

As usual we are encouraging local clubs, associations and families to


come along and decorate a tree. A number of trees and lights will be available in the church from 1.00pm on Saturday 6th December and help will be on hand to assist where necessary.



In memory of Thomas (Tommy) Whitby Gee (1925 - 2025)

Tommy Gee, a regular *Village Voice* contributor, passed away peacefully at home on Friday 31st October 2025, aged 100.

He was my grandfather. He will be fondly remembered.

Tommy and his wife Anne (who sadly passed away in 2010) had three children: Nathaniel, Simon (my father) and Sarah. He had three sisters (Jo, Alice and Dot).

As grandparents, they were always generous and jolly good fun to have around.

Born in 1925 in Nottingham, Grandpa went to High Pavement school. As he was very smart, he studied maths at Brasenose College (he graduated with 1st class honours).

From Oxford, he went to the Royal Naval College (Greenwich) as a 2nd Lieutenant.

In the Indian Ocean on his 21st birthday, tracking a hurricane off Mauritius, the ship's captain looked over Grandpa's shoulder and said, "If I lose the ship, Gee, I shall hold you responsible." They arrived safely the next day.

At age 23 he married Anne, and they moved to Uganda. He was District Commissioner, then became the Ministry of Education's Permanent Secretary.

He then moved back to Sussex to work for the IDS (Institute of Development Studies) and set up the USP (University of the South Pacific) in Fiji. He also spent a few years in Papua New Guinea and Guyana (again with the universities there).

He returned to the IDS in Sussex until retirement. He became a county councillor and chief planner for the

Liberals.

In the early '80s he restored a house in Wingfield and eventually moved there, getting involved in many local activities (the Village Voice, restoring the church bells, the Quakers, etc).

In 2019 he travelled to Brazil. He always enjoyed travelling!

One fond memory that comes to mind is when he used to read aloud to me before bedtime. The BFG was a favourite. He and

Grandma stocked our shelves with classics and stories from Papua New Guinea or Uganda. I now live in south-west France and enjoy reading aloud to my two daughters.

Grandpa lived with his daughter in Sussex until he passed away. He had a great sense of humour and was an avid reader of *The London Review of Books* and *The Guardian*, regularly sending in letters. I always considered him an intellectual.

He will be terribly missed.

The weather has been unseasonably mild with autumn colour still showing in the woodland. The pond level however was very low reflecting the low level of rainfall after a very dry summer.

The large oak at the far end of the meadow is still a rich ochre while the field maples along the edges of the rides are showing bright yellow. Sloes are still abundant awaiting

bushes showed blue under their load of fruit. Buttercups are still blooming in the meadow. The medlars are ripe and falling off the tree. In the hedge the Wild Service tree glowed a flame red. The fruits of this tree are also known as chequers and can be used to make an alcoholic drink, and the name is thought to have been given to pubs called "Chequers". If you look carefully, a

Both the seat in the log at the pond and the log at the meadow are covered in tiny fungi against a rich carpet of lichens. A world of mosses and mushrooms has established in the cracks in the log. At the other end of the seat the lichen has formed trumpet-like fruiting bodies which will produce spores to allow the organism to spread.

With the leaves falling now both birds' nests and squirrel dreys can be seen in the trees. A Red Kite was being harried by rooks in the adjoining field. The wood still offers a place of peace and also colours and interest as you walk through.

Taryan's Borneo Adventure - helped by the Maynard Trust

This summer I was lucky enough to join Camps International on a monthlong expedition to Borneo with 31 other students from Stradbroke High and several other Norfolk and Suffolk schools. We participated in volunteer work to help improve local communities, such as clearing channels to improve drainage in preparation for the rainy season as well as mixing and laying cement foundations for a group of community toilets.

We trekked deep into the rainforest along the banks of the Kinabatangan River, to clear an area of land and plant trees to help rejuvenate small areas of the rainforest that are under threat, with help from the Kopel Ecotourism group.

Throughout the trip we learned about the different cultures of the tribes that live in the areas where we stayed, including different foods from local speciality recipes and the regular meals that the local people ate. We were introduced to tribal rituals, such as welcoming dances and the way the tribes tell stories through their dance.

The trip included a five-day trek through the jungle in which we carried large rucksacks of camping gear, moving from camp to camp each day doing a total of 30km, while sleeping in hammocks tied to trees at night. While we were trekking our guides showed us different aspects of the wildlife that we passed such as different species of insect, the native stingless bees and various types of plant. They showed us how we could drink the purified water from some plants that were safe, such as bamboo water and water from a certain type of vine.



