



Community Payback and Hoxne's Eco Church

Visitors to Hoxne churchyard may have noticed a lot of work going on this year. This work has always gone on with respect to the care and maintenance of the churchyard over the years. Many people give their own time for free to help manage it; this is so much appreciated by both the church and the community.

Community payback Once a month a small group of people do community service in the church and churchyard in the form of community payback, run by the probation service. They are always supervised by trained officers and a small group of people from the village also work alongside them. It is part of the



church's mission to support, guide and cherish these people. (Photo taken with permission by all the payback members in the picture.)

Churchyard management We are aiming to balance a need for maintenance of

the burial area allowing visitors the space, quiet and a pleasant environment to spend time with their departed family, conservation and quiet recreation within this important green space for Hoxne. The churchyard is huge and there is ample room for all these uses. The recent graves are more frequently cut, the area around the church itself more frequently cut, invasive saplings and vegetation which damages the structure of the building is controlled. The carpark has been cut back to its original size as there is a need for ample parking at community events and services. We are aiming to bring in more conservation measures like less frequent cutting in certain areas to encourage wildflowers and improve the opportunities for a more complex food chain and biodiversity. This doesn't mean neglecting the churchyard; it still needs management.

Eco church Our strategy of management considers the principles outlined in the eco church award which we have signed up to as a church in Hoxne. Eco Church is a learning community of churches of all shapes and sizes open to all denominations. The award covers five key areas of church life:

Worship and teaching Buildings and energy Land and nature Community and global engagement Lifestyle

We undertake a survey which guides us and helps us to assess our progress towards a bronze, silver or gold *Eco Church* award. Some parts of the survey suggest we are doing well; other parts challenge us to make improvements. We are aiming to achieve a bronze award as soon as possible.

Sudden Deaths in 19th Century Suffolk A talk by Geoffrey Robinson

Geoffrey will share with us the knowledge gained following research for his new book, "Misery and Misfortune: Sudden Deaths in Suffolk 1800-1850". Life was dangerous in the 19th century, and cheap! Health and Safety was not of major concern; accidents were more commonplace and could easily result in serious injury or even death. The talk will include tales substantiated by articles from The Ipswich Journal, and courtesy of The Suffolk Records Office, and include cases of being burnt to death, crushed by cartwheels, drowned and being savaged by a game cock!

HOXNE'S LOST PALACE - Part III

The wonderfully detailed estate plan of "Hoxon Hall" and the "Newe Parke", drawn in 1619, shows the palace behind a crenellated tower gateway, within a moat filled with fish, and boasting an orchard, formal garden and a rabbit warren. The park was surrounded by a post and rail fence and had a number of entry gates. The River Dove is clearly shown to the north of the house.


The palace was soon to become a favourite retreat for the Bishops of Norwich, where they could hunt and fish or for a number of them, spend their final days in quiet contemplation. Bishop Walter de Suffield

made his will at Hoxne in 1256, and bequeathed his pack of hounds and palfrey to the king.

The house was also a valuable place of escape from the ravages of the various plagues that beset the country, especially the Black Death of 1349 that carried off 7,000 souls half the population in Norwich.

The last Bishop to visit the Palace shortly before the Dissolution of the Monasteries by Henry VIII in 1535, was the blind Bishop William Nyx, who died there deserted by all his household!

Royalty too were frequent visitors. Edward II came in January 1326 to issue a charter, and in the winter of 1344 his son, Edward III, arrived -



according to the Calendar of Close Rolls issued by him, with the Keepers of the Privy Seal and Wardrobe - and spent several days making the datings.

Sadly though, all was to come to a

tragic end. After some 600 years, the Bishops were turned out of the house and a lease granted to Charles Brandon, Duke of Suffolk in 1536 and to the Southwell dynasty three years later.

The property remained largely unchanged for many years. The moat was filled in by 1757 and in 1830 the house was rebuilt.

Alas, 'tis no more.




A silver penny of Edward III found in the Park this year.

Windows 10 End of Life - What Now?

