If you have made a pledge to buy shares or make a donation, there is nothing you need to do. We have your details and will be in touch when we know what is happening. We will never ask you for a financial contribution without certainty about where the balance of funding is coming from.

Nikola Tesla

I would like to say how much I enjoyed Gordon Awcock's article in the last issue about Nikola Tesla. He was clearly a fascinating and exceptional person and Gordon's account took me back to my early childhood when I remember my father's interest in Tesla's work and ideas.

My father's education was rudimentary by today's standards and he left school. soon to be fighting in Europe in WW2, with no qualifications of any sort. However, he had a sharp intelligence and inquiring mind that found many practical applications including the still relatively new domestic uses of electricity. It was around the mid-1950s when, together with his brother-in-law, he undertook the installation of electric power into the three-story, late-Victorian apartment block that was my grandparents' rented home. I well remember the magic of the 'big switch-on' when the gently hissing, dim, greenish light from the gas mantle was replaced by the bright yellowish beam from an electric light bulb.

I am sorry that Gordon's correspondence with local agencies and with the MP have been fruitless. I am not able to comment on the possible relevance of Tesla's ideas to climate change but his biographical story, accessed through a more recent wireless wonder - the internet - made for fascinating reading.








250 ml Guinness

250 g unsalted butter

75 g cocoa

400 g caster sugar

142 ml sour cream

2 eggs

1 tbsp vanilla extract

275 g plain flour

21/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda

300 g Philadelphia cheese

150 g icing sugar

125 ml double or whipping cream

Preheat oven to 180°C.

Butter and line a 23cm springform tin.

Pour Guinness into a large saucepan.

add butter in slices and heat until butter has melted. Whisk in cocoa and sugar.

Beat sour cream, eggs and vanilla extract.

Pour into the Guinness mixture.

Whisk in flour and bicarbonate of soda.

Pour into tin.

Bake for 45 minutes to one hour. Leave to cool completely in the tin on a cooling rack. When cold, turn cake onto a flat plate.

Lightly whip cream cheese, sieve icing sugar and beat together. (Or place in food processor and mix until smooth.)

Add cream and beat again to make spreadable consistency. Spread on top of cake to resemble froth on a pint of Guinness.

Barbara is a wildlife photographer who dedicates her photography to help endangered big cat species in their fight for survival, as well as to raise awareness of the situation of British wildlife and wildlife that lives around us. We were given a fascinating insight into wildlife around the world. From black bears and their cubs in Canada, Patagonia fox in Argentina, lions in South Africa, to grey seals in Norfolk. Barbara told us to respect wildlife at all times and to always have our cameras ready!

In the radio and audio museum upstairs there have been a few changes in order to keep the exhibits fresh and varied. The Bakelite exhibition was a success highlighting the design possibilities of this early plastic, both for radios and other items used around the home (have you ever seen a Bakelite lemon squeezer before?)

We are now collecting transistor radios which has already aroused a lot of interest - particularly from those visitors of a 'certain age' who, as teenagers, remember listening to Radio Luxembourg '208' with their transistor radio underneath the bedclothes rather than going to sleep for school the next morning.

The Waveney Heritage Centre does not receive any regular funding; it therefore relies on the income it receives from organised talks and open days such as the very successful one held in June in

EIGHT YOUNG MEN REMEMBERED IN SYLEHAM

On Saturday 16th March at 1.40 silence fell over the village of Syleham, Suffolk. As the familiar tones of the last post played, the gathered assembly remember eight brave young airmen who lost their lives 80 years ago.