The trip cost £4,800 plus equipment. I raised this through kind donations from my family, having donations instead of Christmas and birthday presents, a sponsored trampoline bounce at Waveney Gymnastics in Lowestoft where I am a long time member, and selling resin jewellery I handmade at First Eye Scout events. I am grateful to the Maynard Trust for contributing £400 towards the cost of my expedition; I am also grateful to Jules at First Eye Scouts for supporting me at the Scout events.

More Hoxne memories...



In response to Stephen Govier's article in the October-November issue of *The Village Voice*, the photo above (copyright KFA) shows the village green, looking towards numbers 49 and 41. It was probably taken around 1952/53; the decorations may have been for the Coronation of Elizabeth II. I was born there in July 1957.

You can see the original site of the well shelter, and the tree stumps Stephen refers to in his article. It would be interesting to compare the photo with Stephen's, showing his grandfather outside his cottage.

Stephen's comment about school lunches reminded me of an entry in the School Log book. There was a delay in the opening of the 'new' canteen and kitchen as the asbestos sheeting had not been delivered! However in February 1943 the new cook, Mrs Hawes, was appointed and the official opening was carried out on 1st March 1943.

Mrs Joyce Lindley commenced her duties at the school on 8th September 1955 with the Infants. The other teachers at the time were the Headteacher Mr A V Balls (Billy) who taught the oldest class and Mrs Chapman who taught the middle class group. There were 67 pupils on roll.

Whyt Lies Beneath: Unearthing a Hoxne Grocer's Legacy

Recently turned up in Hoxne is this scarce copper 17th cent. trade token. It was issued by Benjamin White, a grocer in the village in about 1680/90 and bears the legend "Benjamin Whyt" and the Grocer's Company arms on one side, and "Grocer in Hoxson" on the other.





Benjamin died in 1697 in the third year of the reign of William III and in his will, (which is almost illegible!), he leaves a property in Church Street, Eye to his wife and some land called the Camping Land to a relative. No reference to property or shop in Hoxne sadly, although probably in Low St!

For contacting Hoxne Parish Council we now have a telephone number in addition to making contact via the website. It is: 07594 657416. This number will get you through to the Parish Clerk.

There is no further news regarding traffic management within the parish. We are waiting for Suffolk Highways and the police to ratify our suggestions for which the Council has allocated a considerable amount of money.

All households within the Hoxne Parish should have received a leaflet offering suggestions and guidance for coping with any future flooding within the village as a result of severe weather. The Council has also devised an emergency plan. Keep the leaflet safe - there are also important links on there that may be of use in future adverse weather. If you require another copy of the leaflet there are copies in the village hall.

Within the first week of December there will be a group of your parish councillors in the community orchard at Heckfield Green undertaking maintenance of vegetation and trees. They will also be hopefully repairing the gate to the orchard and installing a new bench, kindly donated by a family having long time connections with the village. Small though it is, we encourage residents to use the orchard for the peace and tranquillity it offers.

The Council has successfully applied to renew the Swan public house as a 'community asset', meaning that if the owner (Stonegate) wishes to sell the

premises, the residents of Hoxne are given the opportunity to raise funds to purchase the pub for community use.

The proposed Shreves Farm development came before an Extraordinary meeting of Hoxne Parish Council again some weeks ago, having been revised since the original application. There are still a few issues which the Council are not happy with, details of which can be found in the minutes of that meeting on the Council website. The ultimate planning decision however rests with Mid Suffolk Council Planning.

Finally on behalf of Hoxne Parish Council may I wish you a Happy Christmas and a reminder that you could make a New Year's resolution to join the Parish Council - there is still one vacancy!

Wingfield

Wingfield Parish Council met on 17th September 2025. At the meeting councillors co-opted and welcomed Mr Jay Fletcher onto the council.

Councillors approved a grant application towards the cost of the Open Gardens event of £178.81. The event raised £5.5k, with the proceeds divided between a local hospice and St Andrew's Church. Councillors thanked the organisers and volunteers for their hard work making the event such a success.

Councillors also welcomed the news that a Wingfield History Project Group had been set up. The project includes plans to record older residents' memories of living in Wingfield and the creation of information boards giving details of the historic buildings, oral history, and walking routes around the village.

Councillors thanked Cllr Lee Smith for his work repairing the village's phone box and also thanked District Councillor Lavinia Hadingham for her support in resolving the flooding issue at Castle



Crescent. The Parish Council had raised the issue with Cllr Hadingham on behalf of residents. The council were also updated on the second village defibrillator which had now been delivered and was due to be installed at Corner Green Farm.

Councillors welcomed Dawn Wnukoski (DW), Emergency Planning Support Officer, BMSDC, to the meeting who spoke to the council about the importance of parishes having emergency plans in place. Councillors agreed to develop an emergency plan in line with BMSDC guidance.
