if you can show that you're suffering severe hardship and can't afford to pay council tax.

The days are lengthening and the birds becoming more active. On sunny mornings the dawn chorus will be heard again. The old nests from last year can be seen looking tatty in the trees as the leaves are not yet out. Chaffinches were busy in the hedges on my last visit providing a welcome splash of colour on a grey day. With spring the birds start to sing as they establish territories and look for a mate.

Blackthorn is one of the first blossoms to be seen and was just starting to open at the wood. Primroses were looking cheerful and Lords-and-Ladies were bursting into leaf in the shade under trees and hedges.



As more blossoms emerge the moisture in spring air can boost the smell of the flowers, hence the saying that flowers smell best before rain.

Early butterflies will begin to be seen as the days lengthen

and warm and the trees and hedges blossom. Adult Peacock and Brimstone butterflies are among the first to emerge from their winter dormancy. The high water level in the pond will provide room

for the newts as they return from hibernating under logs and stones where they hibernated during the winter.

Hoxne

Your Parish Council now has a full complement of Councillors - all eleven seats on the Council are filled.

Democracy, even at the local level, works best if there is a wide diversity of opinion to more fully reflect the views of parishioners. It is encouraging news that we are now at our full complement of councillors and all eleven are working on many projects to benefit the village.

In conjunction with the Highways department at the County Council, we are undertaking further traffic surveys to measure the speed of vehicles entering the village on Green Street and on Low Street at the Eye Road end. Further to this, meetings have been arranged with our District Councillor and acting County Councillor Matthew Hicks to prepare a case for traffic management measures around the village including reductions of speed limits from 30 mph to 20 mph and extensions of existing ones. I would like to take this opportunity of thanking those Parish Councillors who are giving up more of their time in addition to that used for normal Parish Council business in order to attend these meetings.

Mid Suffolk District Council has received outline proposals from Cranswick Foods to extend their milling and chicken processing factory on the airfield at Eye in the form of an Environmental Scoping Opinion request. Hoxne Parish Council held an Extraordinary General Meeting to consider these proposals and made some recommendations to Mid Suffolk on what should be considered in the Scoping Opinion. Such an expansion could have significant effects in Hoxne, such as increased HGV movements and environmental concerns. (Cranswick have proposed extracting water from the River Waveney for use in processing, before then returning waste water, treated, back to the river.) If the extension proceeds, it is anticipated that an HGV will leave the site in Eye once every 90 seconds. This will undoubtedly impact the village and we encourage all residents to engage in the planning application stages.

Hoxne Parish Council always meet on the first Thursday of the month, either at the village hall or at the pavilion. Meetings start at 7.30pm. Further details can be found on the Parish Council website, or on the village notice-boards. Members of the public are welcome to observe council meetings, and have their say at the allotted time on the agenda.

The Village Spring Clean takes place on Sunday 24th March. If you would like to help in sprucing up your village then details can be found on the Parish Council website.

On the evening of **Friday 26th April**, in the village hall the Annual Parish Meeting takes place where all the community groups within the parish will be 'showcasing' their activities. Again, refer to the parish council website for more details.