As you may have read, Microsoft have officially announced Windows 10 end of life support from

14 October 2025. The current version of Windows 10, version 22H2, will be the last supported version. This significant date marks the end of security updates, bug fixes, and technical



Upgrade and Alternative Solutions

Free Upgrade to Windows 11

Available through Windows Update if your PC meets the minimum requirements. This is the easiest solution, but your PC must have at least an 8th generation Intel processor or an AMD Ryzen 2000 series or newer to do so. Most perfectly capable Windows 10 machines will fail here.

Other requirements are TPM (Trusted Platform Module, 4Gb of memory (RAM), 64Gb of free hard disk space and Direct X grapics12 support. Phew! That's a whole lot of up-to-date specifications to comply with. Specs that many Windows 10 machines can't meet.

Extended Security Updates (ESU) for Windows 10

Available from Microsoft, there's a paid program at £30/user per year for one additional year of security patches, with

no new features though. Only useful as a temporary bridge if immediate hardware upgrade isn't feasible.



Purchase a New Windows 11 PC

Ensures full compatibility, warranty, and years of support ahead with high cost. Alternatively good used fully reconditioned ex-corporate business

computers laptops are readily available at a fraction of the cost of a brand-new equivalent computer. Search Amazon Renewed for some excellent deals.

Switch to an Alternative Operating System

Linux distributions (Ubuntu, Fedora, Mint) are free (yes, free as in cost £0), regularly updated, and run well on older hardware. However, there is a learning curve and some of your applications will not be supported, although there's nearly always an equivalent available.

Continue Using Windows 10 (Unsupported)

You can keep using the OS "as is," but you assume full security responsibility. But do not chance high-risk activities (e-commerce, banking etc.).

Next Steps and Recommendations

Run Microsoft's PC Health Check app. Back up all critical data before attempting any OS upgrade or hardware replacement.

If sticking with Windows 10 temporarily, plan for a full hardware refresh or OS migration asap.

New Reeding Woods

With meteorological autumn beginning on 1st September we are now in the "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness". We will have passed the autumn equinox when you are reading this and the days will have drawn in.

However no mists were around in early September and after a hot and dry

summer signs of autumn were being seen early this year. Some leaves turned brown early and blackberries were being picked in August. Looking up into the canopy, oaks were losing leaves and all around trees were losing branches. These are not signs of an early autumn but a result of the stress of another dry summer. Trees lose leaves and branches to

save energy. Early fruit in the hedgerow will not sustain wildlife through into winter. The dry ground makes it hard for birds and animals to find worms. The pond at the wood was drying out where we should have had a foot of water. It will be interesting to see how the woodland fares next year.

The meadow was looking green after the recent showers although we had a very poor crop of hay this year. The hedgerows weré full of blackberries and the hawthorns were glowing red. The oaks were full of acorns and sloes hung in abundance waiting for a frost so they can be picked for gin.

The spindle trees were iust starting to turn colour and bearing bright pink berries which provide food

for both birds and mice. Dogwood berries showed black against leaves of a rich purple brown. Up above, the Wild Service tree was bearing fruit. These are eaten by pigeons which help the fruit to soften, aiding propagation. Further on a dog rose was covered in hips and balls or "Robin's pincushions". These are used by the larvae of a very small wasp and turn red as autumn progresses.

A female common darter dragonfly patrolled the meadow along the hedge line, busy looking for insects to satisfy her voracious appetite.

Walking down the rides, apples were in the trees and windfalls covered the ground together with leaves starting to show autumn colours. We will be tidying

along the rides later in the season where branches are starting to hang down.

Hoxne Memories

by Stephen Govier

I was born at 49 Low Street in January 1955. This property had once been the home of my great-grandparents, Arthur Gilman and his wife Florence (née Butcher). On the 1619 plan of Hoxne, it was known as *The Christopher*.

I cannot remember the tall elm trees that once cloaked the village green, but I do recall the stump of an elm tree where my great-great-grandfather George Butcher used to sit. I have a photo of him seated outside his cottage.