The young men were returning in their Lancaster Bomber, from a raid over Germany when problems with their aircraft began to mount. Flying with only



two of its four engines running, the 20 year old pilot Roy Dixon made the decision to lower his under-carriage and attempt a landing, in the relatively flat terrain beneath his plane. At his side flight engineer Bertram Crosby, also 20, prepared the plane. The radio operator Roger Vernon, just 21 years old, had already tried to radio for help over Orford Ness. The gunners Percy Lawn, 22, Norris Marshall, 34, and Canadian- born bomb aimer Sydney Huntly, 25, did what they could to prepare themselves for landing. Their navigator, 27-yearold William Thompson, having

done his job getting them this far, would have been sharing apprehensive glances with the last member of the crew Harry Bryan, the specialist radio operator, who was 23. As the plane skimmed over the



top of Fir Tree Farm in Syleham it lost lift

and slammed into the ground, too hard for any of the crew to survive. Eight more brave young men lost to the horrors of World War II.

In Syleham in 2024, as the bugle sound faded, the members of the local British Legion slowly raised their standards. The poignant words broke the sad silence. "... At the going

down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them." Remember them we shall - a permanent memorial plaque dedicated to the crew was placed on the outside of the village hall. In the field





behind Fir Tree Farm there is a smaller version of the plague to mark the crash site. A beautiful ceremony had been conducted by the Revd Eleanor Goodison.

Contributions were made by Group Captain Andrew Knowles, President of RAF Association Diss, and Mike Keitch, whose reading of 'High Flight' by John Gillespie Magee Jr.

raised a lump in many of the throats of those present.

After the formal proceedings, the crowd returned to the village hall. Here they were treated to singing from the forties-style group Station 366, and stalls

from local societies. On display was some authentic Lancaster memorabilia, loaned by local Wingfield resident Sarah Lankester, whose father had flown in Lancaster bombers during the war. There was a large exhibition telling the story of the crash and details of the crew was on display, which included the stories of Syleham residents Keith Elsden and Maureen Brundle, who had memories of the crash.

Central to the commemoration were relatives of the airman. Two nephews, Roger and Tony Vernon, travelled from Sheffield on behalf of their lost Uncle Roger Veron, the radio operator.

Specialist radio operator Harry Bryan's great nephew Luis Cappelleti flew over from the United States to attend, and

> great niece Leslev Botten came from Scotland. They both read out letters that their great uncle had written during his short time in the RAF which were very moving.

Local television and radio covered the event,

Radio Stradbroke, BBC Suffolk Radio and news website. ITV Anglia ran a five-minute segment on the following Tuesday to coincide with the actual 80th anniversary of the crash.

Busy days, busy weeks, busy months, busy years and busy life! No space left in your mind!



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We've booked a package holiday to Spain. It's our first time booking this sort of getaway, and a friend recently had a bad experience when things went wrong on a similar trip. What sort of help is available if something does go wrong?

Hopefully you'll have a lovely time but if something does go wrong with your package holiday, the National Citizens Advice website at www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer has lots of information about what to do and what compensation you may be eligible for.

Firstly, tell the company or travel agent you booked with as soon as possible. That way you're more likely to be able to get it sorted quicker. If you don't say anything until you get home, you might get less or no compensation at all.

If the holiday you went on turned out to be lower in value than the one you originally booked you can make a claim for 'loss of value'. For example, if you paid for a deluxe room but only got a standard one and it wasn't sorted out at the time, you can claim back the difference in value.

You can also claim compensation for any extra money you have to spend while away - for example, the hotel was a bus ride away from the beach rather than across the road as advertised. This is called claiming for 'out-of-pocket expenses'. If this does happen, make sure you keep all your receipts for things like bus journeys.

If big parts of the trip you booked didn't happen or services weren't provided, for example a planned two-day excursion was cancelled and no alternative was organised, you can make a claim for 'loss of enjoyment'. You can also make this claim if something happens that causes you distress or disappointment, such as the pool was closed for the whole trip.

It's worth noting that there's no strict guidance on how much you can claim for loss of enjoyment but any claim you make must be reasonable. You can't get compensation if you simply didn't enjoy the holiday or if the problem was out of the holiday company's control - like bad weather.

Check the information you received when you made the booking to see what you're supposed to get. If you don't get the service you've been promised, you may be entitled to compensation for breach of contract. You might also be able to claim from your travel insurance – check if your policy covers this.