Before the village green was curbed, the well shelter stood in front of 49 Low Street. I used to sit here with family members including my great grandfather William Alfred Tye (died 1964). He had been born at Reading Green (also know as Readham Green) and, after leaving school aged 14, worked on one of the local farms. He lived with his parents Alfred and Jane (née Larter at Stanwell House. Alfred looked after the traction engine on the farm.

In 1901, William went to work in Yorkshire as an agricultural labourer. By 1902 he had moved to Cuckney, Nottinghamshire, and was working as a coal miner at Pleasley Colliery, where he cared for the pit ponies. That same year

The triangular village green has seen a lot of village history. Scottish cattle dealers would sell livestock which were grazed in the village during the winter months. If you visit the churchyard, you'll find gravestones engraved with Scottish surnames.

The village green was also decked out with bunting and lanterns for the cheap-jack fairs, where prizes were awarded for dancing, singing and eating competitions.

I can remember the scissor man who came to the village to sharpen, knives, shears and other bladed tools. He also repaired cooking pots and pans.

The Post Office and Shop was run by the Cowham family, and the adjoining building was a store and hardware shop. Further down the street was the grocer's, and next door was the bakery, operated by the Gilbert family (formerly Wilcox Steam Bakery).

The wooden, shambles-type building opposite the Swan Inn was the butcher's shop. The slaughterhouse and barn were in Sandpit Lane, formerly known as Saffron Pan Lane, which led to the Down Bridge and Downbridge Farm. When I was old enough my sister Jane and I would walk from Heckfield Green, along Oak Hill, past St Edmund's monument and over the wooden bridge at Downbridge Farm to visit our grandparents at their cottage in Low Street. We also attended Sunday School with Miss Mirth Hovell or our grandmother, Olive Maud Tye (née Gilman).

We lived in a cottage opposite the Grapes Inn, before moving to The Retreat at Heckfield Green in 1957.

The Primary School on the corner of Clink Hill was not far away, but I did everything I could to avoid that establishment of learning.

Mrs Lindley was the kindly reception teacher. Mrs Olwen Chapman, the informative middle-class teacher, took us on walks

to Chickering Beck to collect insects and fish for the school aquarium, and to the woods on Denham Road to study wildlife and plants. She sparked my lifelong interest in flora and fauna.

However if we had been bad, naughty or noisy she would smack our hand with a ruler; if really bad, the edge of the ruler was used. But we always got a bag of sweets to share with friends on our birthdays.

The boys' cloakroom was at the far end of the main school corridor and the dreaded wall clock hung next to the door of the notorious headmaster. A V Balls.

We played flick with our cigarette and tea cards, swapped stamps, played marbles and generally made a noise, especially if it was wet during break times.

On my first day at school I was looking forward to a hot meal, served by the ladies from the school canteen in

the playground. We had sausage, mash, and vegetables. The headmaster stole a sausage from my plate, and I ran home crying. That was the first and last time I had a school meal—except at Christmas. My mother told him in no uncertain terms that she wasn't going to pay for him to be fed! After that I went to my greatuncle and aunt's for lunch when my mother was working!

Hoxne

At last, some progress is being made on traffic calming measures around Hoxne. (And not for a want of trying). Suffolk Highways have agreed to install additional signage, including road markings on Green Street and on the Eye Road on the approach to the village. This falls short of what we had asked for, and Hoxne Parish Council will have to pay for these measures. The Council has also agreed to try and get the speed limit on Cross Street and Low Street reduced to 20mph. This will take longer to implement and may not even happen as it has to go through a court process again, at the council's expense. In total Hoxne Parish Council has committed nearly £20,000 to this project. That is why the parish council share of the Council Tax went up by 50% this year.

With a change of management due at the Swan on Low Street the council has also applied to re-register the pub as a community asset, just in case the owner (Stonegate) puts the building on the market. This allows the community a period of time in which to raise funds in order to buy the building and continue running it as a pub rather than it turning into residential use.

With this copy of *Village Voice*, residents of the parish of Hoxne should also have received a leaflet explaining what to do