Voices from the Past

April to September 1992

Judging from the reports in Village Voice, the spring and summer of 1992 were busy with many and varied fun and fundraising events.

Denham and Hoxne WI were active, with a coach trip to Ipswich for a fashion show by staff at British Home Stores in April, in May a coach trip to Hunstanton and a talk from Officer



Geoff Calton from Ipswich on the history of Customs and Excise and drugs smuggling, and in September

a speaker on the Great Storm of 1987. In June their 40th birthday was celebrated with a party, including decorated hats and a ruby cake baked by member Mrs T Spradlin. The highlight of the evening was the presentation to the institute of a tablecloth made by Mrs Spradlin and Mrs Reeves, depicting the national emblem and the Suffolk Federal Windmill (I wonder what/where that is/was). Apparently each member was asked to take a felt oak-leaf and to embroider their name and date of joining. The leaves were to be stitched to the cloth as a permanent record.

Also in May, on the 2nd, was the School and School Association May Fair on the village green. May King and Queen Matthew Fox and Mary Downe were conveyed from St Edmund's Hall to the green in Kenny Hambling's horse-drawn cart, where the crowning was performed by the Reverend Tony Lowe. There followed maypole dancing, stalls,

games, refreshments and ferret racing ferrets provided by Mr Sparks of Reedham, free of charge.



Unfortunately the event was 'washed off the green by rain' after only about 45 minutes, but still raised £450 for school funds.

Funds were raised for Action Research (what is/was that?): £490 at a coffee morning in Stradbroke and £345 by Jamie Napier running the London Marathon, in the apparently respectable time of 4 hours 10 minutes.

At the Hoxne Bowls Club more than £700 and £502 was raised for club funds at the fourth annual tournament in July and by open gardens respectively. The go-ahead had been received from the District Council Building Control Officers for the new pavilion. Funds stood at £13,000 and a further £7,000 was needed to obtain the grant funding of £23,000 towards the total £46,000.

Money was also a big issue for Denham Church, with the Church Council appealing for help and support to fend off closure.

Hoxne Garden and Social Club reported that, under the direction of

Mr Boy Carr of Suffolk County
Archaeological Department, a weeklong exploration to unearth signs of a
long lost chapel, purported to be that
which may have held the body of
St Edmund, was carried out by a team
of amateur archaeologists assisted by
members of the club. The results were
declared to be successful. Members
were afterwards given a lecture with
colour slides by Mr Carr, showing very
interesting details of the work of his
department and his appraisal of the
chapel site.

It was reported that 'more will follow on this subject' but, disappointingly, copies of *The Voice* are missing from the archive between September 1992 and December 1993, and I fear further news on this subject may be missing.

Hoxne

Telegraph pole

Remember the telegraph pole that suddenly appeared opposite the shop on Low Street in Hoxne? Well, now we know it is for telecommunication use and indeed some apparatus has appeared on top of it, together with its own solar panel. The planning authority are vague as to the actual use but it seems it may be used when water smart meters are installed throughout the village. It has been allowed under the permitted development rights given to utility companies, even though it is in a conservation area.

Traffic management

The Traffic Management Group of the Council are continuing with their work on developing proposals for more effectively managing motor traffic through the village. Hoxne has so many roads in and out of the village it means traffic movements can be guite complex to monitor. However, the group are now at the stage of mapping their proposals for submitting to the whole of the Parish Council for discussion and approval before referring them to the highways authority (Suffolk County Council). It will be the highways authority that will ultimately decide whether our proposals are feasible and if so, then speed limit changes etc have to be implemented through a legal procedure. That is before any new road signs can be put up. A lengthy and expensive process.

At the time of writing, there are two vacancies on Hoxne Parish Council. We are keen to have as wide a representative group of councillors as possible representing the village, therefore we are looking for younger residents of voting age in the village joining us. We would also like more women to consider joining the Council. Further details on how to join can be obtained from the council website, or you can email Sarah Foote, the clerk of the council.
